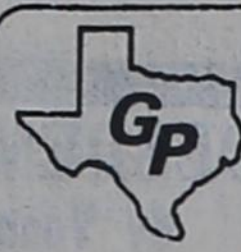

## Congressman Charles Stenholm Issues Statement

I voted against the tax bill today primarily because the first prerequisite for my consideration for an increase -- adequate budget cuts -- has not been met. In my mind, you just can't have one without the other. I supported the first budget resolution that called for \$20 billion in new revenues for one year, coupled with substantial budget cuts. Now we have seen that revenue figure hit \$99 billion over three years and have yet to see the budget cuts.

Economic goals set last year centered around savings and investment incentives and the provisions of this bill that would require withholding taxes on interest and dividends are ludicrous in light of those goals. They penalize the very activities we tried to encourage last year.

Just cannot go against the time-honored economic rule that you don't raise taxes during a recession. When you add the fact that Congress ducked the cost of living adjustments (COLAs) and entitlements -- one more time; put even more tax burden on one of the segments hit hardest by this recession -- small businesses -- by increasing the federal unemployment tax; and impacted our competitive edge in high technological development necessary for the next decade, the arguments against this bill become even stronger.

I was concerned, as well, about provisions that would have great effect on every private pension plan in this country without one hearing ever being held. When I told the President of my decision on this yesterday, I warned him that the current depression in agriculture was one example of the danger of trying to solve all of our problems through

## LONE STAR FILES RATE INCREASE

Lone Star Co. Manager, Delton Ake, today filed an application for a rate increase which would raise the average residential customer's monthly bill in Gorman about \$2.51 in the winter and \$0.51 in the summer.

Based on Lone Star's rate application, a residential customer who uses an average of eight thousand cubic feet of gas a month paid \$35.43 for gas service in the winter. Under the requested rate, that same customer would pay \$37.94.

Commercial gas customers rates would also increase under the requested rate schedule.

"Our customers are accustomed to dependable natural gas service," says Ake. "This rate increase is necessary to continue a high performance level and for other necessary expenses, such as maintaining and

improving the local pipeline distribution system, which are vital to dependable service."

Lone Star's last rate increase in Gorman became effective March, 1981.

"Since that time, every business, including Lone Star, has experienced increased operating expenses," says Ake. "And of course, unlike other businesses that can raise their prices as expenses go up, we must apply to the city council for a rate increase. No one likes rising prices, but any business must earn enough money to meet operating expenses and still achieve a reasonable profit. Even though our expenses have gone up, Lone Star still has one of the lowest average operating costs per customer when compared to any of the other major gas utilities in Texas."

Funeral Services for Reverend Burton M. Dennis were held Thursday, August 19, 1982 at the First United Methodist Church of Gorman. Reverend J.W. Hodges of Lamkin conducted the service and was assisted by Reverend Donna Ware of Gorman, and Reverend Marion Dennis of Gorman. Ruby Lee Kinser was organist and soloist.

Interment was in Oaklawn Cemetery.

Burton M. Dennis was born on November 6, 1901 in Comanche County, Texas. He died August 17, 1982 at age 80, at the West Texas Medical Center in Abilene.

Burton spent his childhood in Gorman and at age 18 left Texas for New Mexico where he entered the ministry of the Methodist Church. He finished high school in New Mexico and worked his way through college at the University of New Mexico, where he received his degree. He also attended classes and seminars at Perkins School of Theology at S.M.U.

Burton served many churches throughout New Mexico during his 41 years of ordained ministry. He was a Board Member of the Methodist Home at Waco for many years and had a Radio Bible Hour in Tucumcari, New Mexico at one time.

Upon retirement from the ordained ministry, Burton economic policy and ignoring underlying causes of the problem. It's like trying to cure cancer with a bandaid. Dr. Frank W.R. Hubert, who will retire as chancellor of the Texas A&M University System on Aug. 31, brought greetings to the graduates from the system. Clyde H. Wells, member of the board of regents of the Texas A&M University System and a former TSU student, was a special guest for commencement.

Summer commencement was held in Wisdom Gymnasium on the TSU campus. Jerry Lynn Brown received a master of Education in Elementary Education, and Stephanie Lee Snider received BS degree in Elementary Education, graduated with honors.

