The tourney will begin with the Strawn Girls playing the Carbon Girls at 10:00 on

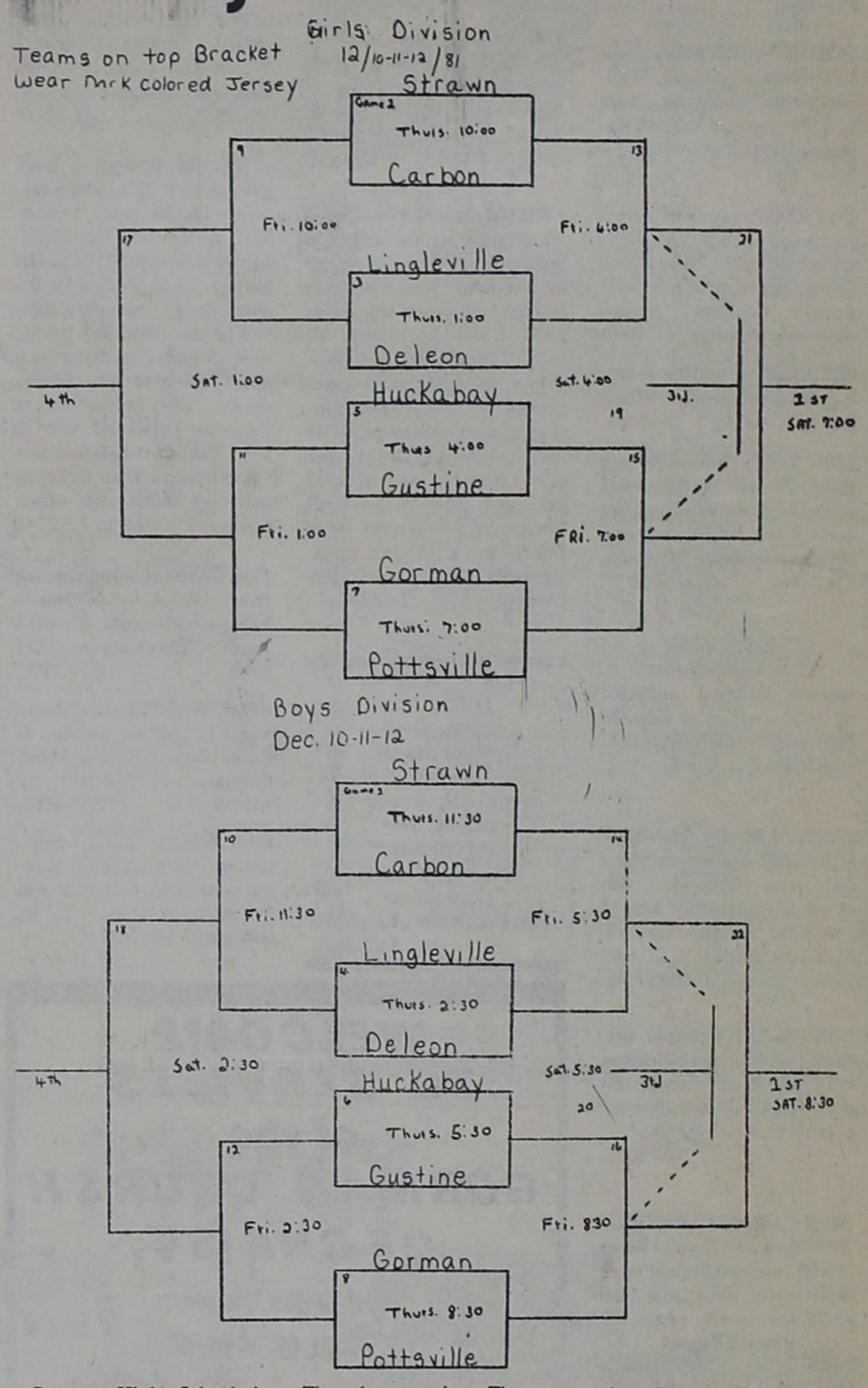

GORDON SPOT

Of about 200 important food plants known to us, only a handful were in this country prior to civilization. These few include pecans, blueberries, wild strawberries and sunflowers. As time evolved, other plant varieties like corn, wheat, and just about everything else were brought here by the migrating inhabitants.

Among those few native food plants only the pecan is important in Eastland County. Perhaps that is the reason pecan growers in Eastland County held the first county pecan show in Texas 29 years ago. There have been pecan shows every year since and about 40 other counties have followed the example.

We can not think of pecan shows or even pecans without remembering one of the pioneer growers who helped to organize the first pecan show and served on the state committees to organize regional and state pecan shows. That person was Mr. Ben B. Freeman of Ranger.

Last Wednesday, Mr. Freeman called to say he would not be able to help with the county pecan show this year. The next day he died. It will be difficult to have the pecan show without him, but we will continue as he would want us to, and have the best pecan show ever.

The pecan show will be next weekend, December 11 and 12 in the county courthouse lobby.

