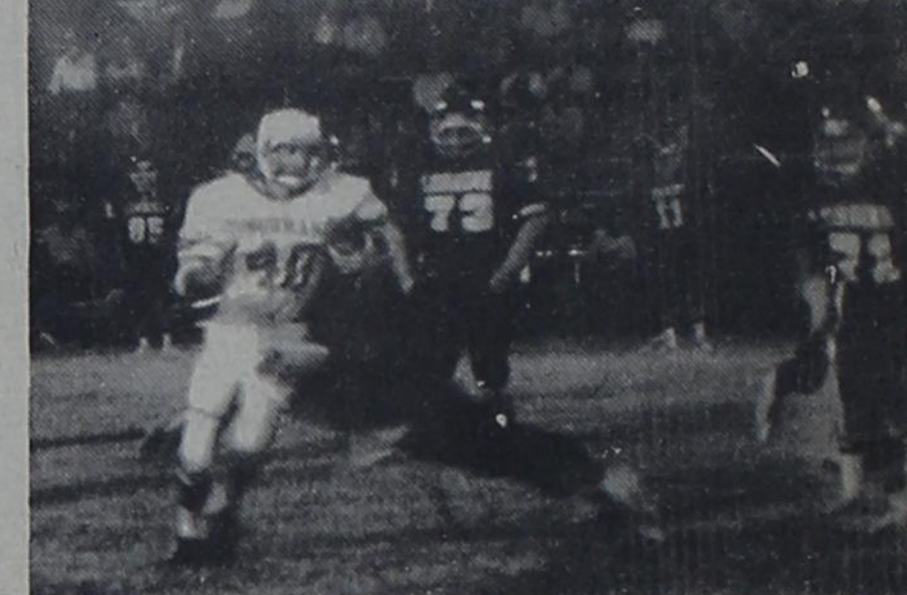
Panthers Beat Loraine Play Elks Friday

The Panthers boarded the bus for a journey all the way to milemark 225 on Friday night, and that exit happens to be the Loraine exit.



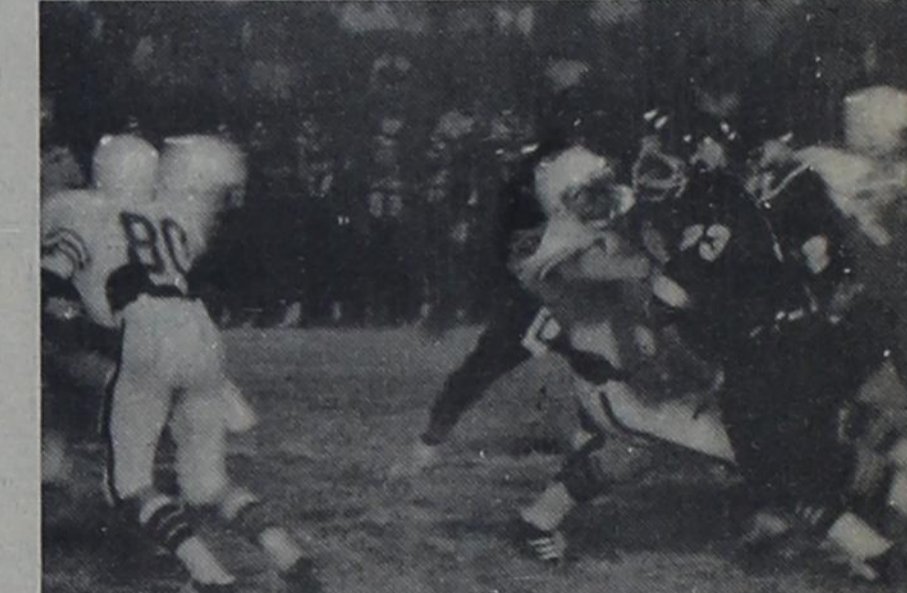

Then with 10:04 left in the final stanza Loraine scored on a 33 yard pass. Again the extra point try failed and the score read 38-12.

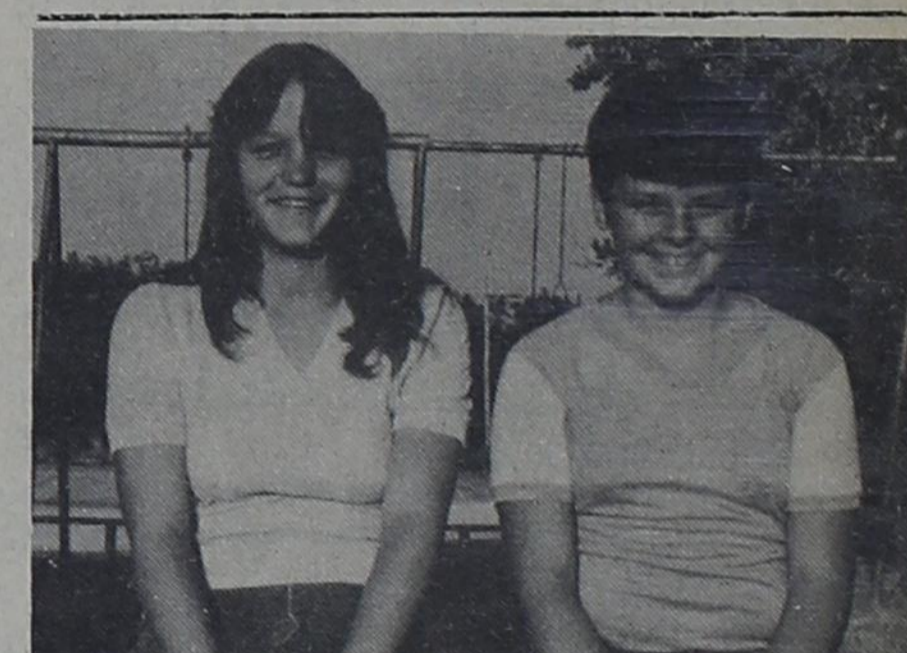
The Panthers scored their final touchdown with 4:36 left in the game when Eddie Pettit scored.

