We will increase our advertising rates from 75 cents per column inch to 85 cents per column inch effective the first of September. Q. At sundown, should I drive with my parking lights on and then later turn on the headlights?—P. L., El Paso

A. Never drive with just your parking lights on because others may think the car is parked. As the name implies, parking lights are meant to be used when you have to park on an unlighted road at night. The law requires you to switch your headlights on a half hour after sunset and leave them on until a half hour before sunrise.

Q. I like to have music playing while I'm driving. Is it dangerous to wear stereo headphones and listen to music while driving a car?-S. B.,

A. It could be very dangerous, especially if you are driving in city traffic or on the expressway where you must be particularly alert to the driving conditions around you. Not only does loud music tend to take your concentration off the road, but it prevents you from hearing horns and sirens. Even driving with your radio and air conditioner on and your windows rolled up could impair your hearing enough to be hazardous. If you do use earphones or play the radio loudly, try to compensate by keeping your eyes moving. Use your rear view mirror and turn your head to see all possible hazards that may develop.

Q. While driving in a west Texas rural area, I saw a tractor with no license plates on the highway. My friend says that is legal. Is he right?—H. S., Odessa

A. Your friend is right. According to Texas law, tractors and other farm vehicles do not have to display a license plate if they are being operated temporarily on the highways. They also do not have to be inspected when driven temporarily.

As presently drawn the new facilities would be immediately adjacent to the old jail, which is invisioned to become a historical site since



The present jail was constructed in 1897 and remodeled in 1934. Originally designed for a capacity of 24, and facility currently has a bunk capacity of 34. In a 1977 inspection by the Texas Commission on Jail Standards, the old facility meets or exceeds 124 mandatory items, and does not meet 53 recommended

The county has been granted tentative variances based on constructing a new jail by October, 1979, by Federal Judge Leo Brewster.





Ways To Deal With Weeds Weed killers act in various ways. A selective weed killer will affect some kinds of plants but not others. Nonselectives kill all or nearly all plants with which they come in contact.

Pre-emergence chemicals prevent the weed seed from sprouting for four to six weeks and are safe to use around many other plants.



WEEDS LIKE THESE don't like weed killers or rakes. Post-emergence weed killers, the most widely used type, may be selective or nonselective. A wide-spectrum weed killer can be used to clear an entire area that has no desirable plants. After the weeds are killed, destroy all dead material, then use a residual control to keep the site free of weeds.

A new authority on garden care, the 672-page Reader's Digest-Illustrated Guide to Gardening, an easy-to-read book available at bookstores, points out that modern weed killers can control most garden weeds but can also harm nearby plants. A few minute's work with a hoe or a rake on a dry day, repeated as often as new weeds appear, is often a safer way of dealing with weeds growing near ornamental plants. Close mowing of grass for two consecutive seasons will usually eliminate most perennial weeds.

By and large, whether you use chemical or cultural methods, where there are weeds, there are usually ways to get rid of them.

These are minimum values. In cooler areas of the country, additional insulation above these values should be considered.

2. Double glazing (two panes of glass separated by a sealed air space) cuts heat transfer by 40 to 50 percent. In extremely cold regions, nomically justified.

3. Single-glazed windows (even those of high quality and in good repair) should have storm windows. A wood or metal frame storm window provides a second thickness of glass and a layer of still air that reduce fected by a dry environment. heat loss.

STRAIGHT FACTS ABOUT SEWING ON BIAS

It's the year for skirts and shawls and soft, drapy things. The skirts get their shape from bias-cut fabric, such as the one illustrated, or from gathers at the waist, a la dirndl. The shawl is dramatic as well as comfortable. The

scoop neck T-shirt completes the outfit, but it's a "T" with a difference -- the sleeves are cuffed. Use cotton knit for the top, woven or knit fabric for

the skirt and shawl. The secret of sewing woven bias fabric is a light touch: as little handling as possible in order to avoid stretching the diagonal yarns. Also, when laving the pattern on the fabric, be sure each

so that the grainlines will slant alike. Otherwise, each section will take on different shading. After basting, pin waistband on a padded hanger and allow skirt to hang overnight. Next day check for puckers. If any appear, snip

area. Smooth out seam and re-When machine stitching, use a shorter stitch than ordinarily used for woven fabric. Make a practice run on two layers of bias-cut fabric

with 12 to 14 stitches per inch. During permanent stitching, gently hold fabric in front and back of needle so that stitches will respond with fabric yarns when seam is under tension during wear. Stitch from bottom to top: from widest part to

narrowest. Now the zipper. First, preshrink the closed zipper by dunking it in hot water and allowing it to air dry. Meanwhile, to keep the bias seam from stretching. stabilize it by centering and stitching seam binding on

the seamline of each side of the zipper opening. Machine-baste the opening. Clip basting every two inches. Press seam open. Pin and baste zipper in place,

being sure to ease zipper to the opening. Turn to the outside and use a hand-picked stitch for the final step. Use a single strand of thread and a #8 or #9 hand-sewing needle. Bring needle through to surface from underneath. Take a stitch back one yarn of fabric and bring needle forward about 1/16th of an inch to 1/8 inch. 





petroleum production in the county has been calculated at \$17.2 million in an economic activity profile of the state's top producing counties prepared by the Dallas-based Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association.

"Texas' oil and gas industry remains the cornerstone of the economy of the state and of many of its counties," said the Association's president, H.B. (Hank) Harkins, Alice, independent producer and drilling company executive. "It is imperative that the state maintain taxing and regulatory policies which will* encourage the growth of this industry."

Eastland was one of 201 counties last year which produced petroleun with marketed value of \$100,000 or more. The county ranked 129th in the estimated total value of petroleum produced. The Association has computed that some \$7.4 million came from production of 821,000 barrels of crude oil, with approximately \$9.8 million MCF of natural gas. Payments last year to owners of royalty in the county were calculated at \$2.2 million.

While paying local, county and state property taxes, producers in the county also helped support state government through production tax payments estimated at \$1.1 included million \$341,000 from crude oil output, \$734,000 from natural

According to the Texas Employment Commission, during 1977 some 260 employees worked for the industry in the county. The reported payroll amounted to

an estimated \$2.3 million. The search for additional petroleum continued in Eastland County last year. Oil

and gas developers spent an

estimated \$17.7 million in the drilling of 262 wells, including 22 classified as wildcats. Some \$3 million of that amount was lost in 68 dry holes. The 194 strikes included 160 oil wells and 34 gas wells.

Processing also contributed to the county's petroleumrelated economy through the operation of four natural gasoline processing plants with a combined daily capacity of 20.3 million cubic feet.
