J A most important decision is to be made in the near future on the peanut program as we know it now. The Reagan administration is at present planning to abolish the traditional peanut program and all peanut growers and the people connected with the peanut industry are disturbed at what the results of this decision and what it would mean to them economically. It would virtually wipe out the economy of the peanut producing areas. This decision could very easily paralize the economy of Gorman and the surrounding

areas. Ross Wilson, manager of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association, stated that indications that USDA planned such legislative changes were picked up by growers attending House Agriculture Committee Hear ings in Washington on the 18th of March. He stated meetings by growers with Under Secretary Seeley Lodwick on March 19 confirmed that the Department was considering the elimination of the allotment provision. Further, he said a meeting on the same day between Georgia Congressman Charles Hatcher and Agriculture Secretary Block confirmed the intent of USDA to proceed with such a plan.

Everyone in the peanut industry are urging all those connected with the peanut industry to contact their Congressmen, Senators, and any others who have a part in the decision to not let this type of thing kill the peanut program which has worked so well over the years.

There is more on this important decision printed elsewhere in this issue. So be sure and read the article and contact those who can do something about it.

According to Ross Wilson. Secretary of the National Peanut Growers Group, it appears that an all out effort will be made by the Reagan Administration to make major changes in the peanut program. He said that Agriculture Secretary John Block has informed Georgia Congressman Charles Hatcher and Georgia State Agriculture Commissioner Tommy Irvin that USDA will seek to abolish the peanut acreage allotment system. Such a change in peanut legislation would enable anyone who so desires to produce peanuts. Poundage quotas would also be phased out under the USDA proposal by reducing present farm quotas 10 percent per year during the period 1982-1985. The administration proposal also calls for the current quota support rate to be maintained throughout the life of the bill. The end result of the administration proposal, Wilson said, would be elimination of the traditional peanut program.

Wilson said indications that USDA planned such legislative changes were picked up by growers attending House Agriculture Committee Hearings in Washington on March 18. He said meetings by growers with Under Secretary Seeley Lodwick on March 19 confirmed that the Department was considering elimination of the allotment provision. The abolishment of the peanut allotment system would be a disaster to the farm and agribusiness segments and would result in massive curtailment of the local economy in communities throughout the peanut belt.


