Peanut Planting -**Nears Completion** In Most Areas

Peanut planting went forward actively in most peanut growing areas of the southwesern states during the past week, the south-wes area office of the U. S. De-partment of Agriculture's Production and Marketing Administration

reports.

Planting neared completion the southeastern states and the Virginia-Carolina area, bu dry soil still delayed seeding in some Texas and Oklahoma sections. Earlier plantings came up to good stands, but some farmers had to replant. Seed peanuts sold lower at mostly 20 cents per pound, treated.

Shelled peanut markets held a-

Shelled peanut markets held about steady, despite slow demand for peanuts and sharply lower peanut oil prices. Shelled No. 1 Spanish peanuts sold in the southwest at mainly 17 cents a pound. 
