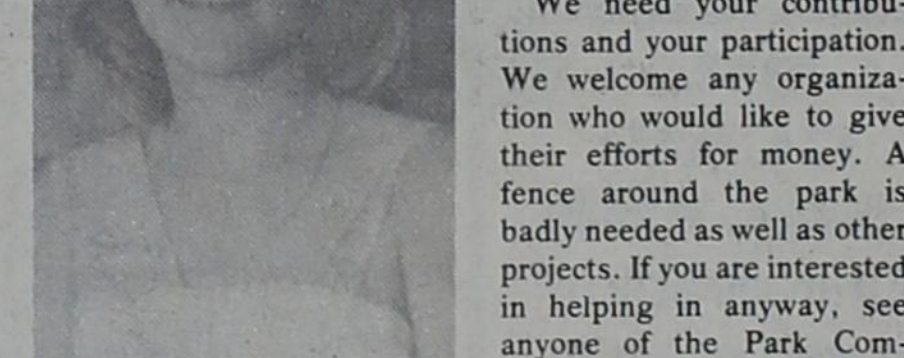

Little League Needs Your Help

Our baseball season will begin next week. Last year we had 135 youth and children enrolled in the program. This year, we will have an increase to 10 to 15 enabling us to have four Little League teams, instead of three we had last year. We will have teams ages from 4 to 18.
When I became a member of the commission, I had no idea the expense involved in running the baseball program. Here are a few examples. We ask each sponsor for \$100. Out of this \$100, we buy for Pee Wee and Tee Wee teams; balls, bats, tee shirts and caps (which they get to keep). For Little League, with a new team, we have to buy a new set of uniforms, balls, bats and other equipment. Of course some existing uniforms have to be replaced for various reasons. I think you can see that \$100 does not cover all this, so we have to make up the difference. Each child pays \$5.00 for insurance (We do not let them play without it). If we have children in the program who cannot pay, we make up for them.
At the end of the season, we give each child a small trophy for his or her participation. To give an idea of the cost of these expenses, this is last year's budget of expenditure: Concession supplies - \$1,652.80; Insurance - \$702.85; Equipment and uniforms - \$2,021.78; Trophies (including our little league all star tourney) - \$747.39 and Note Payment on land \$500.00 Now these are not all, but we think it gives you a better understanding and idea of the money involved. Along with our sponsors and other smaller contributions the only we have to pay for this is profit from the concession stand.
We need your contributions and your participation. We welcome any organization who would like to give their efforts for money. A fence around the park is badly needed as well as other projects. If you are interested in helping in anyway, see anyone of the Park Commissioners: Donnie Rodgers, Dale Curb, Mike Savage, Dale Ables or Terry Clark.
The kids will thank you, the Commissioners will also thank you and you will feel better knowing you helped these kids have a place to play baseball every summer.

TRACK TEAM RATE HIGH AT STATE COMPETITION

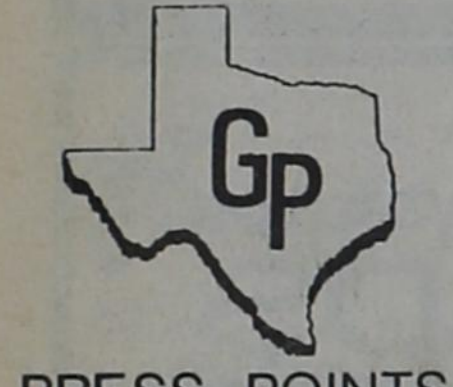

TOO SOON FOR CONTROL OF PECAN NUT CASEBEARER

Recently our office has received several calls on when to spray for the Pecan Nut Casebearer, reports Gordon Woolam, Extension Pest Management Agent for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Actually it is about 2 weeks early to be spraying for this pest.

Proper timing is the key to efficient control of this insect. The insecticide should be on the trees 2 to 3 days after the first eggs hatch. At this our best prediction is that there will not be a significant population control before May 23rd.

Woolam suggests that Homeowners and Growers watch the newspaper for further reports on when to spray for the Pecan Nut Casebearer and adds that spraying now would probably be stretching the effectiveness of the insecticide too far.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — "I didn't fill out your card (the response card on my questionnaire) because you don't read them and only a computer will ever see it."

