WASHINGTON (AP) - The government will allow no more than the already approved limit of peanuts to be imported into the United States this year.

Agriculture Secretary John Block said the current special import limit of 301.7 million pounds will expire July 31 as previously scheduled.

Block said expiration of the special import quota at that time would continue to ensure McCoy did two days active that the unsually large amount of peanut imports would not interfere with the sale of the American crop, which will not be marketed until later this summer.

The normal import quota is 1.7 million pounds, but it was increased by 200 million pounds in December in the wake of a severe drought that damaged substantial portions of the 1980 U.S. crop.

President Reagan, acting on a recommendation by the International Trade Commission, raised the quota another 100 million pounds to 301.7 million in April to ensure sufficient domestic supplies until the new U.S. crop.







doctor. The doctor that was with me when I had the mumps came. looked at me and said "...Bennett what is the matter." I told him I had been there three days and two nights. Had not seen a doctor, no medicine, not even an ice pack. He was using more strong words. Ordered medicine. They told doctor they thought I was putting them on. Doctor said you can see his face is flushed and a high fever. They gave me some medicine and ordered ice packs. Sgt. said could not get ice til next day. doctor said to minutes or you will go to guard house tonight and a court martial for neglience of duty. Doctor sat down by my bed and men on both sides of me said everything I had said was true.

The ice arrived withing two minutes to spare. the next morning three doctors flouroscoped me. Put me on just eggnog and medicine for five days. They said I would get over that spell. Tho I would have trouble as long as I lived. That my record would show that I would be entitled to a Disability pension.

I was dismissed on September 12th, marked U.S Duty only.

Do you know I tried to get my record of that Hospital stay. They would not release it till 1960. The report shows that my stay August 24 thru September 12. A few days later they destroyed the entire record of mine to give them a clean record.

If I should live a 1000 years I would never forgive them of robbing and stealing from me what I was entitled to.

Dr. Allen J. Bolt has been named area 14 veterinarian for the Texas Animal Health Commission.




