I was determined to stay on there. Tho I was scared.

Two of those boys were sons of the man where I was boarding. He said, "George beat the hell out of them, we are with you all the way."

My, just think if the parents were that way today, how much easier it would be for all concerned. There would not be so many delinquents today. It would save many tears and heart breaks later in life.

I suppose that when I started that school, about all I knew was that a book had a front and back cover. Since then I have learned that all the important things written are between those covers. Oh! If I could have developed those extra convolutions in my hard Cranium and could have stored all the things I have read, seen or experienced and could have the eloquence to express it thoroughly, how wonderful that would be for me.

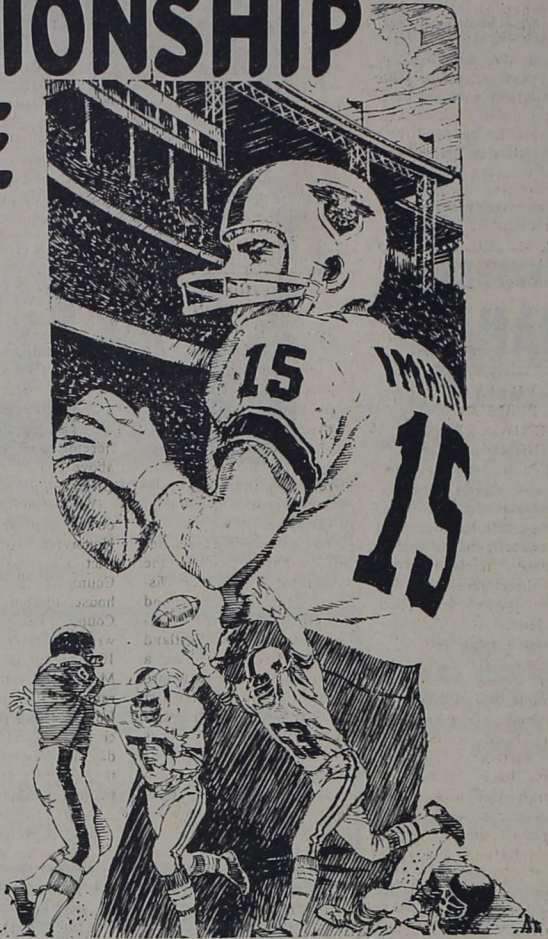
