

DR. PINO FILES SUIT AGAINST HOSPITAL DISTRICT

Dr. A.E. Pino of Blackwell Clinic has filed suit alleging the South Eastland County Hospital District is trying to terminate his lease. The office space is located in the East End of Blackwell Hospital.

The suit was filed Friday November 3 in 91st District Court in Eastland.

Plaintiff is also seeking reinstatement of staff privileges in Blackwell Hospital

which he alleges was unlawfully terminated.

The district is now under a temporary restraining order prohibiting members from discussing the issue.

Judge Earl Connor, Jr., will hear the suit.

Dr. Pino is being represented by the Eastland Law Firm of Turner, Seaberry and Worford. The hospital district is being represented by Eastland Attorney Jime Wright.

GORMAN VOTERS PREFER HILL, KRUEGAR, STENHOLM

In the General Election held Tuesday with beautiful weather only 315 voters went to polls to cast their votes.

In the hotly contested governors race, the voters in Gorman preferred Hill to Clements. John Hill received 193 votes and Bill Clements received 117 votes.

John Tower received 113 votes and Robert Krueger received 191 for the US Senate post. The election as of Wednesday morning was still incomplete and the state voters were too close to call a victory of either of the candidates.

Charles Stenholm won by a large margin in his bid for the 17th Congressional seat over his opponent Bill Fisher. Gorman voters gave Stenholm 241 votes and Fisher 64.

Bill Hobby received 221 votes for Lieutenant Governor and Gaylord Marshall received 73 votes.

Mark White received 204 votes for Attorney General and Jim Baker received 103.

Bob Bullock who was unopposed for Comptroller of Public Accounts received 229 votes.

Warring G. Harding for State Treasurer received 239 votes and his opponent Derrick Adams, Socialist Worker Party received 0 votes.

Bob Armstrong received 237 votes for General Land Office.

Reagan V. Brown, 237 votes for Commissioner of Agriculture.

Mack Wallace 236 votes for Railroad Commissioner. His republican opponent Jana Pellusch received 0 votes.

The Panthers came back on their next possession, taking the ball on the Rattler 31 and scoring in three plays with Blaine Gibbs rambling the final 25 yards for the score with 1:40 left in the period. The run for two points failed and Gorman led 12-0.

Gorman scored again with 9:03 left in the second period when Larry Keith ran in for the score from 5 yards out to cap a 45 yard drive. The drive featured a beautiful 19 yard pass to Jamie Snider from Billy Simpson. Again the run for points failed and Gorman led 18-0.

The Panthers added another score before the half-time intermission as they took the ball on their own 30 and went the distance in 9 plays with the score coming on a 5 yard pass to Jamie Snider from Simpson with 3:38 left in the half. The drive featured a marvelous 34 yard run by Johnson and an 11 and 15 yard runs by Gibbs. The run for two points again failed and the half-time score stood at 24-0.

Following the intermission the Panthers took the ball on their own 23 yard line and scored in only two plays with Larry Keith picking up 23 yards on a real fine run. From there Blaine Gibbs

rambled the final 54 yards for the TD with 11:18 left in the period. Charles White booted the extra point and Gorman led 31-0.

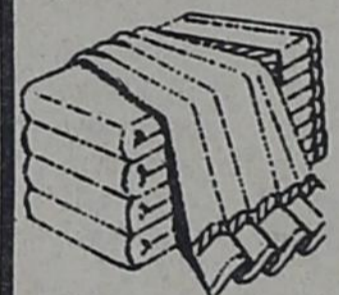

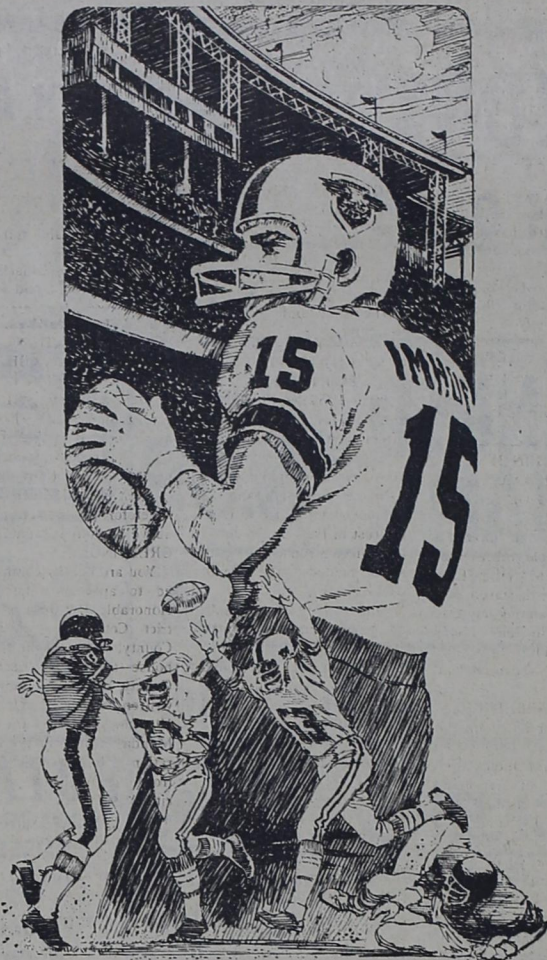
