Access Challenge

The right of access to property may seem so basic that a home buyer practically takes it for granted. But there are occasions when this right is challenged and a buyer discovers that home ownership can be less than tranquil.

In the Midwest, a buyer purchased a residence with the understanding that he also was acquiring an easement which would allow him to cross a neigh-

bor's land in order to reach his real estate. All seemed in order until the buyer began using a 30-foot strip across the adjoining property for access and the neighbor strenuously objected.

As the dispute progressed, it became clear that the neighbor considered the 30-foot strip to be a rightof-way for future extension of a street-but not an easement for individual use by the home buyer.

Fortunately, the buyer was protected by owner's title insurance. Under the coverage of his policy, the title insurer retained an attorney who began efforts to negotiate an agreement between the parties that would settle the matter and allow the buyer to retain the right of access to his property. The dispute finally ceased and the title company paid attorney fees to avert financial loss for its

insured. Owner's title insurance safeguards against problems including those that a title search of public records will not disclose. For a one-time premium at closing, coverage includes payment for defending against an attack on title as insured-and either clearing up title problems or payment of valid claims.







# Deadline Set For Comments

WASHINGTON - The public has until Jan. 30 to recommend price support levels and other provisions of the 1981erop peanut program, according to Secretary of Agriculture

Bergland said the U.S. Department of Agriculture is asking for recommendations on:

 The national support level for quota peanuts; · The national support level for additional peanuts;

· Sales policy for additional peanuts received under loan or acquired by the Commodity Credit Corporation under the 1981 program and sold for export edible use.

Bergland said legislation requires nine factors be considered in setting the quota loan rate but this price support cannot be less than \$420 per ton on 1981 crop peanuts produced

within a farm's poundage quota. Price supports on additional peanuts produced within a farm's acreage allotment but in excess of the poundage quota must be announced by Feb. 15.

In determining the price support level for additional pea-nuts, USDA will look at the current demand for peanut oil and meal, expected prices of other vegetable oils and protein meals, and the demand for peanuts in foreign markets, Ber-

In 1980, a price support of \$455 per ton is available on quota peanuts, while additional peanuts are supported at \$250 per ton.

CCC is required by law not to sell peanuts it acquires before Dec. 31 of any marketing year at less than 105 percent of the current support prices plus reasonable carrying






