The Housing Authority business office was moved into the lobby offices of the Hotel Apartments as of September 1, 1979, and Pat will be in the office from the 1st to the 10th of each month, then in and out as needed the balance of each month. Her telephone number at the office is 2400, if you do not reach her there call 2317 at City Hall.

The Gorman Housing Authority has a total of 66 apartments for both the young and the elderly. Brandon Place #1 was the first group built in 1962 with 12 units - Brandon Place #2 for elderly only was the second project built adjacent to Brandon Place #1. The third project was the Hotel Apartments with 20 units for elderly only built in 1968. The fourth and last group of apartments, Love Acres, has 24 units for both elderly and young.

All the above projects are under the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (H.U.D.). Since this is true the local Board must follow established rules, and regulations pertaining to each project. However there are certain advantages to this because we are now facing a great deal of expense in remodeling the older projects #1 - 2 - 3. An architect from Ft. Worth visited with Pat, Johnny and Jame Mears on Wednesday September 5th to talk about remodeling these projects. The architect as well as H.U.D. are very receptive to the idea that Project 1 - 2 - 3 should have a face lift and work has already begun to cut thru the red-

The peanuts are of the Spanish variety and have a grade of 69. The peanuts were grown on his farm west of Gorman, the former Stacy farm. Fuller has in cultivation 200 acres of runner peanuts, 40 acres of Spanish and 40 acres dry land peanuts. He has also cultivated 22 acres of watermelons and 7 acres of cantelopes which have been a very profitable crop. He had a ready market for the melons and cantelopes.

The Panthers came out on the short end of a 6 to 0 score on Friday night in their opener against the De Leon Bearcats but surely scored a moral victory as they held the bigger Bearcats to 121 yds. rushing and 79 passing and allowed only 6 points to the maroon and white. The Big Red defense really got after the Bearcats, but the offense just couldn't seem to get cranked up as the Panthers made only 91 yds. rushing and didn't complete a single pass. However, this was the first real game for some of

the players and when they get a little playing time under their belts they are going to be great. And even though we think they are great now, just wait until they get a little more playing time under actual game conditions, then the improvements will really be seen.

The lone score of the night came after the Panthers had given the ball to De Leon on the Gorman 18 yard line. They had just held the Panthers at the Gorman 2 yard

line on a great defensive effort and had taken over the ball and had moved out to the 18 before fumbling the ball and giving the Bearcats another scoring opportunity. Jimmy Lewis scored the TD on a 1 yard plunge with 3:50 left in the first half. It took 7 plays and a fourth down pass of 8 yards for a first down to keep the scoring drive alive before Lewis scored. The kick for point failed.

From there on it was as equal effort with both teams being unable to move the ball

much. Gorman had one opportunity later in the game when Jimmy Johnson returned a Bearcat punt to the De Leon 15. However, two plays later the Panthers had another costly fumble and the opportunity to score failed.

Johnson led Gorman on the ground with 59 yards on 17 carries for a 3.4 average. Larry Keith had 33 yards on 12 totes for about a 3 yd. average. Dane Gressett, quarterbacking his first varsity game had 9 yards on five keeps and did a good job despite his inexperience.

The Panther defense was led by Andy Kinsler, Kip Nemir, Harvey Bryan, Johnson, Keith, the Hogan boys, Chris and Dale, Steve Watson, Riley Curb, Bob Haggood, Danny Burgess, Ricky Files, Curtis Warren, David Pettit and Toofer Bond and Brad Lewis.

The Panthers travel to Dublin on Friday night to take on the Lions in a game that is expected to be a real battle. The Panthers will have to have a real tough effort in this game also and that's just what we expect them to turn in... a real game... and come home with a big victory to build their confidence and boost their moral for the remainder of what is expected to be a real competitive season with several good teams on our schedule.

So lets all follow our Panthers to Dublin and support them all the way for a victory. Game time will be 8 p.m.

