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

MUSHROOM ONION SAUCE FOR SPAGHETTI

1 pound fresh mushrooms 1/2 teaspoon basil leaves, crushed or 2 cans (6 to 8 oz. each) 1/4 teaspoon ground

1/4 cup butter or margarine 1/2 cup chopped onion 2 tablespoons lemon juice

black pepper 1 pint half and half 1 pound spaghetti, cooked, rinsed and drained

Rinse, pat dry and slice fresh mushrooms (makes about 5 cups) or drain canned mushrooms. In a large skillet melt butter. Add mushrooms and onion. Cook over low heat, stirring often, until mushrooms are golden, about 5 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in lemon juice. Blend in flour, salt, basil and black pepper. Gradually stir in half and half. Cook and stir until sauce bubbles and thickens, about 5 minutes. Spoon over hot spaghetti. Serve immediately. Yield: 6

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


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A flash from the past

Q: When the oil light starts glowing on my dashboard, how long can I continue driving before getting more oil? - O.A., El Paso

Turn your engine off and check the oil level with the dipstick. If no level shows, don't drive until you've added oil. A good precaution on long trips is to keep a quart of oil in your trunk. And check your oil regularly, everytime you buy gas.

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

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


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
