R.D. Harr, Eastland County hay producer, won two blue ribbons at the 1978 State Hay Show. He sent a sample of Coastal bermudagrass and a sample of Alfalfa hay to the show for classification and analysis. The 1978 State Hay Show was held recently in Austin at the Municipal Coliseum.

Hart's coastal hay tested 14.7 percent crude protein and had a final score of 87.5. The alfalfa hay tested 21 percent with a final score of 92. The hay had a grade 85 or above to be classified in the blue ribbon class.

Hay production is Eastland County is a sizeable part of the agricultural economy. In 1977 there were 24,000 tons of hay produced in this County and that was a poor year for hay. Quality of hay is important, too, especially this year with limited hay supplies. Hay producers should fertilize their hay adequately and harvest it before it matures.

If you are interested in learning how the fertilizer improved hay quality, or any other crop for that matter, you should attend our soil management and fertilizer meeting at the Eastland County Farm Bureau building in Eastland Tuesday night, November 28 at 7:00 p.m.

Dr. Edwin Coburn, Soil Management Specialist and Dr. George Alson, Agronomist will present the program. Peanut and grain producers will also benefit from this meeting. Last February 150 people

Stuffing With A Different Twist

attended a meeting on oil and gas leasing in Cisco. Because of the demand for this information we are having another meeting scheduled for November 27 in the auditorium at Cisco Junior College. Speakers will be Mr. Phillip Russell of the Texas Railroad Commission and Eastland Attorney Mike Siebert. Every one interested in oil and gas leasing for the landowner's stand point should attend.

We have had some questions concerning pecans that are sprouting on the trees. Ripe pecans commonly sprout while they are in the shuck and on the tree. Burkett, Western and Shoshoni can have severe sprouting if a late summer drought is followed by a rainy period.

Once a pecan is mature is needs to be harvested as soon as possible and dried. Warm, moist conditions in September, October and November can stimulate sprouting on the tree.

Pecans at this stage do not need the typical chilling requirement to condition the nut for germination. If you have a pecan crop don't forget to save an entry of each variety for the County Pecan Show. It will be December 8 and 9 in the Eastland County Court-house.

Friut and pecan trees can make a major contribution to any home garden. However, gardeners must give close attention to disease prevention.
The first step in producing healthy fruit and pecan trees is to select a variety that has resistance to most of the major disease that occur in this particular area of the state.
Good pecan varieties for Eastland County are Choctaw, Wichita, Mohawk, Sioux, Cheyenne and Shoshoni.
In selecting peach and plums, be aware of the rootstock on which the variety is budded. The rootstock Nemaguard is resistant to root knot nematodes and should be the understock on all peach and plum varieties grown in the home planting. Root knot nematodes are a major problem on peaches and plums. Homeowners sometime get the idea that a nurseryman plants an

Elberta seed and two or three years later the tree is dug and sold as an Elberta. This is not true. The nurseryman plants a seed which may be an Elberta, Nemaguard or Lovell. After one year the tree is budded to a variety such as Elberta. This insures that all Elberta trees are the same and reduces the differences that would occur between seedlings of the Elberta variety. Look for adapted varieties that are budded onto the nematode resistant rootstock, Nemaguard.
Bacterial leaf spot is a disease that attacks the leaves and fruit of peaches and plums. Currently there is no totally effective chemical treatment for this disease, so use resistant varieties whenever possible to avoid losses. Peach varieties such as Spring Gold, Sentinel, Harvester, Loring, Redglobe, Redskin and Frank have varying levels of resistance to this bacteria and should be planted where adapted.
Grapes are another crop for which homeowners should request a specific variety. The variety Champanel has a definite place in the home fruit planning. It is resistant to root knot nematodes and to the serious foliage and fruit disease, Black Rot. It also appears to be resistant to cotton root rot. The fruit can be used for fresh consumption and has been used to make juice.

In addition to selecting varieties which are resistant to disease, select healthy vigorous plants that have the ability to grow and develop. Before planting a tree, check the roots to make sure they are free of galls or knots which would indicate the presence of nematodes or crown gall. Ends of the roots should not be, torn or damaged. Clip damaged roots 1/2 inch behind the damaged portion.

TEXAS FmHA AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT FINANCING IN FY '78 A RECORD \$525 MILLION:
 TEMPLE, TEXAS — November 14 — The Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), the rural credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, reported that its loans and grants for rural development in Texas during fiscal year (FY) 1978 a record high of \$525 million — 43 percent above the FY 1977 level, according to W.H. Pieratt, State Director.
 Of the \$525 million, 98 percent of which are loans repayable with interest, over \$345 million are farm loans. Housing loans accounted for almost \$96 million, over \$50 million went for community facilities improvements and more than \$33 million were

used for business-industrial financing.
 Pieratt cited these highlights:
 —Farm credit. FmHA in Texas made 10,299 farm loans, including more than 5,000 emergency loans to farmers and ranchers hit by natural disasters or economic emergency. Emergency loans totaled more than \$223.2 million. Other services included over \$121 million to individual family farmers for ownership, operation and improvement of their farms. A new economic emergency farm loan program, enacted in August, began with \$920 thousand of loan approvals in September. Under this program, FmHA nationwide is authorized to carry up to \$4 billion in loans through May 15, 1980.
 —Housing. FmHA

made 3,268 loans totaling \$63.2 million to families of low and moderate income for home ownership or improvement, and over \$32 million in loans for 79 multi-family apartment projects in rural towns throughout the state. FmHA housing programs are available in rural areas, towns up to 10,000 population, and in non-metropolitan areas of up to 20,000 population where other credit is not available.
 —Community facilities. FmHA provided more than \$42.4 million in FY 1978 to build or improve water and sewer systems in approximately 123 towns and rural areas in Texas. Loans for other types of community facilities, such as medical and community centers and fire departments, added over \$7 million to the agency's

community facility programs. Facility projects may serve countryside and towns of up to 10,000 population.
 —Grants for comprehensive planning in rural areas were issued to 8 state, local and area planning bodies during FY 1978.
 —Business and Industry. FmHA's guarantees of commercial lenders' loans to businesses and industries employing rural people rose from \$15.8 million in FY 1977 to over \$33.4 million in FY 78. A loan level of \$45.1 million is budgeted for the current fiscal year. Grants totaling \$415 thousand were made last year to local public bodies for improvement of rural industrial sites. During that time, the program provided an estimated 2,144 new jobs in rural areas and saved an estimated 2,160

To make FmHA more responsive to local needs and plans, and to avoid duplication of facilities in an area, groups of counties served by FmHA district offices will generally have the same boundaries as sub-state planning districts."