## Sara Jo Hicks Rites Held Thursday

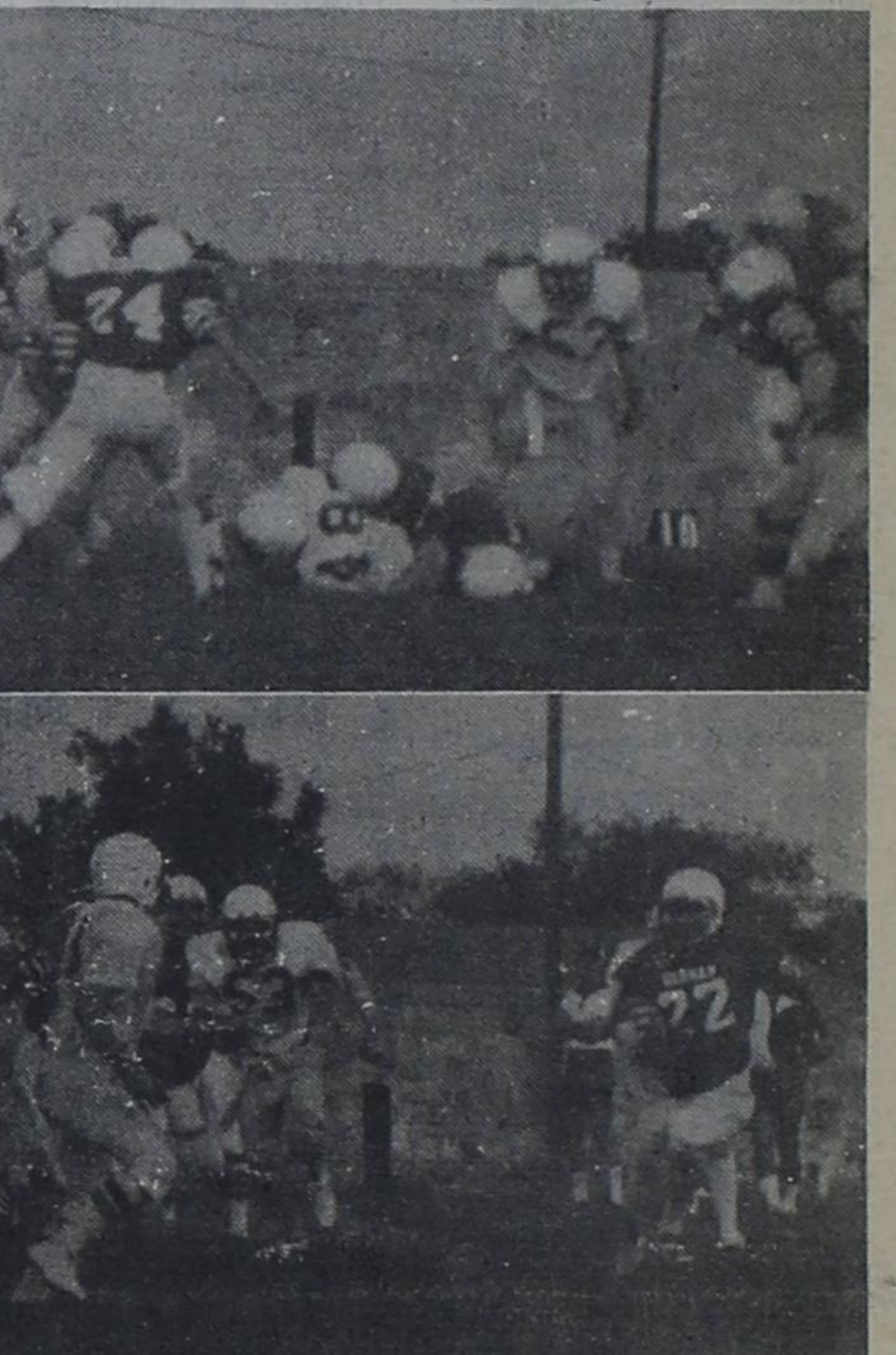
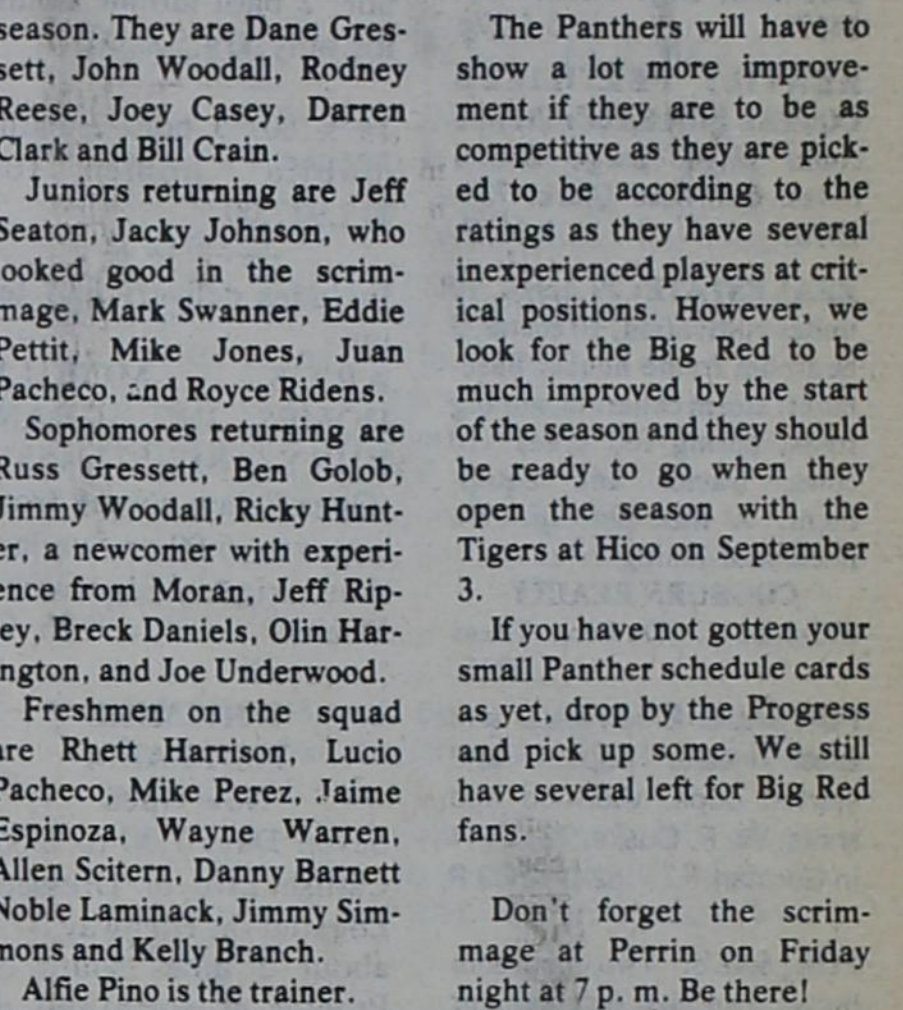