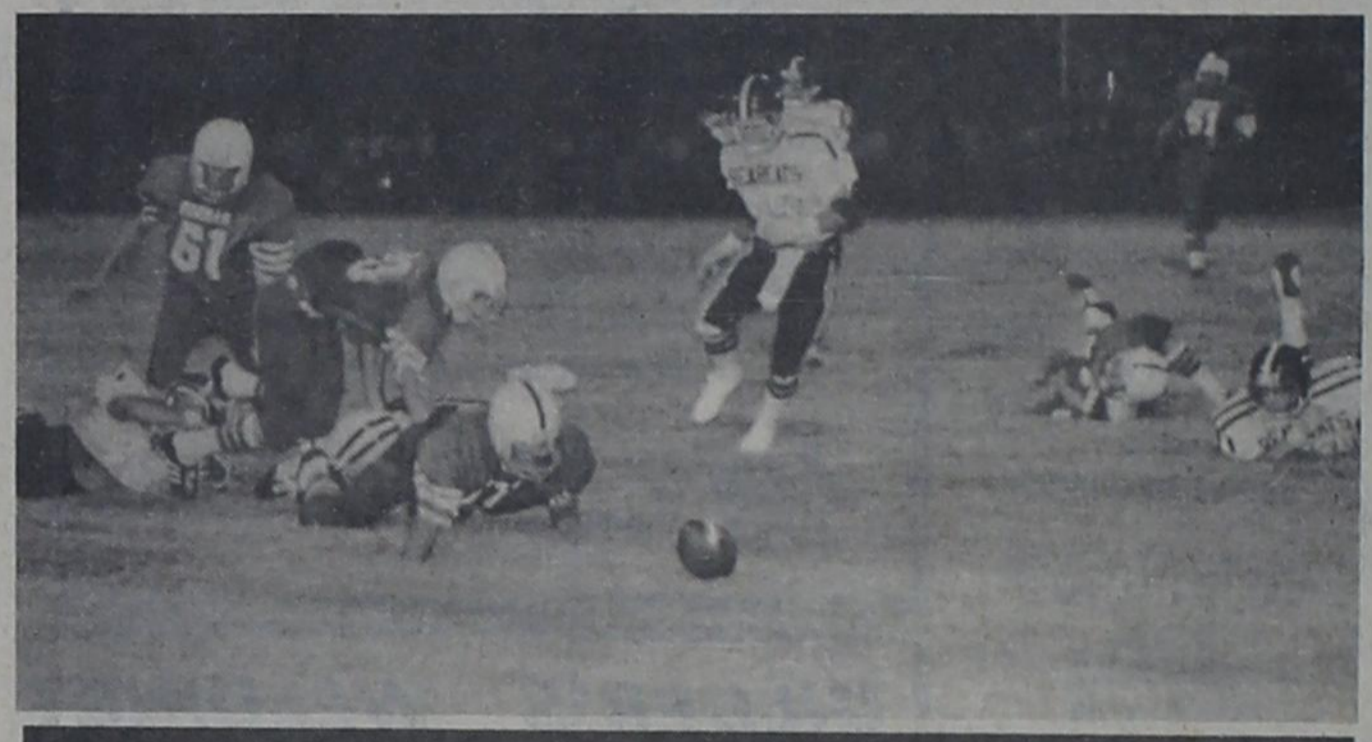

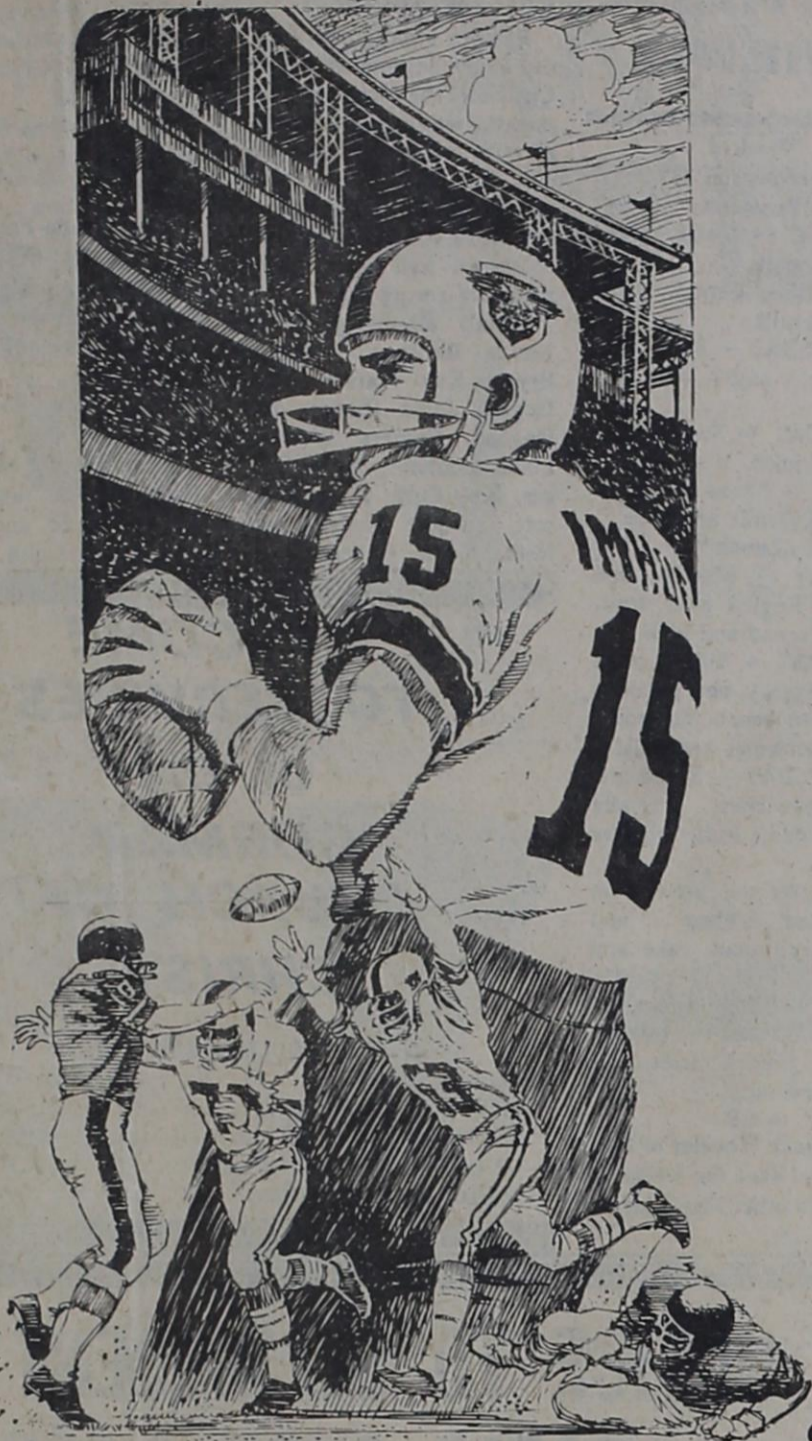

Since so much of the land has been put in cultivation the weather will get hotter in the Summer time. As the timber kept the land shaded from the Sun. That could make a difference in the rainfall that we have. Tho the rain is controlled by the wind currents. We have deserts at or near the Sea shore caused by the way the wind currents blow.

The old folks are needing relief on their gardens. As the water bills and spray for the gardens are eating the profits up. Tho that home

grown vegetables are so much better than the one bought at the store.

The office gang is still going strong. Talk about tobacco chewing. It reminds me of a goat eating briars. You see they chew so fast. It beats the way those pitchers chew when the bases are loaded and three men on base and three balls no strikes on the batter. That is in extra high gear. The worse thing I see there is very small boys come by there and they have a bag of tobacco with them. What a shame for such as that. They think it makes them important. Boys please stop it. That is a costly nasty thing to do.

Friday two boys came by with their mail pouch. Luke asked on for a chew. He gave the boy a penny and put 1/2 of pouch in his mouth and reached for more. The boy jerked it from Luke and gave Luke a sweet look. What do you think?

I read in Torch (War I Paper) where in 78 and first six months of this year 20,000 War I vets answered

the "Final Bugle Call". At that rate at the end of 1980 almost half of the remaining ones will answer that call.

The V.A. has paid many, many billions in G.I. Schooling and training to all subsequent veterans, guaranteed 150 billion in home loans. Tho War I missed on all but \$60 the day of discharge and a bonus in the 30's which was not very much.

I want to say a word about the "Honey Bee". When you see a piece of comb honey you may think those cells are round. None are round. They are all hexagon or light sides to each cell. There are three types of Bees in a hive. The Queen, she is long and narrow. Just one Queen to a hive. She can lay up to 4000 eggs per day. There are generally about ten bees that take care of her. Feed her "Royal Jelly", prune and keep her in good shape. The only thing she will sting is another Queen and kill it. When the Queen comes out of her cell the old Queen takes a swarm out and starts a new hive. The new Queen is raised in a cell about one inch long. She is fed special food to make her Queen. She leaves the hive and the drones take after her. She goes high in the air until the strongest drone follows her. They mate. The drone dies then and there. She returns to the hive and that one mating last a life time.

