


# Beatrice Gibbs PANTHERS LOSE TO DUBLIN; **HOST GREYHOUNDS FRIDAY**

The drive featured a beautiful pass play to Jimmy Johnson and 13 and 9 yard runs by Gibbs. The try for two points on a pass to Johnson was good and Gorman led 8-0. Dublin came back in the second period, taking over at their own 13 yard line and going the distance in only 3 plays. After getting 12 yards on the first play and 2 yards on first down Jeff Pate caught a long desperation pass and rambled for 75 yards with 4:10 left in the second quarter. A n o t h e r pass to Pate was good for the two points and the game was

knotted at 8-8. This was the way the first half ended.

Following the kickoff, and after forcinf the Panthers to punt the Lions took over on their own 35 and went the distance in 6 plays with Mark Boucher breaking off his right tackle for 37 yards and the touchdown with 4:21 left in the period. The two point conversion was made on a pass to Palmore and the Lions wemt ahead 16-8.

The Panthers came back on a valiant try later in the game but were held short. Then with time almost gone in the final period the Panthers took over on their own 46 yard line and was trying desperately to tie the game in the final seconds of the game when a desperation pass was intercepted by the Lions and was returned for a touchdown by Jeff Boies to ice the victory. The kick for extra point failed and the final score was 22 to 8.





## PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

# **GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 7, 1978**

**"The Tax Relief** Amendment" (H.J.R. 1)

H.J.R. 1 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution allowing the legislature to exempt intangible personal property, requiring the legislature to exempt certain household goods and personal effects, and allowing the legislature to exempt all or part of the personal property homestead from state and local property taxation.

The amendment requires the legislature to provide for the taxation of farm and ranch land on the basis of its productive capacity instead of its market value and allows the legislature to provide for the taxation of timber land on its productive capacity.

The amendment permits local governments to extend the present exemption of not less than \$3,000 of the residence homestead of persons 65 and older to include certain disabled persons.

The amendment grants an exemption from public school property taxes of \$5,000 of the market value of the residence homestead. It authorizes the legislature to grant an additional exemption from public school property taxes of an amount not to exceed \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homesteads of persons 65 years of age or older and certain disabled persons. If a person 65 years of age or older qualifies for this exemption, the total amount of public school taxes imposed on that person's homestead may not be in- capped individuals to be creased.






