GRANTED NCTION **DISTRICT FILES SUIT** PINO; HOSPITAL

Earl Conner, Jr., Judge of the 91st District Court in Eastland County, Texas, issued a temporary injunction against the South Eastland County Hospital District, its agents, servants and employees, on Friday, Movember 10, 1978. The injunction was not permanent in nature but was to be in effect pending a final hearing in a lawsuit filed by A.E. Pino against the District. The injunction prohibits the defendant from interfering unlawfully with A.E. Pino's possession and use of Blackwell Clinic, from interferring with A.E. Pino's staff privilges withguard to the by-laws of the Medical Staff of Blackwell Hospital and from informing patients and the public that A.E. Pino is not on the staff of Blackwell Hospital. The injunction does not prohibit the defendant from taking any action deemed necessary concerning staff privileges so long as the provisions of the by-laws are followed. Further, the injunction does no prohibit, as was made clear during the course of the preliminary hearing, the defendant from taking court action to terminate the lease of A.E. Pino on the premises know as Blackwell Clinic.




Two of those boys were sons of the man where I was boarding. He said, "George beat the hell out of them, we are with you all the way."
