ture Committee on May 4th after three and one-half of verbal skirmishing and following the defeat of 5 attempted amendments finally passed a modified version of the peanut bill reported earlier by the Tobacco and Peanut Subcommittee. Ross Wilson, Secretary of the National Peanut Growers Group, said the bill as reported would extend the present two price allotment and quota system for the period 1982-1985. Wilson said the bill as passed would set the 1982 quota support rate at \$600 per ton, \$31 less than the previous Subcommittee version, but would retain an escalator clause calling for annual adjustments in the quota support rate to keep pace with increasing production costs. The bill establishes a national poundage quota of 1.3 million tons rather than the 1.4 million

Subcommittee. Passage of the measure came after proponents successfully overcame repeated efforts to pass amendments to lower support prices or change the program con-

tons approved earlier by the

Representative Paul Findley (R-III.) sought to substitute the Administration peanut bill for the Subcommittee bill but failed by a vote of 24-11 to gain acceptance of his proposal. The Administration is seeking to abolish allotments quotas in favor of open production.

A proposed amemdment by Representative Huckaby (D-La.) to remove the escalator clause from the quota support provision was also beaten back by a single vote, 19-18. A second effort at amending the bill came from Representative Huckaby (D-La) who proposed to lower the support rate to \$500, but retain the escalator That attempt was defeated by a

vote of 19 to 17 A third try at amending the measure was made by

Glickman who proposed a support rate of \$550 in 1982 with an escalator, but giving no consideration to land

value in the escalator. That

effort failed by a vote of

18-17. A fourth try to modify the Subcommittee bill came from Representative Floyd Fithian (D-Ind) who proposed a support rate of \$600, reduction of the poundage quota to 1.3 million tons in 1982, elimination of land value in computing annual support increases and a 300 acre maximum allotment for any one farm. That proposal fialed on a vote of 8-7.

A fifth try at amending the bill came from Representative Paul Findley who moved that production of peanuts for export not be restricted to allotment holders. That effort was also defeated by a vote of 11-8.

Representative Charlie Rose offered an amendment to reduce the national poundage quota from 1.4 million tons in 1982 to 1.3 million tons and elimination of land value in computing annual support increases to off set production cost increases. The Rose amendment was adopted and the bill as amended was passed.

Wilson said that ponents of the Rose peanut bill continue to believe that the toughest battles for peanuts and the farm bill will be waged in floor debates in both the House and Senate later in the Congressional session.

# Weathers Evangelist At FMC Revival

He is now the Cabinet representative to that Council.

In 1953 he was named "Outstanding Rural Minister of the Year" while pastor of the Turnersville Circuit, where the Levita Church experienced a great "revival" in giving and attendance. According to Ross Wilson, Secretary, National Peanut Growers Group, the Senate Committee on Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry on April 30 passed a peanut bill sponsored by Senator Jesse Helms, Committee Chairman. The bill was passed following the defeat of an amendment offered by Senator Richard Lugar of Indiana aimed at Abolishing peanut acreage allotments and poundage quotas. Senator Lugar announced plans in a press conference on April 23 to introduce his proposal in 1981 farm bill deliberations. Lugar described the allotment system as archaic, out of kilter with today's farm programs and totally indefensible. He said the average allotment rental rate of \$115 artifically inflates the retail price of peanut products by 20 percent. Lugar's amendment was sharply challenged by Senator Howell Heflin of Alabama who strongly defended the alltoment and quota system as an intergral phase necessary in marketing peanuts which he said are perishable and more closely resemble milk than soybeans, cotton or wheat. Heflin observed that the leasing of peanut allotments is no different from leasing corp loand for corn or soybeans in Indiana. In fact, he

said 50 percent of all crops are grown on leased land.

In passing the Helms' bill the Senate Committee also rejected the Administration peanut bill which also would have abolished allotments in 1982 and phased out poundage quotas.

The Helms' bill as passed by the Committee calls for a quota support rate of \$650 per ton and a minimum national poundage quota of 1,300,000 tons to be adjusted as domestic edible use increases Unlike the House bill there is not automatic quota support adjustment clause. Committee Staf officials indicated some "triming of hills passed by the Committee prior to approval of the omnibus farm bill for consideration by the Senate. Commodity sections of the proposed farm bill as passed by the Senate Committee are generally calling for expenditures in excess of the Administration's budget estimates. Without some modifications in the various commodity sections to lower costs Washington observers point toward possible defeat of the bill or a Presidential

Washington observers estimate that the farm bill may reach the Senate floor by mid-June.





### Texas Wool, Mohair Crop Down, But State Still #1

AUSTIN-Although production of Texas wool and mohair was down in 1980, Texas still ranks as the nation's largest producer of these fibers, Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown has reported.

The annual production Texas Crop and Livestock Brown noted that the 1980

million pounds, 4 percent less than 1979. The number of sheep and lambs clipped was 2.7 million head, down slightly from the year before.

While the average price per pound was unchanged from 1979 at 97 cents, the reduced output lowered the total value

of production to \$17,751,000. Mohair production in Texas -- which produces perhaps 96 percent of all the mohair in the U.S. -- declined to 8.8 million pounds, 5 percent below 1979 production. The average price per pound declined sharply to \$3.50 for the year. This lowered the value of the year's production to \$30,800,000, compared to \$47,430,000 in 1979.

Nationwide, production of wool for 1980 totaled 107 million pounds, up I percent from 1979 (including both shorn and pulled wool).

A total of 13.2 million head of sheep and lambs were shorn in 1980, up I percent from the previous year. The total value of shorn wool was/ \$92.9 million, up 3 percent from \$90.5 million in 1979.


