Gorman residents voted in fabor of amendments one and three in balloting on Tuesday.

Only a small number of qualified voters went to the polls. A total of 56 votes were cast.

Proposed amendment No. 3 drew the strongest approval with 36 for and 10 against. Amendment No. 3 would authorize \$10 million in general obligation bonds, primarily to guarantee loans made by private lenders to individuals for the puchase of farm and ranch land.

Amendment No. 1 received 36 for and 20 against. The amendment would authorize the legislature to set the terms of notaries public at no more than four years and no less than the current two years.

Amendment No. 2 received 15 for a 39 against. The amendment would authorize the legislature to enact laws establishing procedures for "Legislative review" of the state agency rulemaking.

It has been reported that all three amendments carried statewide.

PANTHERS BLAST TOLAR

Game at a Glance Gorman Tolar 1st Downs Yds. Rushing Yds. Passing 3 of 8 Passes Comp. 1 of 3 Intercepts Fumbles 2-40 Punts, Avg. 7-37 Penalties

The Gorman Panthers took another giant step on Friday night toward the playoffs with a big 40 to 0 victory over the Tolar Rattlers at Brogdon Field. The Panthers were low key for this game and led

only 8-0 at the end of the first period, but then exploded for 20 points in the second for 28-0 lead at half time. They added 6 points in both the third and fourth periods to make the final score 40 to 0.

The Big Red scored first on their second possession following a fumble recovery on the Gorman 45 by Dale Hogan. It took 7 plays to score with Larry Keith getting the final 4 yards with 5:00 left in the first period. A pass to Riley Curb from Dane Gressett scored the 2 pointer and Gorman led 8-0.

Gorman scored again with 10:02 left on the clock on a picture perfect runback of a Rattler punt of 68 yards. Larry Keith caught the ball and had a perfect blocking wall to his right and rambled the distance for the TD. The pass try for points failed and the Big Red led 14-0.

The Panthers came right back for another score following a pass interception by Riley Curb on the Rattler 38 and returned it to the Rattler 6 yard line. The first play got 5 yards and then Jimmy Johnson got the final yard with 8:06 left in the second.

Keith added the 2 pointer on a run.

The Panther defense again set up the Big Red with an interception by Keith on the Gorman 23. The Panthers went the 77 yards in 8 plays, featuring pass plays of 15 to Curb and 23 to Johnson before Toofer Bond got the TD on a 2 yard run with 1:13 left in the half. The pass try for points failed and Gorman had a 28 to 0 lead at half time.

The Panthers scored on their first possession after the half. The drive was for 80 yards in 8 plays, featuring runs of 18 and 36 by Keith and a 16 yard run by Johnson before Dane Gressett got the final 2 yards on a QB sneak with 4:31 left in the third. The kick for PAT failed and Gorman led 34 to 0.

The final score came on another beautiful punt return by the Panthers as Johnson took the ball on his own 39 and broke up the middle behind some fine blocks then went to the right after breaking into the open and outran the defenders for the TD with 5:28 left in the game. The kick for PAT again failed and the final score was 40 to 0.

The Big Red defense did another good job, as usual, stopping the Rattlers on offense and not allowing them to score.

Larry Keith led the Panthers with 142 yards on 18 carries. Johnson had 91 on 13 carries. Toofer Bond had 22 on 5 trips. Kip Nemir had 3 on 1 carry and Gressett had a minus 3 on 3 keeps.

The Panthers will be playing for "all the marbles" so to speak on Friday night when they travel to Blanket to take on the Tigers in a must game for the Big Red for an undisputed Zone Championship. The Panthers will really have to be up for this game and will have to have one of their best games of the season as the Tigers are always tough on their home field. And with the tragic death of one of the Tiger players, Blanket will really be putting their all in this game. We feel that the Big Red will play their best game of the season and will not let the tragic event that happened hamper their play in quest of the Zone Championship. The Panthers have come a long way this season and will be playing their hearts out Friday night at Blanket. Right, Panthers?



O'Neal a retired Baptist minister of Kokomo. Burial was in Eastland Cemetery.


