

Lands At Gorman

Care Flight, a new helicopter ambulance program serving a 150 mile radius of Fort Worth-Dallas, began operations on October 1. The program is expected to serve approximately 100 counties in northern Texas and southern Oklahoma.

Care Flite is based at Harris Hospital - Methodist Hospitals in Fort Worth and Dallas. The program is operated by North Central Texas Services, a non-profit corporation formed to provide the service.



Then came the Steers first score of the night. They took the kickoff on their own 36 and went the distance for the TD in 9 plays, mostly via the pass. Darren Williams got the final 1 yard with 3:15 left in the game. The kick was blocked and the score was 20 to 6.

The Panthers then answered with another TD of their own. Following an onside kick try by the Steers, the Big Red took the ball on the Gorman 48 and scored in only 3 plays. The drive featured an amazing 38 yard run by Johnson to the Steer 6. From there Steve Spivey took the handoff, went to his left, evaded a tackler and fell in the end zone with 1:30 left in the game. A pass try for 2 points failed and Gorman led 26 to 6.

On the next series by the Steers, Larry Keith stepped in front of a Steer receiver at the Steer 45, intercepted a pass and raced the distance with just 1:10 left on the clock. The try for points failed and Gorman led 32 to

On the following kickoff the Steers got another TD when Ricky Ross returned the kick off about 75 yards for the score with about a minute left on the clock. The pass try for 2 points failed and the game ended with a score of Gorman 32 and Robert Lee 12. It was a great game for the Big Red as they went all out for the victory. The blocking and tackling was crisp and the Panthers were not to be denied a victory this night. This Friday in the Bi-District Playoff game with the Windthorst Trojans at Mineral Wells the Big Red will be up against another big team. The Panthers were marvelous on Friday night in their District playoff game with Robert Lee. The Big Red took command from the opening whistle and never let up until the final gun. Their performance brought them to a 32 to 12 victory and a District 6-B Title and the right to represent the District in the Bi-District Playoff game Friday night in Mineral Wells against the Windthorst Trojans at 7:30 at Miller Stadium.

The Panthers were simply not to be denied this victory this season as they put forth a marvelous performance and got the well-earned title. They controlled the game all the way. Jimmy Johnson had a great night from his running back spot with 212 yards on 28 trips and one of the reasons for this was the fine blocking of the men up front, but a lot of it was just pure desire as he made some very tough short yardage plays which were "must" plays to keep drives alive. His running mates, Larry Keith, Steve Spivey, Toofer Bond and QB Dane Gressett turned in fine performances also. Keith had a great night on defense with 11 unassisted tackles, plus helping on many others and also in other defensive situations. The entire squad, and let this be very clear, the ENTIRE TEAM were just great and the win was a team effort all the way.
