

Received another "Letter to the Editor" on Tuesday morning and thought I would include it in the column this time. Dcar Editor:

While visiting in the Lake Leon area over the weekend, I had the pleasure of reading your newspaper. Mr. Sutton's letter and the paper's response was most interesting to me. When you say that you never attempt to influence the ader's thinking; just express your own thoughts. You must be kidding. Local hometown papers do more to mold opinions than any other news media. In a small town like Gorman, your readers hang cn every word and in Mr. Sutton's case, picture. To show how much weight people give the local paper; back in March a small Central Texas Weekly Paper mistakenly reported that Daylight Savings Time would go into effect in the month of March instead of April and not only did the readers accept the information as true but a raher large number of other newspapers ricked up the "story" and printed it as straight news without even running a correction The great newsman William Allen White is quoted as observing that a nerfarious fellow newspaper man had contributed to journalism "the great talent of a meat packer, and the morals of a money changer and the manners of ar undertaker."

Everyone is urged to go to the polls and vote for the man of your choice. -GP-


JIM THOMPSON **BURIED HERE** ON TUESDAY



Daylight Savings Time begins Sunday, April 24 at 2:00 a m. Clocks and watches should be set forward one hour and the best time is to do this before retiring Saturday night. We corrected our goof we made in announcing the time

change in February. The error was made in a newspaper taking their information from the 1977 Texas Almanac, which read on page 152: The subsequent calendars were calculated principally from basic data in he U. S. Naval Observatorys

Almanac, the American Ephemeris and Nautical Almanac. They were adapted for use in Texas on the basis of Central Standard Time, except for the period from 2 a, m. on the last Sunday in February until 2 a. m. on the last Sunday in October, when Daylight Savings Time which is one hour earlier


Eastland Pecan School Friday



During the afternoon, participants will have the opportu-nity to practice their skills. Local pecan growers will assist with the practice session and demonstrations.


The growers association will have budwood and graftwood of some of the best adapted varieties for sale at the school. Budding tape will also be available for participants to purchase.





Eastland County crop and livestock producers will have an opportunity to complete a training program leading to certification as private applicators at a program schedulcd for 6:30 p. m. at the Gorman School auditorium in Gorman Monday night, April 25, according to DeMarquis Gordon, County Extension Agent. The Private Applicator Certification Training Program, one of the optional means of qualifying for certification as a private applicator of restricted-use pesticides, includes a discussion of laws, labels and labeling, pesticide safety, mixing and calibration and pests and pest damage identification. The program prepared by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service includes a review of certain questions relating to the information presented. The program will require approximaely 31 hours. Those attending and seeking certification as private applicators will have an opportunity to complete a Request for Private Applicator Certification which will be forwarded to the Texas Department of Agriculture for issuance of certification. As an alternative to partici-


