

You may have noticed some equipment trucks working in various parts of town during the last week. These trucks are here cleaning a portion of the sewer system. We have been having so much trouble with some of the main sewer lines and after inspection we found that they were clogged with sand and gravel to the point that they were not allowing the sewer to flow out, thus backing up in the lines. This is the first time that the lines have ever been cleaned since they were laid. The work in coming along in good fashion and when completed, it will eliminate most of the problems that we have been encountering. There are some areas where some changes must be made in keeping sand from flowing into the lines. We also ask everyone to refrain from putting anything in to any sewer that would tend to restrict the flow.

I at last got the bad news about the Community Block Grant, which was not good. Our project graded less than four hundred on the grading scale which was well below the passing score for a grant. The process which is used to determine is a point by point grading system. 
