

Bentsen Co-sponsors PEANUT **Amendment**

WASHINGTON, D.C. -Sentor Lloyd Bentsen on Wednesday co-sponsored legislation that would aid some 10,000 Texas peanut farmers by retaining the current federal peanut price support program.

"The U.S. Department of Agriculture's proposal to do away with the programs that growers have tried hard to rejuvenate is totally unfair. I believe that we should recognize this effort, that we should stick by our farmers and give their proposal a chance to work," Senator Bentsen said in remarks accompanying his legisla-

Bentsen pointed out that the price support level for quota peanuts has been increased only once since 1977, and then only slightly. Growers this year will get only \$455 per ton for quota peanuts. By contrast, the U.S. Department of Agriculture estimated that last year it cost growers \$526 per ton to produce peanuts.

According to farmers and agriculture economists, the 1981 cost estimate is well over \$600, Bentsen added.

Senator Bentsen compared USDA and growers' costs estimates, noting that "If both estimates are correct, then the proposal we are presenting today will be less


costly than USDA's proposal. Our proposal will save \$1.4 million over the four-year life of this bill and will cost the government nothing in 1985, while the Administration estimates thier vision will cost \$14 million in that year."

"Over the last four years peanut growers have taken sharp cuts in order to return the peanut program to a balance of supply and demand, a balance where the market will clear the peanut supply and there will be now excess for the government to buy.'

"Let us recognize the service of peanut growers. Let us recognize the stability they have given us in our peanut supply. This year's crop is a fluke — the result of a drought so bad that we have a peanut shortage for the first time in 25 years. What other commodity can boast that?" Bentsen said.

"Our proposal will assure the American consumer of a stable supply of peanuts at a reasonable price. It will minimize the cost to the taxpayer, and it will maintain the economic health of large parts of rural America. This is a program that was designed and asked for by the people, not handed down from on high by the government," Senator Bentsen

partisan support of all Subcommittee members. A bill draft was submitted by the Department of Agriculture to the Subcommittee prior to the April 8 session, but the major program changes proposed in that document were rejected by the Subcommittee. The USDA recommendations call for abolishment of peanut acreage allotments in 1982, reduction of farm poundage quota by 10 percent each year, transfer of farm quotas by sale and lease within states, elimination of deadlines for contracting additional peanuts and would provide authority for any grower to contract with handlers for delivery of additional peanuts for both the export and domestic edible markets.

The Bill must now be considered by the full House Agricultur Committee. The: measure will probably be: presented to the Committee early in May.

Senator Jesse Helms, Chairman of the Senate Agriculture Committee, introduced his farm bill in the Senate on April 7, including a peanut section similar to the bill reported by the House Agriculture Subcommittee. Deliberation on the Helms' bill and the Administration farm bill are expected to begin in the Senate Agriculture Committee the last week in April and will continue for an extended period. a specific date for Senate Committee action on the peanut section of the farm bill was still pending at





That's just the amount paid to our Eastland County peanut farmers in 1980 - Multiply that many times (they spend a lot for food, machinery, clothes, cars, etc.) and you'll see how imporant this phase of agriculture is to our economy and state. Over \$116 million was paid to Texas peanut growers.

THIS MONEY COULD DISAPPEAR If the peanut allotment is abolished as outlined by a new USDA Farm Program - Abolishment of thde allotment system would wreck the peanut farmer, the agri-businessman and have a disastrous impact on the economy of Eastland County.


