James Brown was killed when his car overturned and landed on top of him late Monday night about seven miles north of Gorman.

James Harold Brown, 46, was pronounced dead at the scene at 10:45 p.m. by Justice of the Peace, Pat Ingram. Gorman police said Brown was traveling north on Highway 571 on his way home to Lake Leon after visiting his brother in Gorman. After losing control of his car, he was thrown from it as the vehicle overturned and pinned him beneath it. Police said a wrecker was dispatched to help lift the car off him. There were no other occupants in the car and no' other vehicles involved in the accident, police said.

## -GP-Rockhounds pluck gemstones on ranch

BY GORDON M. QUARNSTROM

ALPINE, Tx.-Near this West Texas community is one of the unusual ranches of the Southwest. Owned by Frank Woodward Jr., the spread has the expected cattle, but it has a veritable bonanza of gemstones, as well.

Woodward is a former consulting geologist turned cattle rancher and lapidary. His ranch has produced

more than 70 varieties of stones prized by rockhounds, with cuttings which have wound up in expensive jewelry and in museum exhibits.

On the Woodward ranch are all kind of agates, in-

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Woodward's ranch is visited by thousands of rockhounds annually, for here they can select their stones and weigh them in at 35 cents per pound. Woodward even will inspect your rocks when you return from a scouting trip and will charge you only for those of real value.

"You can keep the others," he says. "I'm glad to have them off the ranch."

Woodward's ranch is on a volcanic lava flow. Over the centuries groundwater seeped into underground cavities and carried dissolved silica and minerals from the surface. These hardened and crystallized into nodules. When cut open, they show the colorful designs which distinguish the Woodward agates and opals.

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

Recent changes to the social security law reduced the duration of marriage requirement from 20 to 10 years. The law has also been expanded to include divorced husbands.


