





FORT BLISS CELEBRATES 100 YEARS

Restoration of historic Magoffins ville Post, which housed early mili-tary contingents garrisoning the western tip of the Texas frontier, will highlight the Fort Bliss-El Paso Centennial, November 5-7.
The adobe structure, to be dedicated November 5, is a gift to the Army by etizens of El Paso. During the course of the Centennial, it will house 4,600 square feet of rare military equipment and mu-

rare military equipment and mu-seum piece exhibits.

Fort Bliss, nucleus today of a vast Antiaircraft Artillery and Guided Missiles Center, originated in detachment of the Third Infantry, first organized as a Pennsylvania regiment in 1784, to the mountain gap that once afforded the only all-year overland route to California. The regiment encamped on the Rio Grande in a region of deserts and mountains where the westernmost tip of Texas touches the borders of Mexico and New

A community has existed near the site of El Paso since the con-quistadores first trudged through nearly four centuries ago. Since nearly four centuries ago. Since that time, trails of conquest, adventure and commerce, blazed by peoples of four nations, have met and crossed at this point. It is the center of an arid plains area, extending for hundreds of miles around, broken only by flat desert tablelands.

Existence in rude adobe shelters

Existence in rude adobe shelters, within range of hostile Indians was

the lot of Army veterans and pio-neers who first went to El Paso neers who first went to El Paso. Life at the desert outpost meant subsistence on whatever salt pork and beans escaped spoilage enroute from New Orleans, drinking muddy water and bathing in a muddy river. Since the nearest lumber was at Las Vegas, El Paso floors and buildings of this early date was largely of mud or brick. Primitive as it was, the old Fort Bliss was considered a preferred station through the Army, the center of outstanding social activities

ter of outstanding social activities ter of outstanding social activities in the southwest. Many noted mili-tary men, who were later to win fame in their country's service, among them the late General John

among them the late General John J. Pershing, received much of their training at this station.

The "Camel Train," the Army's first experiment with "ships of the desert," brought from the Mediteranean by Jefferson Davis when Secretary of War, passed through Fort Bliss in the summer of 1857. Starting from Cape Verde, Texas, the caravan moved up the Rio Grande to Albuquerque and after various delays enroute westward in the vicinity of Bakersfield four in the vicinity of Bakersfield four nonths later.


Once the Army's greatest cavairy post, Fort Bliss was thus officially designated in 1854 in honor of William Wallace Smith Bliss, Chief of Staff to General Zachary Taylor in the Mexican War. First permanent quarters were built on the second ground occupied by Fort Bliss near Concordia Cemetery but the nost was twice removed herause. Bilss near Concordia Cemetery out-the post was twice removed because of floods. The present site, seven miles northeast of downtown El Paso on a high flat, La Noria Mesa, was acquired in 1915.



CROP Organizing In **Eastland County**

The Christian Rural Overseas Relief known as the C R O P was organized in August 1947. It is sponsored by Church World Ser-vice of Protestant Church, the Luheran World Relief and Catholic

CROP was organized to furnish a channel through which all rural people who desired to do so could take part in overseas relief, and rehabilitation by giving pro-ducts from their farm. It is a selfliguidating program and operated last year at an overhead cost of four & seven-tenths percent. Crop gets a certain amount of material which is unsuitable for overseas shipment. It should be understood by the donor that such material may be transferred into suitable material for shipment or used to pas freight inland and ocean. Oc-ean freight is usually reimbursed

ean freight is usually reimbursed by the government (Federal). The program is similiar to the Freedom Train which picked up donations earlier in the year over the United States. During the first eight months of operation ma terials valued at \$2,350,000 were sent overseas. The bulk of the dona tion was wheat from the midwest on was wheat from the midwes

The plan is set up for the south through a southern advisory committee made up of church and agicultural leaders, press represena-ives and other public spirited peo-ple who make a canvas of the

grains, soy beans, peanuts, dried fruit, preserves, raw cotton, wool, canned meats and dairy products. Fats and vegetable oils and raw materials for fabrics are needed. Seeds will help the people to help hemselves.
