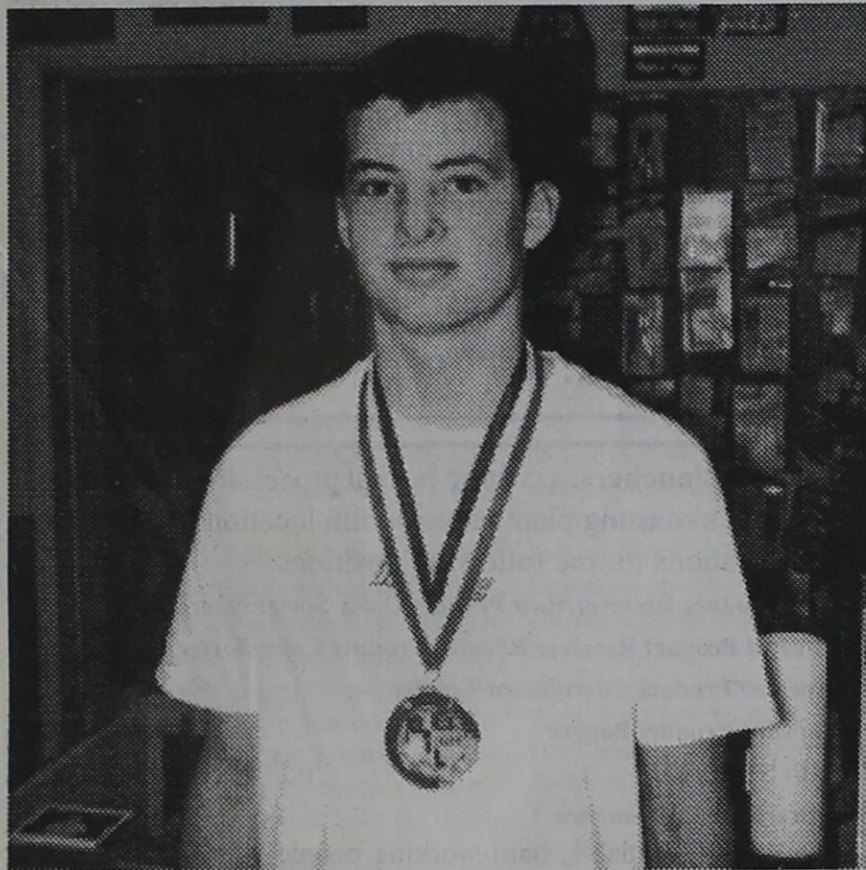

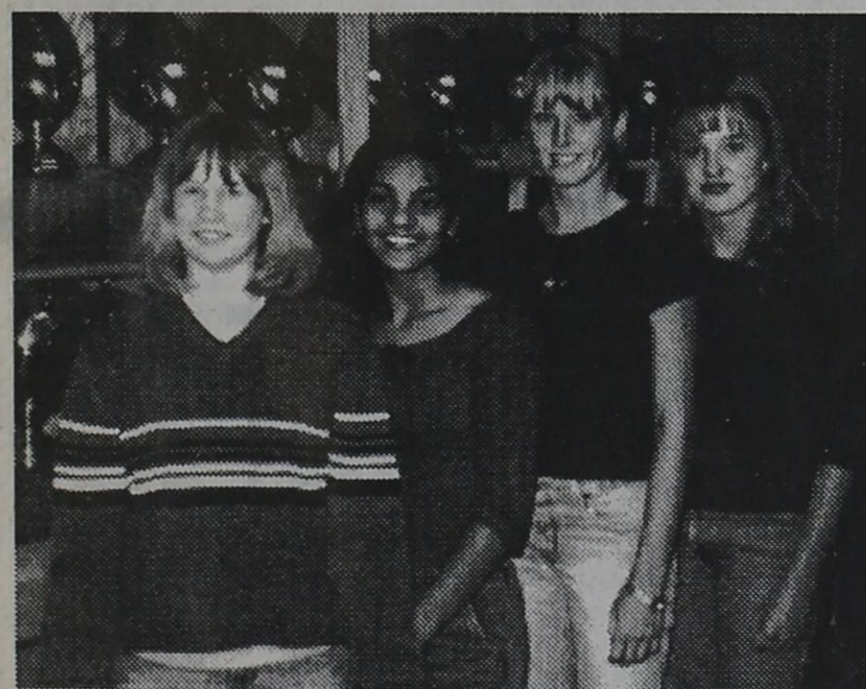
Glover Places Second At State UIL Meet



Mark Glover, a junior at Gorman High School, was awarded a second place medal in Headline Writing at the 1999-2000 University Interscholastic League Academic State Meet held May 4-6 at The University of Texas at Austin. This is the highest that any student from Gorman High School has ever placed in a Journalism contest. Last year Glover placed 5th in Editorial Writing at the State Meet.

Glover was also active in the UIL One-Act Play this year receiving All-Star Cast honors at Zone and Honorable Mention All-Star Cast at District. He also placed in other UIL academic events. At the Regional contest he placed 2nd in Headline Writing and 6th in Computer Applications. At the District UIL Competition he received 1st in Headline Writing, 1st in Mathematics Individual, 1st in Computer Applications, 2nd in Headline Writing, 2nd in Calculator Applications Team, 2nd in Mathematics Team, 3rd in News Writing, 4th in Calculator Applications Individual, 5th in Editorial Writing. At the Bangs Invitational Meet he placed 1st in Editorial Writing, and 3rd in Computer Applications. At the Wylie Invitational Meet he placed 5th in Editorial Writing.