Few things in this country have changed as much during the past few years as public attitudes on drunk drivers. It is a change we can all be thankful for.

Most of that change, in my opinion, can be attributed to the organization of Mothers Against Drunk Drivers (MADD), and the attendant publicity and editorial support they have received from our newspapers. They have succeeded, where others have failed, in drawing attention to the tragedy that has claimed the lives of thousands of Texans.

It was not long ago, for instance, when some public officials who ought to lead by example were openly contemptuous of our laws against driving while drunk. Much of this problem started nine years ago when my opponent became Lt. Governor and helped pass the law reducing the legal drinking age from twenty-one to eighteen years of age. Now Mr.

Hobby, feeling the heat of irate parents and loved ones, and perhaps personal remorse, has said he favors tougher drunk driving laws—another switch from a previous position.

Political promises, however, are easily made. If a politician can't get excited about an issue of this magnitude in nine years, it seems unlikely that he would get excited and pursue corrective legislation in another four years.

So I hope the Mothers Against Drunk Drivers will stick to their guns, and I hope they continue getting support from the people of our state. Their efforts to put an end to this carnage on our highways has my support, and I hope it has yours.

## Changes In Student Legislation

Recent legislation made a number of changes in Social Security benefits. One change affects college and other post-secondary students between the ages of 18 and 22 who are receiving benefits on the record of a retired, deceased or disabled parent. A post-secondary school is a college, university, or approved vocational school.

Under the old law, these students could receive Social Security benefits as long as they were full-time students, unmarried, and under age 22. The new law is gradually phasing out these benefits. By April, 1985, the only students eligible for benefits will be those under age 19 in a high school, junior high school or elementary school. Children under age 18 will continue to receive benefits regardless of their student status.