That was one of the letters triggered by my latest questionnaire. Contrary to the writer's assumption and similar comments attached to mail from constituents from time to time, I do read every letter that comes into my office. And every letter receives a personal reply. I have maintained, since first coming to Washington, that a voter who took the time and effort to let me know their views on any issue deserved the same attention from their Congressman. That is a policy that I don't intend to change.

Obviously, when material goes to over 200,000 postal patrons, however, it is more practical and economical to use computer technology to count the returning responses rather than tie up every member of my staff counting reply boxes. I simply cannot answer every questionnaire — unless specific comments are included — but I will report the consensus of the questionnaire to everyone through the press when the results are compiled.

Questionnaires are an important communications tool, reaching a large number of people that might not ordinarily think that their voice is heard and encouraging them to speak out. I realize that this approach is considered impersonal by some, but there is simply no other means to question so many, so quickly. And the answers to those questions are so vital to me as each of these issues is dealt with in the House of Representatives.

Speaking of mail in general, people all over the United States seem to have taken pen in hand to let their Representative know their opinion, resulting in the largest backlog of mail delivery experienced by the House Postal Service in nine years.

Mail now being received in Intermediate, and Senior. Entry fee will be \$3.00 per event with \$2.00 going to the jackpot and \$1.00 to the club. There will be a concession stand open for your convenience.

SOIL STEWARDSHIP WEEK MAY 24-31 THEME "Society's Pressure Points"
Soil Stewardship Week will be held nationwide this year May 24-31, according to W.D. "Bill" Brown, Director of the Upper Leon Soil and Water Conservation District.

Since 1955, Soil Stewardship Week has been recognized in millions of churches and schools across the nation. It is designed to focus on the nation's natural resource problems and to consider ways to solve them.

"This country must, at whatever cost, maintain the capacity of the land to produce food and fiber," cites the National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) in its booklets for the 1981 observance. NACD sponsors Soil Stewardship Week in cooperation with the nation's 3,000 soil and water conservation districts.

"With our own population at 220 million and growing and with many regions of the world depending on the United States to supplement their food supply, the need to maintain our productive capacity becomes increasingly apparent," according to NACD.

This year's event focuses my office is around two weeks old and consequently my own response to that mail has been slowed considerably. I apologize for the delay, but this is an unusual situation. Normally, I receive 400-500 pieces of mail each day and right now I would estimate that the count has tripled.

I'm certainly not complaining. This great outpouring of opinion by the people has proven that Americans can no longer be called "apathetic" about the circumstances that touch their daily lives and are letting those who were elected to represent them know about it.

Constituent communications are the most important means a Congressman has of measuring the will of the people and, if anything, more and more individuals should be taking part in that process.

I would encourage everyone to keep on writing, but ask for patience. I'm answering those letters as quickly as I can during this busy legislative session.

