

His prices for admission was always kept at a minimum as the youth of the community could afford to have a place to go for fun and entertainment. The Hollifields and Craddocks kept the same practice in their opeation of the theatre.

During the World War II . when gasoline was rationed and people remained in town, the theatre was filled to capacity every night.
