

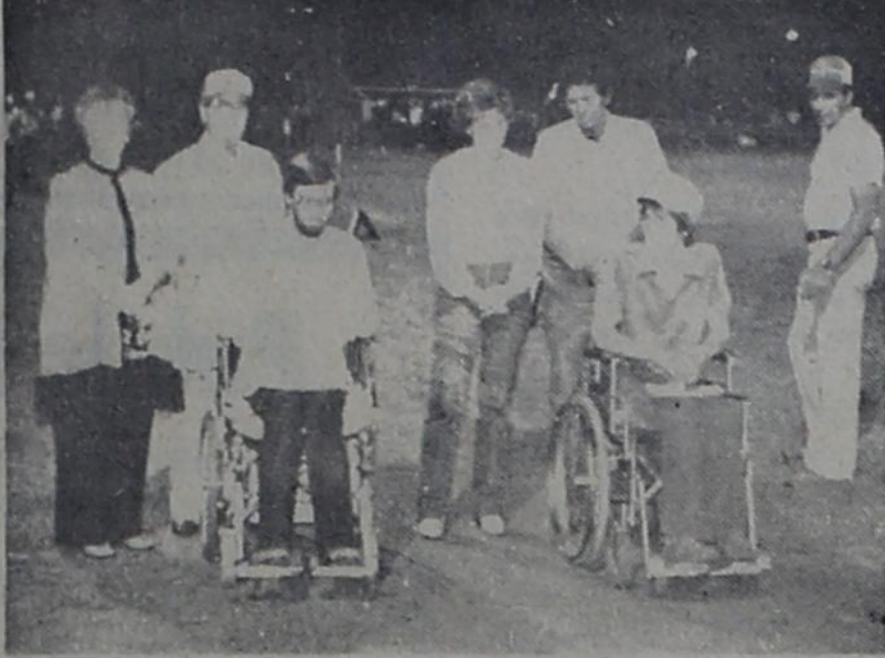

Mrs. Kinney, who became a licensed funeral director and embalmer in 1932, was a pioneer woman in West Texas funeral service. She was associated with the family-owned and operated business until her death. She was member of First Baptist Church in Stamford and was a longtime member of Stamford Business and Professional Women's Club.

She was preceded in death by two sons, James Earl, who died in early childhood, and George L., a partner and associate in the family business, who died in 1977.

Survivors include two daughters, Sue Stigler of Stamford and Kathryn Arnold of Bedford; a daughter-in-law, Mrs. George I. (Doris) Kinney of Stamford; two sisters, Claire Daily of Olney and Hannah Timmons of Houston; three grandchildren, R. D. Ross Jr. of Hurst, Donna Kay Cole of Granbury and Suelen Stigler of Weatherford; and six great-grandchildren.

