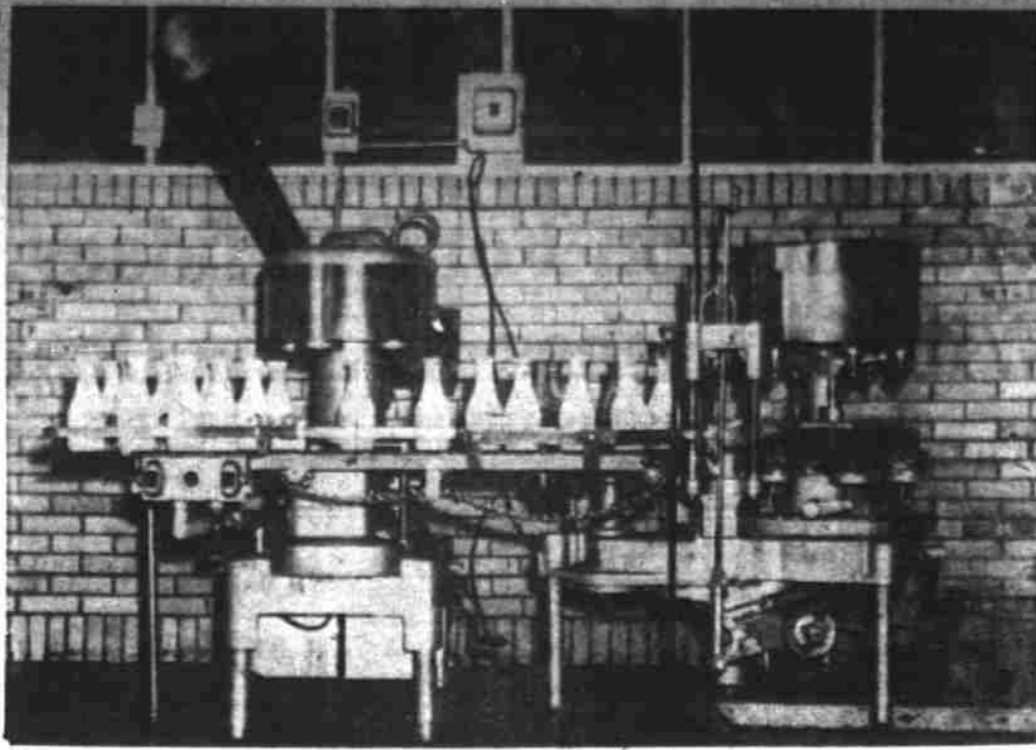


Asks Demos To Scratch Name Of McDonald

The Herald has received the following communication from T. E. Jordan. It is reprinted herewith in full.

To the Democrats of Howard County: Fellow Democrats: Don't you think we have a man on the Democratic ticket who got his nomination as the democratic candidate by waiting until after the primaries to state his stand on the presidential race? This man ran as a democrat in the primary, and while still asking votes as a democrat, states emphatically that he will support the Republican candidate for president.

He says that he believes Willkie can do a better job of handling the farm problem than has the present administration. Does he hope, in seeking to elect the Republican candidate to undo all the good, for the farmer and small business man, that has been done during the past eight years? Examine, please, the records of past Republican presidents and see what has ever been done by them to help the farmers. In fact, any one except large corporations and the extremely wealthy. See what basis there is for assuming that Willkie can handle these problems better than Roosevelt has done. If you can



find sufficient Republican farm legislation, aside from the levying of new farm tariffs, to justify support, then your vote belongs with the Republican candidates (which still leaves McDonald out).

This man who will support Willkie instead of his party's candidate, Roosevelt, is J. E. McDonald, candidate for commissioner of agriculture. He doesn't follow his logic through to tell you that the Republican candidate for governor would do a better job than O'Daniel, or that the Republican candidate for agricultural commissioner can do a better job than he can, yet he has the nerve to ask your support for Willkie for president.

Those of us who have voted the straight democratic ticket for years, without making a scratch on it, feel no obligation to do so this time. Since McDonald has turned traitor to his party, there is no earthly reason why good democrats should stay with him. His support, by implication, was pledged to Roosevelt; since he has switched that support, to get Republican votes for himself, the democrats obligation to support him is removed.

Remember the last Republican rule in the White House. (Perhaps Mr. Mc. wants to put us back around the corner where we were with Republican Hoover.) Remember that this man has broken a pledge to his party. Remember what good that party has done while in power. And remember when you go to the polls Tuesday next, as you scratch the names of the Republican electors for Willkie, so scratch the name of J. E. McDonald for Agricultural Commissioner, and supporter of Willkie. As you will elect Franklin D. Roosevelt president of the U. S., so elect (by writing his name in the independent column) BILL CORRY, a dirt farmer and a real democrat, your commissioner for agriculture!—T. E. JORDAN

City Charter Proposals In Two Cities

City charter proposals are up in two neighboring cities and may come up in a third.

Tuesday Midland voters march to the polls, and along with their decisions on state and national political races, they will act upon a proposed home rule charter for the city.

Odesa people are scheduled to hold a similar election on Dec. 17 and in Lamesa a committee has been named to draft a proposed charter for that city.

Essence of the Midland proposal is to centralize authority under the mayor and council, making the body the only elective city agency. All other officials would be appointive and the council would be solely responsible for operation of the city.

CITY DELIVERY OF MAIL IS SOUGHT IN COLORADO CITY

COLORADO CITY, Nov. 2.—A definite move to secure free city delivery of mail is underway in Colorado City with the city council, the postoffice, and the chamber of commerce, various women's clubs and other organizations taking part.

Postmaster Joe Y. Fraser to make formal application for city delivery are being circulated by clubwomen of the town.

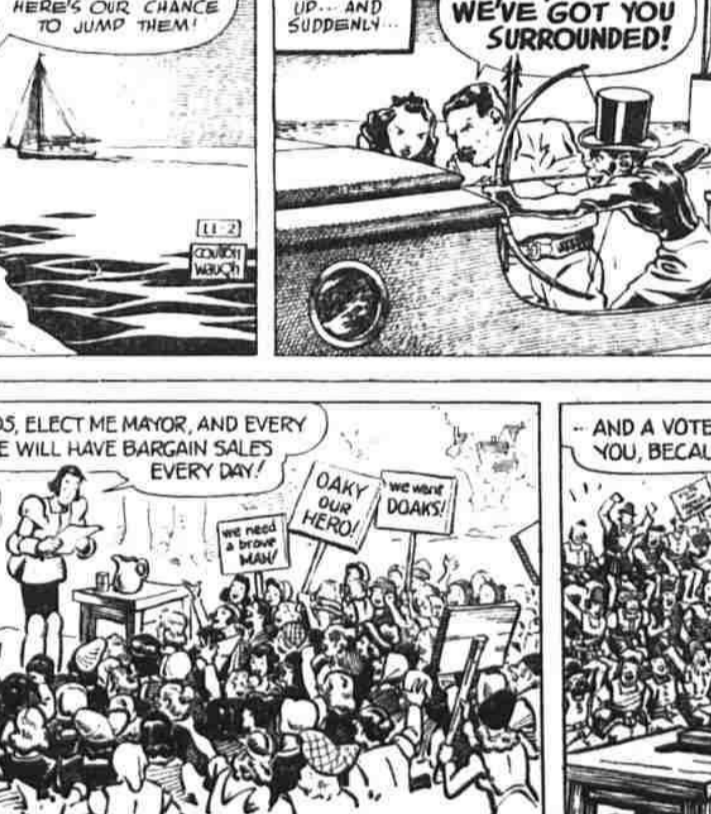