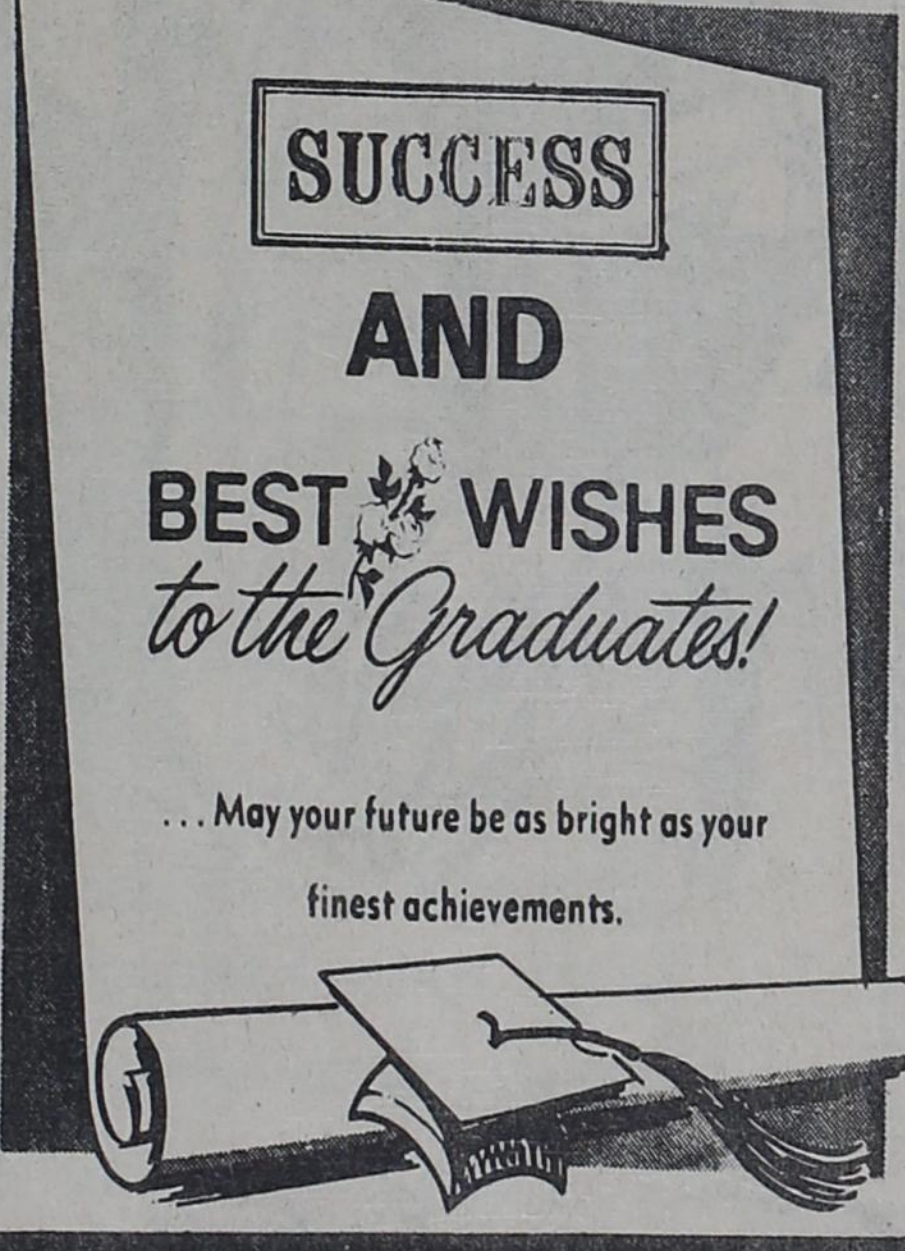

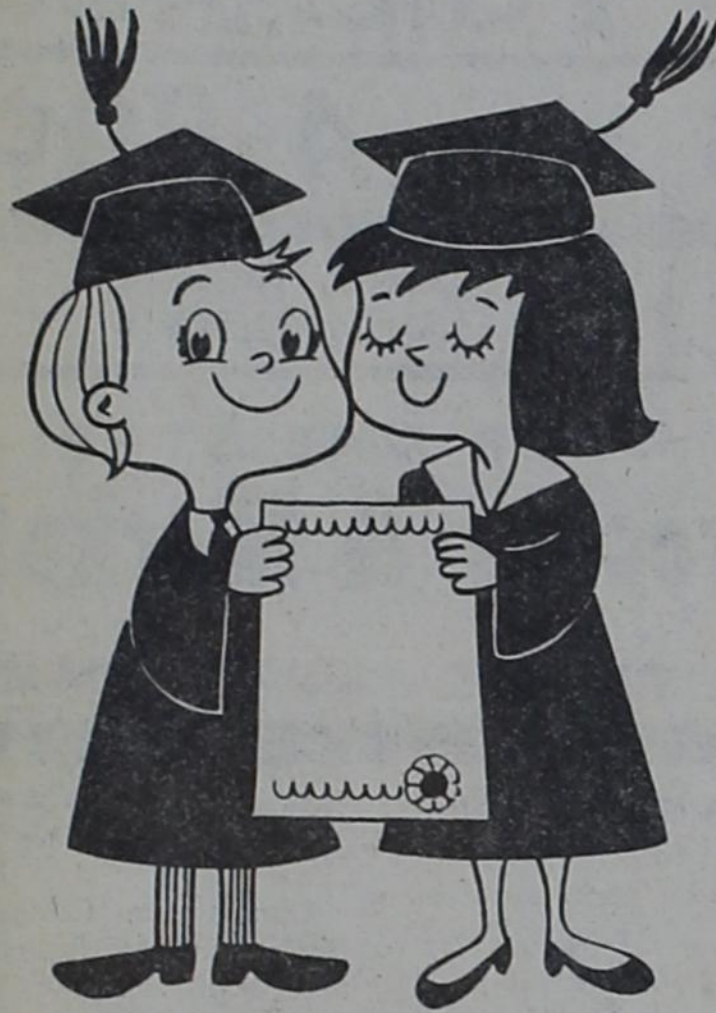

My! What a wonderful drops of water that fell our way last week. We are so thankful for every bit of it. We are so lucky in a way as the terrible hail and tornadoes did such destructive

damage in many places.