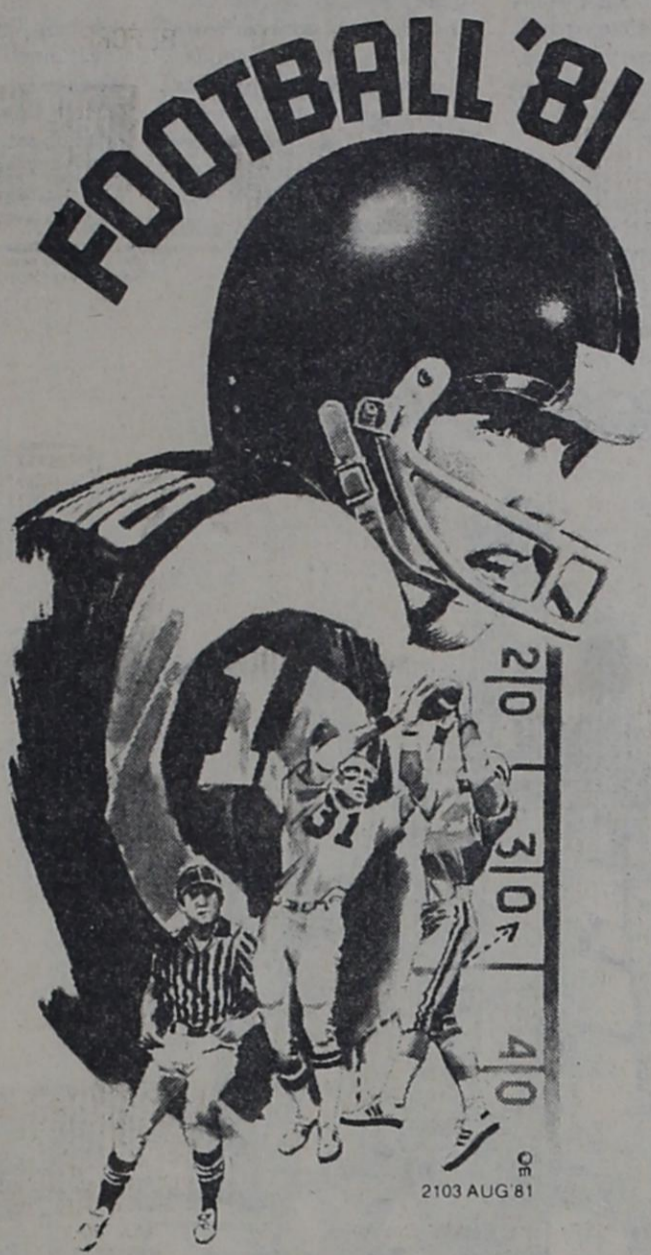

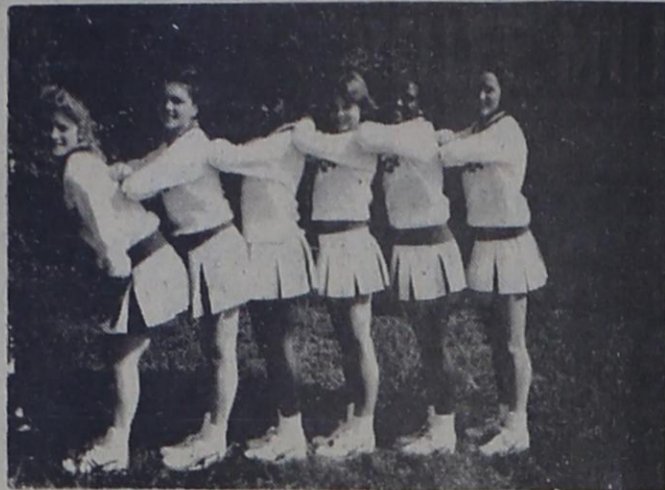

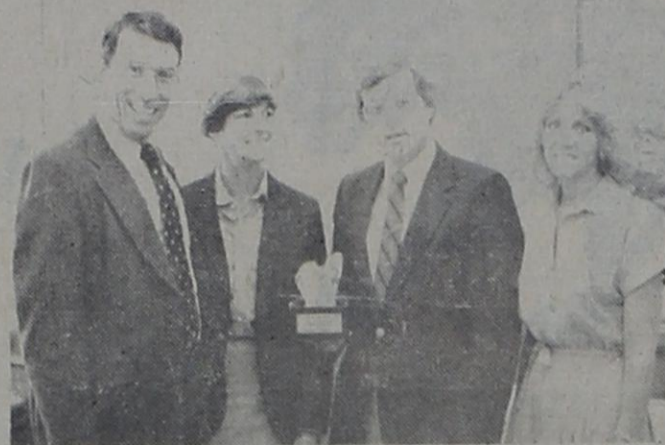

- 1 - 16 oz. carton lowfat yogurt
 - 3/4 cup coconut flakes
 - 1/3 cup frozen orange juice concentrate, defrosted
 - 3 ripe bananas, (one mashed, 2 sliced)
 - 1 - 20 oz. can pineapple chunks, drained
 - 1 ripe Calavo papaya, peeled, seeded and cubed
 - 1/4 cup almond slivers
- Mix together yogurt, coconut, orange juice concentrate and one mashed banana. In parfait glass, layer one-third of banana slices, papaya cubes and pineapple chunks. Spoon one-half of yogurt mixture over fruit. Repeat fruit, then yogurt and fruit again. Sprinkle with almonds. Makes 8 parfaits.