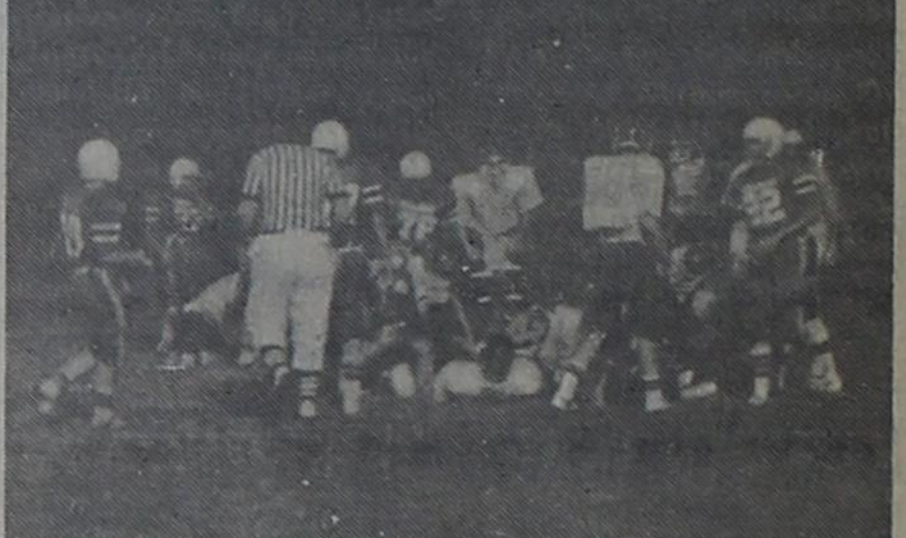

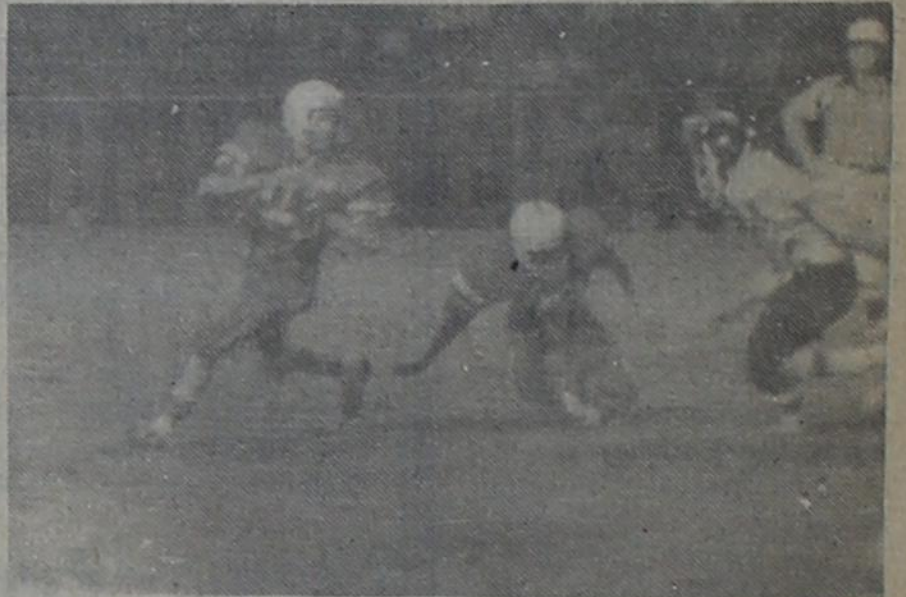

The Elks took the kickoff and started a drive of their own from their 34. It took 10 plays to score the TD with Daren Standard getting the final yard after an interference penalty against Gorman set the Elks up at the 1 yard line. Standard added the two pointer and the score was tied with 7:23 left in the half.

The two teams exchanged possessions and then the Panthers took the ball on their own 44 and scored in 4 plays with Scotty Mauney catching a fine pass from Jeff Seaton for 30 yard pass and run play for the score with 8 seconds left on the clock. The try for two points failed and Gorman had a 14-8 lead at halftime.

Following the halftime intermission the Panthers took the ball on their 44 and moved the distance in 8 plays with Jimmy Johnson racing the final 34 yards on a beautiful run for the tally. Jimmy added the two pointer on a run and Gorman went out in front 22-8. The Big Red came back on their next possession and started a drive on their own 40 and scored in 5 plays with Jacky Johnson breaking up the middle from 12 yards out for the score with 6:41 left on the clock. A pass to Mark Swanner added the two point conversion and Gorman led 30-8. This score stood up the rest of the game and the Panthers had their first 7-A district win under their belts.

The Big Red defense did a good job of containing the Elks, allowing only 65 yards on the ground and 73 in the air. The Elks moved fairly well in the first half but the Big Red defense really held them well in the second half. All the defensive players are to be congratulated for a great job.

Jimmy Johnson led the Panthers on the ground with 194 yards on 18 carries. Jacky Johnson had a very good night getting 64 yards on 9 trips. Scotty Mauney had 53 on 9 totes. Tofoer Bond had 2 yards on 1 carry and Rodney Reeves and Eddie Pettit each had 2 yards.

The Panthers will travel to Lometa on Friday night to take on the undefeated Hornets in an important District 7-a battle. The Hornets are 6-0 and the Panthers are 4-2 for the season. The Hornets are picked as one of the strong teams in 7-A East and will be seeking their seventh win. The Big Red will really have to be ready for this one as the Hornets are stronger than they are playing very good football. This game will probably be a toss-up, but we think the Panthers will want the win bad enough to take the victory. Right Panthers? Get 'Em Big Red!