On the 22nd, 62 years ago George Hallmark came in on the same train from the Army. We were discharged at Camp Bowie. A lot of water has run under the bridge and a lot of sand has blown over the bridge. A lot of joy and sorrow in that period also that date will be 17 years since I found out I had Glaucoma at V.A. Hos-

pital at Big Spring. The Doctor, after treating my eyes some 52 days told me my right eye vision would soon be gone and I would not be able to drive a car in two years. On February 14, 1966 was my last days to drive a car.

That night after I had laid in bed. I shed many, many bitter tears. Tho I promised myself I would not shed any more tears. Tho as I try to read with a special light about a foot from the paper. The lines run together. I just put the paper in my lap and say why? Why? I have averaged doctoring my eyes nine times each 24 hours. I will say I have not missed 25

times in 17 years. Spent several thousand dollars.

Our deepest sympathy goes out to the followign families: Sandlin, Forrest Brown died here, Mrs. Seba Williams of Eastland, lived here many years. May you look to the Master of All during your trying hour.

I Started to school in June 1916 to prepare to take that test for a Teacher Certificate. The McGlothine moved into Freedman Community. I heard they had a grown daughter I knew was going home from school. And of course I was interested in seeing her. I rode by the house where they lived and saw Onnie with her beautiful curly hair. She did not see me as I rode by. I thought I have found me a girl. Dad lived on place where Bo Caraway lives in 1916-23.

Some one gave a party where Onnie and her grown brother could get acquainted. We hit it up from then on. When I left to go to my school near Menard. I went to see her and told her I would be gone six months. She was picken cotton. I told her not to forget me. She said she would not.

On Friday December 28, the school boys played out-sides and I caught behind the batter.

That night two girls, two boys and I were boared and went 12 miles in a hurry to dance. Menard had open saloons and those Cowboys

had to have their whiskey. I became sick and my right side was so sore in a few minutes. Called Dr. when he came he asked what my trouble was and I told him. Appendicitis. He told me I was in bad shape. So he carried me to Menard and got me a room. A rubber sheet and packed me in ice.

He said my appendix had already busted and I was in serious condition. I would have to wait till 7 p.m. Saturday for a train to Brady. The man where I boarded told me if I needed any money just check on him. So

I wrote a check and Dr. cashed it. I paid him \$10.00 when I arrived at Hospital I told them I would like to wait till 10 a.m. next day. They said all your chances will be gone then. So I said start cutting. My intestines were rotted into. So they cut out some of them. The last words I heard the Dr. say was "You are lucky that you are not in a Catholic Hospital". Then I was asleep. I have wondered a zillion times what he meant. I awake on Sunday morning. Sun shinning so bright. I heard my first Hawaiian

