

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

Article 4477-9, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes, "Dumping Solid Waste on Property or into Water" is one of several statutes which may be used in cases of unauthorized dumping. This statute states that any person who dumps or disposes of trash, junk, garbage, refuse, unsightly matter or solid waste on public highways, rights of way, on public or private property, or into any inland or costal water of Texas without the consent of the owner, his agent or public official in charge, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be fined not less than \$15.00 nor more than \$200.00 Every law enforcement officer of this State and its subdivisions shall have the authority to enforce the provisions of this

Paragraph A-2.5 of the enclosed Municipal Solid Waste Management Regulations covers Article 6674v-2, VTCS, "Dumping of Refuse Near Highway", which may also be used. This statute states that no municipal corporation, private corporation, firm or person shall dump, deposit or leave any refuse, garbage, rubbish or junk on or within 300 yards of any highway in the State. As indicated in paragraph

H-1.1, it is the policy of the Department to encourage local enforcement where effective, however, the Department will initiate enforcement action when local effor's have not caused compliance within a reasonable period of time. Paragraph H-1.2 of this Department's regulation covers Section 8 of the "Solid Waste Disposal Act" which could also be used if necessary. This act states that no person may cause, suffer, allow or permit the storage, handling, or disposal of solid waste, or the use or operation of a disposal site in violation of this Act or the rules, regulations, or orders of the Department. The penalty for offenders convicted of violating this Act is not less than \$50.00 or more than \$1000.00 for each act or violation and for each day of violation. The use of this Act would be of a civil nature and could require that this Department be a party to the suit.







# **FUNDS SOUGHT FOR**

The Railroad Commission has submitted two grant applications to the Federal Railroad Administration for a total of \$3.48 million to rehabilitate 37.5 miles of railroad track in Texas.

One of the applications is for \$2.29 million to rehabilitate 24.1 miles of track between Dublin and Gorman now operated by Texas Central Railroad.

Texas Central does not now have adequate financial reserves to fully rehabilitate the line, and continued delay of maintenance could result in onment.

Loss of rail service by Texas Central would cause 135 persons near Gorman to lose their jobs, as one firm would be forced out of busienss and another would have to cut production by 50 per cent. Twelve other shippers on the line would have to pay greatly increased transportation costs, making their businesses non-competitve in the marketplace.

Half of the peanut crop grown in Texas and Oklahoma is processed through facilities on the Texas Central line, according to Michael Calhoun, director of the Transportation Division's Rail Planning Section.

The other application is for \$1.19 million to rehabilitate 13.4 miles of track between Etter and Sunray. However, the application is conditional on the purchase of the track by TeCe Corp. from the trustee of the Rock Island rail line, which went bankrupt and is being liquidated.

Calhoun told Commission that TeCe acquisition of the former Rock Island line will restore vital rail service to an important wheat producing area in the Panhandle.

Nine grain elevators, which been shipping approximately 425,000 tons of wheat each year by rail, have been without rail service for a

year as the result of the Rock Island problem, he said. Consequently, Calhoun explained, the elevators are having to pay higher trucking costs to move wheat. Two elevators will close if the line is permanently abaondoned; he added.

Other commodities shipped over the line were petroleum products, carbon black, anhydrous ammonia and livestock feedstuff.

TeCe is negotiating the purchase of a total of 74 miles of former Rock Island track between Etter and Hitchland, but not enough grant money is available to allow the Commission to assist in the rehabilitation of the entire length.

Therefore, the TeCe application is limited to the cost of fixing the 13.4-mile portion of the line on which 70 per cent of the line's traffic begins or ends.

Assistance Act of 1978 allows federal financial assistance for rehabilitating certain rail lines. Under the rail assistance program, each state is required to designate a state agency to prepare and implement a state rail plan. The Railroad Commission, the agency given responsibility by governor, completed the Texas State Rail Plan in 1979 and it was approved by the Railroad Federal

Administration. The Act requires each state's plan to focus on lightdensity branch lines that are being abandoned or are in danger of abandonment. Once the plan is approved by the FRA, the state is eligible to apply for federal grant fund to upgrade the endangered lines.

The grant applications forwarded by the Commission' today mark the third and fourth rehabilitation projects proposed by the Commission since it submitted the Texas Rail Plan. The first project, a \$1.7 million rehabilitation of

the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad Company's (MKT) Wichita Falls - Burkburnett line, began in late 1979 and was completed in October 1980. The second project, now underway, is a \$2.6 million upgrade of the MKT's line between Dallas and Carrollton. Benefits from these projects to Texas shippers and consumers are estimated to be \$11.4 million.


#### PORK PRODUCERS TO **MEET JULY 6**