1931 - 1981 BIG RAIN I guess you contribute this article to a statement made by Willard Scott, Weather man this A.M. on NBC TV, his statement was the "flood we are having in Eastland Co today is the biggest flood in 50 year." I remember that flood very well, I was 8 years old. There is a little history of my family leading up to that flood 50 years ago. I Lucille Carter born north of Desdemona, on the old Tom Sparks Place, (today this place is owned by Dallas Jobe), in a little shack west of Jake Hammon R.R. track. My family left Eastland Co. in Fall of 1924 to go to the Cotton fields of Arizona. My father and I got sick so we moved back to Eastland Co. to a small community of Grapevine, where we lived when the depression started. In 1931, my father's health began to fail again, so we loaded the wagon with our few possessions, we had a

Model T Ford, but dady put it on blocks in 1930. We got almost to may grandfather's Silas M. Carter old place. We were going to live there, and one of our horses got sick and died, that left us with one ole mare, a young mule colt and an old cow, we called Snow Ball. We had no heating or cook stoves, where we moved from there was free gas, and the gas stoves were left. Dad had 15 cents when we moved and a wife Julia, four daughters, Winnie, Jean, Lucille, and Esther, and a small son, S.E. Jr. We were destitute, but we were fortunate to have wonderful neighbors, they gave us clothes, and each one gave us an ole hen, so we had eggs and milk. We moved in the summer of 31, and when school time came around, instead of the three older girls starting to school, we were needed to help buy food for the family our first pay check was a little white

pig, which we earned for cutting maize. The little pig when he grew, made delicious ham and sausage for the Winter months. After the Maize was cut, we started shaking peanuts for all the neighbors. Well this is when the rains came, all peanut harvest was stopped, so Mama said we could start to school this was 6 weeks after school had started, we lived in the Mountain district and there was no school and for some reason the school board transferred us to Gorman. When the Model T bus came along that dreary rainy Monday, the bus didn't have windows, it had curtains that rolled up and down, that Morning they were down, the route was the long way around, over muddy roads, when I got off the buss at Gorman I was scared, we didn't know any one and would you know before school let out the word came

TREASURER HARDING DISTRIBUTES \$25 MILLION COUNTY ROAD FUND State Treasurer Warren G. Harding announced today that early next week \$25,770,675.15 will be distributed to the 254 Texas counties. These funds are the Lateral Road Fund administered by the State Treasurer's office as allocated by the sixty-seventh legislature. The Eastland County allocation is \$97,998.59, and the fund will be used for the construction and improvement of county roads. The lateral road fund is comprised of monies derived from gasoline taxes collected at the pump.

The county allocations are based on the county square miles area, the rural population, and the county lateral road mileage. Expenditures of the funds are reported by the counties to the State Treasurer.

Treasurer Harding stated that the distribution includes money appropriated for fiscal years 1980, 1981, and 1982,

that we wouldn't be able to return home, the Leon River was out of banks. There again the nice people of Gorman took over. Mr. Ford, our principal, took my sis Jean and others to his house, they made pallets all over the floor, my sis Winnie stayed with Mr. Cooper another teacher. I cannot remember the little girls name that shared her clothes with me, during our weeks stay in Gorman.

My mother had the hardest time of all during the Wet weather she had no cook stove and she cooked for 7 on a camp fire. Dady had 3 or four acres of peanuts, and did not have a team of horses, had to depend on our neighbors for help when they weren't using their's, so we kids pulled up all those peanuts by hand, shocked them where they wouldn't rot, to wait on a neighbor's team to haul them in. Yes I can remember the Big Rain fifty years ago.

"people." Ralph and Aline Elston were visiting with Rodger and Joan Elston of Lingleville one day this week.

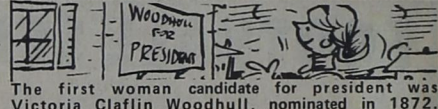
Doug Thompson of Stephenville visited one day this week with us. He also visited with Ruby, Giff and Linda Johnson.

of the reprocessing and storage facilities should bear their expense. We also believe there's an urgent need to make decisions now—so that we can plan for the future, and you can be assured of a dependable supply of electricity at a reasonable cost.