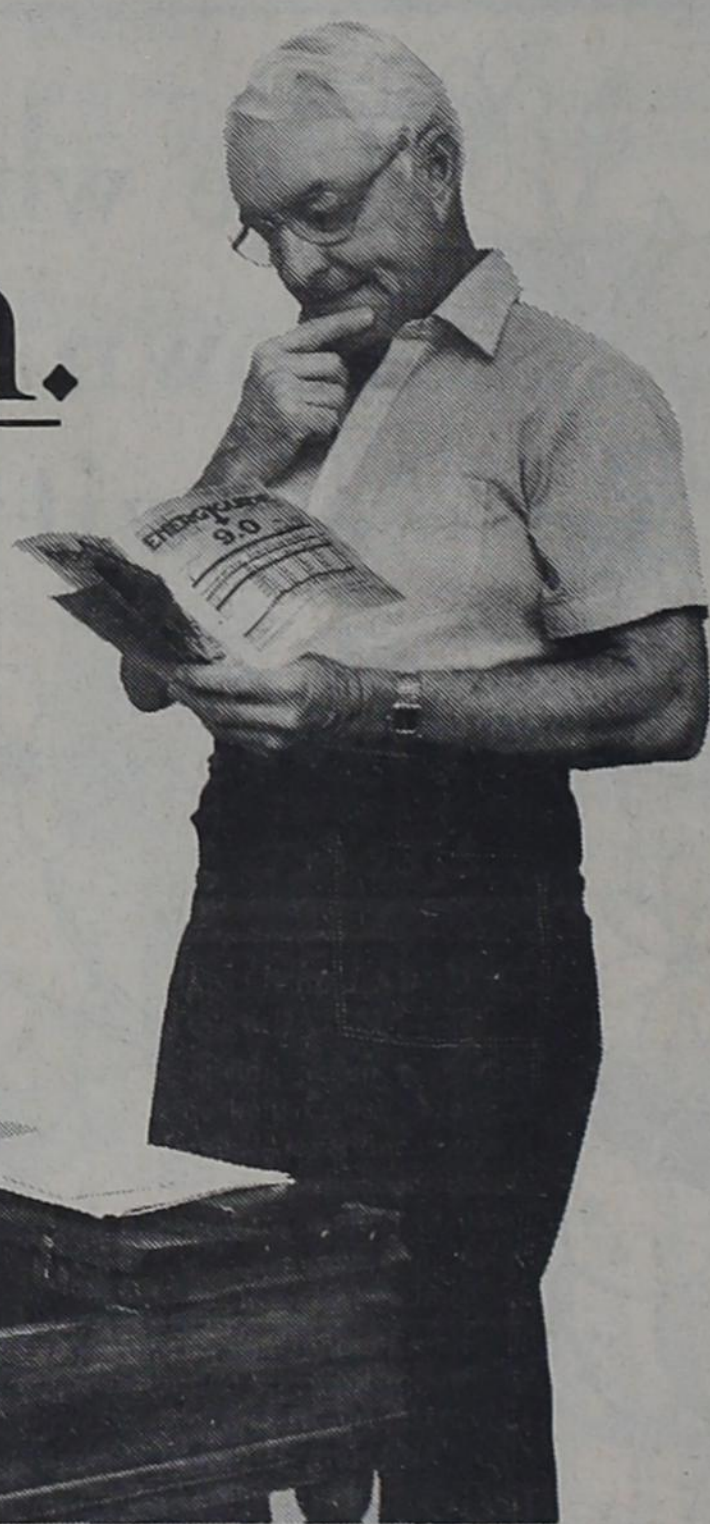
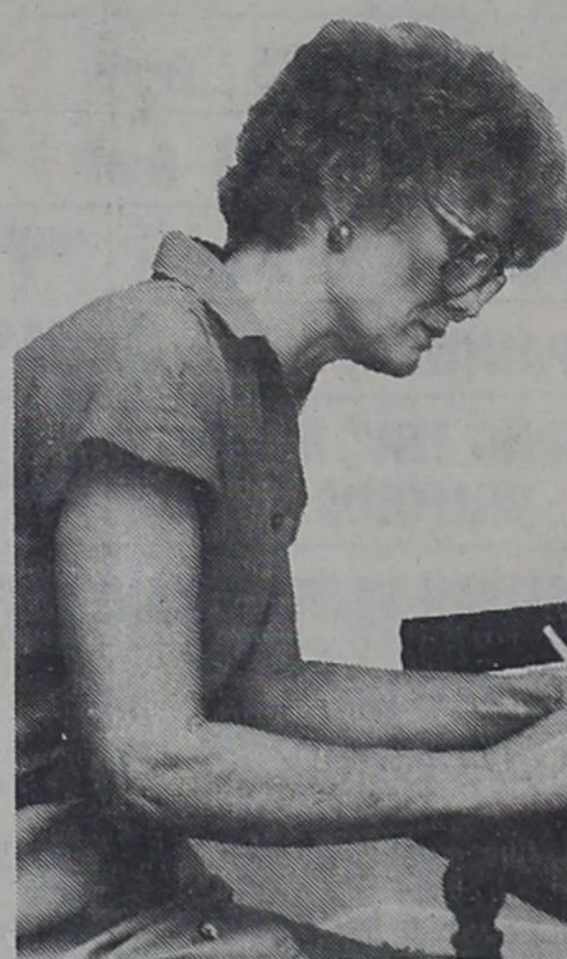