The Drone is a large male Bee. He neither works or sweat. In other words he is a free loader as we have people that neither work or sweats. Some time there are 100's of them in a hive. Tho as winter draws near, the workers kills almost all of them.

The smallest bees are the workers. They work themselves to death. When they first come out of their cell they work around inside the hive until they are strong enough to gather food from the flowers. When a bee finds an extra strong place for honey, it will go to the hive and do a dance. (So the scientist say) and they will know how for it is from the hive.

There are several kinds of bees. Just as cattle breeds. Italian, Black (nun), Caucasian, Hungarian. I have owned all four kinds. Ordered some Queens from Georgia, Arkansas and South Texas by Mail. If I had hive that would fight, I would go in there and kill the queen and put a new

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 108)

House Joint Resolution 108 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution relating to the appointment and terms of notaries public. The proposed amendment would: —Require the Secretary of State to appoint a convenient number of Notaries Public for the state; and —Authorize terms of office of Notaries Public of not less than two years nor more than four years.

A temporary provision of the proposed constitutional amendment provides that the amendment would take effect January 1, 1980; that each person who was appointed a notary public before January 1, 1980, would continue to serve as a notary public for the term for which the person was appointed; and that this temporary provision would expire January 1, 1982.

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 133)

House Joint Resolution 133 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to enact laws:

- To provide for legislative review of the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department;
- To prescribe conditions for rules to take effect;
- To provide for suspension, repeal, or expiration of rules;
- To prescribe procedures; and
- To delegate powers to either or both houses or to committees of either or both houses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for legislative review of

the process of rulemaking by agencies in the executive department."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Senate Joint Resolution 13 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the Legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans used to purchase farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers. The proposed amendment would allow the Legislature to provide for, issue, and sell general obligation bonds called "Farm and Ranch Loan Security Bonds" of the State of Texas not to exceed 10 million dollars. All money received from the sale of such bonds would be deposited in a separate fund with the State Treasurer and administered by the commissioner of agriculture without further appropriations. These funds would be used to guarantee loans for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate. The commissioner of agriculture would use these funds, under provisions to be prescribed by the Legislature for the purpose of guaranteeing loans used for the purchase of farm and ranch real estate, to acquire real estate mortgages or deeds of trust on lands purchased with guaranteed loans. These funds would also be used to advance to the borrower a percentage of the principal and interest due. The Legislature may also authorize the commissioner of agriculture to sell at foreclosure any land acquired in the manner authorized by this amendment. The commissioner of agriculture would be required to charge at least 6 percent interest on such loans. The proposed amendment appropriates an amount that is sufficient to pay the principal and interest on the bonds that mature or become due during the fiscal year less the amount in the interest and sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the guarantee of loans for purchase of farm and ranch real estate for qualified borrowers by the sale of general obligation bonds of the State of Texas."

Another peanut field day that will interest some growers is a fungigation demonstration at the Earl Taylor Farm northeast of DeLeon Wednesday, September 12.

This one begins at 10:00 a.m. and visitors will get a free barbecue lunch at noon. They Taylor farm is just off highway 16 near the Victor Cemetery.

Stockmen planning to feed their herds only hay this winter should be aware of differences in feeding value.

As long as hay is green and weed-free, many people think it's good. However, these are not the main factors influencing feeding value.

Protein content, digestibility and acceptability by the animal determine a hay's feeding value. Feeding value varies considerably from cutting to cutting and due to hay types.

Examination of hay for leafiness, plant maturity, texture and color give an educated guess, but only laboratory analysis or animal performance provide accurate estimates.

A producer must estimate a hay's feeding value to adequately feed his livestock instead of furnishing one bale for every three or four cows. Furthermore, underfeeding often results because producers over-estimate the feeding value of their hay.

As hay protein and total digestible nutrients decrease, the need for supplemental protein and energy for livestock increases. However, the need for salt and steamed bone meal (phosphorus) remain relatively constant.

Minerals are the only supplement needed with excellent quality hay.

Because of slower digestion, livestock can't physically eat enough poor quality hay to meet their requirements. Therefore, a analysis is a good investment for a producer who is planning on feeding only hay through the winter.

Producers may obtain information and forms for a forage analysis at the County Extension office.


