



ACT assessment is \$8.50 It takes students about three hours to complete the ACT assessment's four exams (English, math, social studies, and sciences). In order that students may be familiar with the character and format of test items and responses, a copy of a full-length test booklet has been sent to all high schools. This booklet is available to interested students through the Counselor's Office. Students who wish copies of additional tests may obtain them upon request from ACT at cost.

Glover said the test scores provide an assessment of general educational development, while the questionnaire information focuses on academic and nonacademic accomplishments and interests, as well as career and educational plans.

ACT Assessment information is also used by colleges for academic advising, admission counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services, and institutional research. Students' ACT Assessment reports are sent only to those colleges specifically designated by the respective stu-