We would like to encourage everyone who grew pecans in 1981 to enter a sample in the show. A sam-

ple consists of 43 pecans of any one variety. They may be left at the county agent's office anytime before 4:00 p.m. on December 10.

Ribbons will be given to exhibitors of all first, second, and third place entries. There will be a class for the smallest pecan. A class will be made for any variety if there are at least two entries of that variety.

Plaques will be awarded to the Champion In-Shell, Champion Shelling and Champion native pecans. Rosettes will be given to the Reserve Champions in the above mentioned groups. If you would like a list of pecan show rules contact our office.

The pecans will be processed by Eastland Chamber of Commerce members and County Pecan Grower members on Friday morning. The entries will be judged Friday afternoon by Extension Service Horticulturists and specialists.

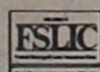

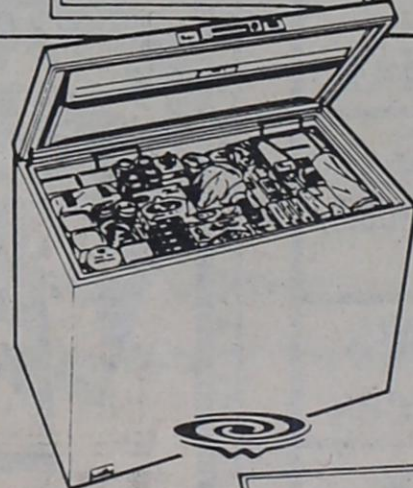

Entries may be left at the County Extension Office at any time between now and December 10th.

Gordon expects a large number of entries because of the large crop this year. The purpose of the show is to encourage production of high quality nuts and to promote one of Eastland County's most famous food products.

Bake Show

RULES ANNOUNCED
A Pecan Bake Show will be one of the many highlights at the 29th annual Eastland County Pecan Show, next week on Friday, December 11th.

The public is urged to enter some of their homebaked pecan goodies in the bake show. The Eastland Extension Homemakers Council is offering a special prize this year in addition to the ribbons and cash awards which are made available by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce. An engraved silver tray will be presented to the Grand Champion winner and Reserve Grand Champion winners in the Adult division of the Pecan Bake Show.

The general rules of the Pecan Bake Show are as follows:

GORMAN PROGRESS, DECEMBER 10, 1981

- follows:
Adult Division
1. There shall be 6 division of products with a requirement of:
a. Pies - must enter one whole pie
b. Cakes - must enter one whole cake
c. Candy - must enter at least 12 pieces
d. Nut Bread - must enter one whole loaf
e. Cookies - must enter at least 12 cookies
f. Snacks - must enter whole recipe or ample portion for judging and display. Food entered as a snack cannot be entered in the above 5 baked food divisions. Suggested pecan snack items would include: coated or salted nuts, party appetizers, etc.
2. Recipes should accompany all bake show entries.
3. All entries must contain pecans. No refrigerated items and no food products made with mixed will be accepted.
4. Anyone, man or woman, from Eastland County may enter products in the show.
5. All entries must be entered and in place by 11 a.m. Friday December 11 when the judging will begin in the Courthouse Lobby.
6. The judges will be trained in Home Economics.
7. Score cards will be used to judge entries in all 6 division and cash prizes and ribbons award according to score. Cash awards shall be as follows: 1st-\$2.50, 2nd-\$1.50; 3rd-\$1.00.
8. There will be a Grand Champion and a Reserve Champion for the whole show. Cash awards shall be as follows: Champion - \$7.00, and Reserve Champion - \$4.00.
9. Entries in the adult pecan bake show division will be returned to their owners between 4 and 5 p.m. on Friday, December 11th. Pecan Bake Show entries not claimed by 5 p.m. on Friday, December 11th will be sold to the public and money will go to the Extension Homemakers Council treasury fund.
9. One piece of prize winning entries shall remain and be on display to the public during the remainder of the show.
All pecan bake show entries should be entered on disposable plates, foil, or paper, or pieces of stiff cardboard. All products need to be covered with clear plastic wrap.
All cash awards and ribbons are sponsored by the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

The Eastland County Pecan Grower's Association and the Eastland Extension Homemakers Council will be sponsoring a Pecan Centerpiece division at the 29th annual Eastland County Pecan Show. The Pecan Show will be in the Eastland County Courthouse Lobby.

The centerpiece division will feature both an adult and youth division.

The general rules are:

Adult Division

1. There will be 3 prizes given to the top three entries. 1st-\$5.00; 2nd-\$2.50; 3rd-\$1.50.
2. All entries must have in the arrangement: pecans or

part of the pecan plant such as the leaves.

3. Anyone, man or woman from the county, may enter an arrangement in the show.
4. All entries must be entered and in place by 11:00 a.m. when the judging will begin on Friday, December 11th.
5. The arrangements must remain in place until noon Saturday, December 12th. Arrangements must be claimed no later than 12 noon

on Saturday, December 12th. 6. Centerpieces and arrangements must be original and created in 1980.
