I received the following letter on Tuesday and t thought since next Tuesday will be election day that I would include it in this column. All voters should turn out for the amendment election on Tuesday, Nov. 6th.

Dear Editor:

"Proposition 3" on the Nov. 6 ballot, popularly known as the "Texas Family Farm & Ranch Security Act Program" enjoys widespread support among Texas legislators as well as endorsement by Attorney General Mark White, House Speaker Billy Clayton. State Comptroller Bob Bullock, & Texas Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong.

Designed to help to keep Texas food production, at least partly, in the hands of individual farm and ranch owners, this amendment is based on a highly successful program in the State of Minnesota which has already proven that it is possible to open the doors to agriculture to many young persons who otherwise would be forced off the land.

A family farm is generally defined as an operation managed and worked principally by the member, relatives or member-partners of a family unit. The family farm has always been the heart of agriculture in this country. but its continued existence is now threatened by the inability of young Texans to buy land to farm and ranch while more and more land goes into the hands of giant corporations and foreign ownership. Just how many loans can be made under the program in Texas is not yet known. This will depend on the size and cost of the farms the applicants want to buy. However, if we assume that the land will cost \$1,000 per acre (which is too high for some areas of the state), the \$100 million worth of guaranteed loans fiscal experts say will be possible under the Texas program would be sufficient to guarantee the purchase of more than 100,000 acres. This would be significant impact on the agriculture of Texas. (More loans could be guaranteed as payments made on the first loans Cont'd On Page 2

reduce the amount the state must guarantee freeing up more money for other guarantees).

It should be stressed that this program has built-in protections for the credit of the state which will insure that the taxpayers will not lose a penny. The first guarantee is the basic fact that the State does not loan money under this program, it only guarantees loans made by conventional lenders and the land will be security for that guarantee. Should there be a default (in Minnesota there have been none to date)--the land will be sold by the State to recover its cost. The fact that land is always increasing in value may, in fact, mean that the state will make money on the sale of any land it obtains as a result of default.

Secondly, the program has strict requirements which insure that loan guarantees go only to qualified persons who can make the payments. Applicants must, in fact, be approved by the normal lenders and meet their credit requirements before the state will even consider their application for a loan guarantee. Similarly, they must have proven skills in farming and the land must be appraised both to determine its fair price and that it can produce the income required to make the loan payments. In addition, to insure that the land is not purchased for speculative purposes, the program requires that it must be continues to be used for agricultural purposes or the loan is automatically defaulted.


These are built-in protections which should serve the public's interest while, at the same time, opening the door to farming and ranching to qualified young Texans.

Young people who want to be farmers and ranchers face numerous obstacles to that goal. Huge investment firms, foreign individuals and corporations, development consortiums and surburban sprawl have all staked claims on our finite land resources .. Similarly, spiraling land prices and, most importantly the high down payments (now averaging 29 percent) required for loans to purchase agricultural land, have literally slammed the door in the face of many young Texans who want to be farmers and ranchers. To vote YES in favor of "Proposition 3" on November 6 will be a step forward turning this situation around. Sincerely,
