On 6-8-78 they phoned that tests were in. (Testing for tumor.) I said I will be there in ten minutes for report. .They said no, to wait and come on 6-12-78. Is that the way for a doctor to treat his patients? Do you wonder why the people are disgusted with these doctors? Is that justice? It had been sixteen days since I entered the hospital. I was anxious to hear the results of my tests. They could have at least told me they were all clear. I think it was an inhuman act. I really believe the reason they would not release me was that the doctor came around twice a day (so he claimed. Not so. He did not) and billed me \$21.00 for those visits.
