### SAMPLE ETTER

The following is a format to use to write your Congressman, Senators and Representatives, on the peanut situation now under consideration. Everyone is urged to write letters to their elected officials about this important issue. Dear Congressman:

We are seeking your support of an extension of the present peanut program as recommended by the nation's peanut growers.

The administration has asked for the abolishment of acreage allotments and reduction of poundage quota at 10 percent per year from 1982 through 1985. Such a program would result in a complete phase out of the traditional peanut program. Growers in this area cannot continue to produce peanuts with the marketing and price stability provided in the present program.

Peanut research folks confirm the fact that there is not alternative crop suitable to this area that will support anywhere near as many people per acre as peanuts. Therefore, loss of the present program would result in a substantial movement of people from these areas. The economic and social impact would be disastrous to our rural communities towns.

Peanut growers cooperated in 1977 with Congress to make legislative changes to reduce program costs. The 1977 act also includes the flexibility to produce the peanuts for the export market. Program costs have been reduced 69 percent since 1977 and export markets for U.S. peanuts have been greatly expanded. Both of these acheivements have occurred through the sacrifice of growers through huge cuts in quota production and by allocating addition production at low loan rates to capture export markets - at no cost to taxpayers.

We respectfully urge that you support a program with continuation of acreage allotments and quotas and a reasonable level of support for quota peanuts. Our program proposals will continue \* to reduce government costs, just as we have done for the past few years.

A small turnout of voters went to the polls Saturday to vote in the three elections held Saturday.

The City election was the only contested election with three candidates for the two places vacant on the City Commission.

Candidates for Place 3 on the City Commission were E.E. Todd and Bill Gressett. Bill received 73 votes and E. E. received 24. Ted Higginbottom who was unopposed for Place 2 on the commission received 96 votes. A total of 102 votes were cast.

In the School Election, 85 votes were cast. Candidates Troyat Underwood, incumbent received 70 votes, and Jimmy Hallmark received 68 votes. Both candidates were unopposed.

The South Eastland County Hospital Board election drew the largest number of voters with 113 votes cast. James Miears received 98 votes, Woodie Beene received 97, O.W. Pond received 85 votes and Jerry Yates received 73 votes.

Miears is the only incumbent. All candidates were unopposed.

Free tests for blood sugar, blood pressure, temperature, lung capacity, etc. will be given to anyone wishing to take them.



**FARM POND STOCKING** 

The size of your pond is the major factor that will determine what fish you need to stock. Although small pondowners traditionally want "bass in their tanks", these small ponds are not suited for good bass populations. They simply cannot produce the amount of forage required to support even a few big bass. Bass populations in small ponds invariably become "Unbalance" and poor fishing results. Channel catfish provide excellent fishing and meat for the table. Muddy ponds are not suitable for bass because bass are sight feeders. Only catfish should be stocked in muddy ponds. Crappie should never be stocked in small ponds becaused they usually become overpopulated and stunted. Forage fish are small fish which are eaten by large fish. The rate of growth and size of you catfish will depend largely upon having an adequate amount of forage fish (minnows). Sunfish such as bluegill provide good forage for bas but are faster swimmers than catfish. Fathead minnows are slow swimmers and provide good forage for catfish but will be quickly consumed and elimiated by bass.

Stock 100 channel catfish fingerlings per surface acre if the fish are not going to ged the fish are not going to be fed with commercial catfish food daily. Stocking two pounds of fathead minnows per acre will provide an imprved food supply and increase the rate of growth.

TESC TO PROVIDE FINANCIAL INCENTIVES TO REPLACE COOLING

**EQUIPMENT** Texas Electric will begin a program April 15 to provide financial incentives to encourage customers to relace worn or obsolete air conditioning and water heating equipment with

energy-efficient equipment. Details of the program will be available at that time.

"the goal of our Residential Load Management Program will be to hold down electricity price increases by holding down the number of new power plants we have to build," said TESCO President Bill Marquardt.

Equipment with a higher EER (Energy Efficiency Ratio) rating costs more than equipment. lower-rated Therefore, to encourage customers to buy energy-saving equipment, TESCO will pay part of the difference in cost, he said.

"We will be actively encouraging our customers to install this equipment because this is an effective way to slow the rate of growth in the need for electricity during the summer 'peak load' season," Marquardt said.

If enough customers do so, he said, "We will need to build fewer new power plants to serve our customers' peak load in the future, and this in turn will help hold down increases in the future cost of electricity for all customers."

Marquardt said benefits to all customers will start coming about as soon as new equipment is installed. Each piec of equipment helps reduce the company's need to use high-priced natural gas fuel to meet summer peak loads, which in turn will mean smaller increases in fuel costs to customers.

Also, he said, each piece of new equipment will do its part to help delay the need to borrow money to design and

build new power plants. Customers who install high EER air conditioners or heat pumps and solar-assisted or energy-recovery water heaters will make a direct contribution toward goal.

He noted that the cost of a new power plant today is more than three times the average cost of the plants now used by TESCO.

Marquardt said present circumstances make it apparent that customers will

benefit best if the company spends money to reduce growth in demand for electricity. "Otherwise, we'll have to spend this money -and a great deal more -- to build a larger amount of new generating capacity in the

"The cost of electricity to our customers will be less if we spend it at the present time to reduce demand."

Because high-efficiency equipment uses less electricity, customers who install it will save money on their bills as long as the equipment is in use.

"But the initial cost of this equipment is higher than that of lower-efficiency units. So our program is designed to encourage customers to replace outmoded equipment sooner, and encourage them to invest in higher-efficiency units, than they might otherwise consider," Marquardt

Complete information on types of eligible equipment and amounts of financial assistance will be available when the program goes into effect on April 15.

4 cup cocoa 12 cup peanut butter 3 cups cooking oats, uncook-



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


