

A strong offensive performance led the way of Friday night as the Panthers thrilled a large homecoming crowd with a WIN OVER THE Rising Star Wildcats. The defense also did a good job of holding the Wildcats who have been explosive this year. The score in the District 7-a East zone game was 35 to 6.

The game was pretty even until the Panthers started a drive on their own 21 late in the first period. The Big Red offense moved the 79 yards in 12 plays with a fine catch by Scotty Mauney for 13 yards and a first down at the 42 of Rising Star. Scotty also added another 10 yards on a run in the drive to set the Panthers up with first down at the 34. Jacky Johnson added an 8 yard run before Jimmy Johnson ran the ball over from 2 yards out with 2:27 left in the period. A pass from Jeff Seaton to Dane Gressett addded the two pointer and Gorman led 8-0.

Legislator Pushing Tax Exemption on Livestock By DIANE BALLARD

AUSTIN - If Texas voters don't approve a tax exemption for meat and poultry, prices will continue to soar and independent producers will go out of business, Rep. Susan McBee of Del Rio said Monday.

Mrs. McBee is chairwoman of the Vote for 5 Committee, which kicked off its campaign for the proposed Constitutional Amendment Number 5 at a Monday news conference.

The amendment, which would exclude meat and poultry from property taxes, will be decided by voters Nov. 3. The proposal was passed in the last regular legislative session.

Mrs. McBee sponsored the proposal in the House and Sen. Ray Farabee of Wichita Falls in the Senate.

Currently, the tax puts Texas producers at an unfair disadvantage, Mrs. McBee said. Of the seven largest cattle-feeding states, only Texas levies an unconditional property tax on livestock, she said.

"Without passage of Proposition 5, which would remove such taxes, we fear that some Texas meat producers may conclude that they cannot afford to remain in that business," she said.

"We're already down about 30 percent from last year in pork breeding," said Ralph Oldehan of the Texas Pork Producers. "Texas is already a pork-deficient state." Taxes on livestock and poultry account for only 0.25

Of the taxing entities that would lose revenue if Proposition 5 passes, school districts in the Panhandle would be hurt the most, she said. Although entities would lose part of their tax base, they would become eligible for additional state aid, she said.

But about half of their loss would be made up by recomputing the entities' state aid formula, she said.

"Representatives from those areas have told me they would rather lose a little money but maintain a viable, healthy tax base," Mrs. McBee said.

Besides the tax hurting Texas' chances in the national market, the tax is not applied uniformly within the state, she said.

"It's a hit and miss thing," she said. "Tax assessor-collectors can't possibly count all the livestock in feedlots or out on the range," Mrs. McBee said.





Farm ponds can provide many hours of fun and lots of fish when properly managed. The number of fish a

pond will produce is limited by the amount of nutrients and food-producing organisms in the water. The smaller the pond, the smaller this food production will be. A small pond with the capacity to produce 100 pound of Catfish, stocked with 1,000 fish could only be expected to produce fish that weighed one-tenth of a pound each. Stocked with only 50 fish, the owner could expect rapid growth to about two-pounds per fish. A small pond is like a small pasture; it will support only a small number of fish if they are to grow and do well.

One hundred catfish per surface acre of water is usually recommended for farm ponds in this area. More fish may be stocked if they are to be fed regularly. It is recommended also that minnows be stocked to better utilize the food-producing organisms in the water. Normally one pond of minnows such as fathead or red horse will be sufficient for 100 catfish.

The Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District is accepting orders of stocker channel catfish and minnows through October 30, 1981. Delivery will be made early in November to 3 or 4 locations in the District. The catfish are \$25.00 per hundred and the minnows are \$6.50 per pound.



CLEMENTS WARNS AMENDMENT 4 FAILURE COULD LEAD TO FUTURE TAX INCREASES

AUSTIN - Governor Bill Clements warned Texans this week that defeat of Amendment No. 4 in the genral election on November 3 could lead to higher taxes in the future.

Clements made the remarks at a meetting of Water for Texas Committee, a statewide organization of prominent leaders who are backing the amendment, which would provide a plan for setting aside a "nest egg" from the state's budget surplus to help finance water project.

The governor was responding to published claims of some opponenets that passage of the amendment "will lead to higher taxes down the road."

"The truth of the matter is, Texans are more likely to face increased taxes if we DON'T pass Amendment No. 4," Clements declared. "That's simply because the surplus will be frittered away every two years with the help of some lawmakers opposing Amendment No. 4, and we'll end up facing a water crisis down the road that people will demand we take care of, even if it does mean a tax increase."

the proposed amendment, backed by the governor, a two-thirds majority of the Legislature and a committee prominent leaders of throughout the state, would

provide for three actions: (1) Allow an increase in interest that can be paid from the current limit of 6 percent, now preventing sale of more than \$200 million in authorized and urgently needed state bonds, to a more realistic rate of 12 percent.

(2) Create a loan guarantly program which will enable local communities to issue water project bonds at a lower rate because of backing of credit by the State of Texas.

(3) Set aside one-half of the state's budget surplus every two years to create a priority "nest egg" fund to

The peanut crop is expected to be good, but farmers in Eastland County are having a lot of problems getting the crop harvested. Just as it drys enough to get harvesting equipment in the fields, it rains again.

Some parts of Eastland County have had almost 14 inches of rain in October. This bring our total rainfall for 1981 to 30 inches or more. This is the most rain we have had in one year since 1974. Once this year's crops are harvested, you can get a jump on the next season by getting your soil tested and

then arranging for your 1982 fertilizer needs. Soil testing is one of the wisest moves a farmer can make. It provides a "blueprint" for fertilization practices for the coming

season's crops. Knowing your fertilizer Storage of pecans are very needs for the 1982 season important. may be particularly helpful this fall for several reasons. First, you may want to clean, dry and free of odors, make arrangements or conhave some air circulation, and be out of contact with tract for your fertilizer supammonia gas.
