

An acute viral infection of the central nerveous system and salivary glands, rabies is characterized by a syndrome of excitation, depression, paralysis, coma, and death. The disease occurs in all species of warm blooded animals, but especially in mammals, and is widely distributed throughout the world. The disease occurs commonly in dogs, cats, shunks, and foxes.

In cattle, rabies is transmmitted exclusively from the bite of saliva infected rabid animals. Rabid dogs, cats, foxes and skunks are the usual vectors in the United States and when infected these animals wander widely and often fearlessly enter cattle feedlots. Being curious animals, the cattle closely approach, smell the intruding rabid animal, and frequently are bitten on the muzzle or other parts of the

Prevention programs should be administered by a veterinarian. Dogs should be immunized periodically, and prevented from free roam-

ing. Bring your pets to Gorman Milling Saturday and help keep our community free of rabid animals. Immunizations will be \$4.00 per animal.



tra bonus this September when the new fiscal year begins," stated the Senator.

The Senator went further to explain that an extra \$16.9 million would be available for distribution at that time which would represent the principle amount of lateral road funds frozen by the Governor's veto for the past two years along with the accrual of interest on that amount.

The amount of funds distributed to each county is determined on the basis of formula which takes into consideration the rural population of each county and the county road

mileages in each county. This formula would be based upon the 1980 census population and the county road mileage as of January 1, The Senator released