Those student beneficiaries who were entitled to a check for August 1981 and who were in full-time attendance before May 1982 in a post-secondary school will continue to receive benefits until they marry, reach 22 or are no longer in full-time attendance. However, beginning in 1982, no benefits will be paid for May, June, July or August and these student will not receive any cost-of-living increase. In addition, these students' benefits will be reduced by 25 percent each September when the checks resume.

A student 18 or over who did not receive a Social Security check for August 1982 or who was not in full-time attendance at a college or other post-secondary school before May 1982 will not be entitled to student benefits after July 1982 unless that student is under age 19 and in full-time attendance at a high school, junior high or elementary school. These students will be paid under the old law through July 1982.

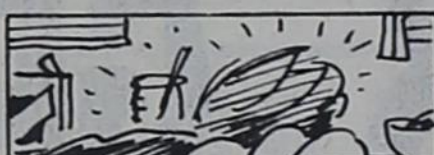

### RECIPE FOR THE WEEK:

Enjoy the mellow goodness of fall pears. You'll certainly want to enjoy some right off the tree or baked in an old-fashioned cobbler.

### PEAR COBBLER:

- 6 medium pears, peeled & sliced
- 1 T. lemon juice
- 3 T. flour
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 t. ground cinnamon
- 1/2 t. ground nutmeg
- 1 T. butter or margarine
- Cheedar Cheese Pastry

Arrange pears slices evenly in a 10 x 6 inch baking dish; sprinkle with lemon juice. Combine flour, sugar, and spices; stir well and sprinkle over pears. Dot with butter.

Roll pastry to 1/4 inch thick. Cut into strips and arrange in lattice fashion over pears. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour.


### CHEDDAR CHEESE PASTRY:

- 1 cup all purpose flour
- 1/2 t. salt
- 1/3 cup shortening
- 1/4 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese
- 2 or 3 T. cold water

Combine flour, salt and cut in shortening with pastry blender. Stir in cheese. Sprinkle cold water over flour mixture and stir with fork until all dry ingredients are moistened. Shape dough into a ball.

## PISTOL PACKIN' ILLEGAL

Q: Can I legally carry my pistol in my car when taking a large sum of money to the bank?

A: No. Carrying your handgun in your car is considered to be "on or about the person" and not legal in Texas.

Q: What is the penalty for unlawfully carrying a pistol in my car in Texas?

A: Unlawfully carrying a handgun in your car is a Class A misdemeanor and is punishable by fine not to exceed \$2,000 and/or one year or less confinement in the County Jail.

Q: Where can I get a license to carry my handgun in Texas?

A: There is NO license to carry a handgun issued in the state of Texas.

Q: If I am stopped by a police officer and charged with illegally carrying a handgun, what should I do?

A: Above all, do not talk with the police officer until your attorney is present. Politely demand to call your lawyer and wait until your lawyer advises you.

# GORDON SPOT

by DeMarquis Gordon

Whether or not to topdress summer pastures is a commonly shared dilemma at this time of the year. Some producers like to wait for rain before topdressing while others prefer to put fertilizer out first.

First, fertilizer must be in the root zone before a crop can use it. If applied before a rain, it will be carried into the soil and both the fertilizer and moisture will be more effective than waiting until after the rain to fertilize.

Second, fertilizer will not lose its effectiveness if applied on dry soil during prolonged dry weather except for urea, which undergoes some hydrolysis reactions that can result in a moderate loss of nitrogen.

Phosphorus and potash needed for next year's perennial grasses can be applied this fall. This is a special advantage if cool season grasses or legumes are to be planted.

Late summer or fall fertilization of summer grasses with nitrogen also can produce additional hay and fall grazing once rains come. This can mean improved grazing and less hay needed to get livestock through the winter.

With fertilizer getting more expensive due to rising costs, producers must continue to pay more attention to getting the most out of the fertilizer they apply. Everyone must assess his own situation regarding topdressing of summer grasses for additional forage to get the most from his fertilizer dollar.

Just how "good" is the hay you harvested this year? It's really hard to tell

without a forage test. The forage test is the only way that a definite feed value can be assigned to a particular lot of hay.

While forage test may cost a few dollars, it can save you dollars supplemental feed or livestock condition.

Feeding low quality hay without supplementation can result in livestock weight losses and reduced rebreeding percentages. At the same time, feeding supplement with top quality hay may not always be necessary.

Only when your hay's feeding value is known can you make a useful decision on the necessity of a protein or energy supplement. The

hay's feeding value might be such that no supplement is needed or it might be such that the animal is slowly starving without a supplement.

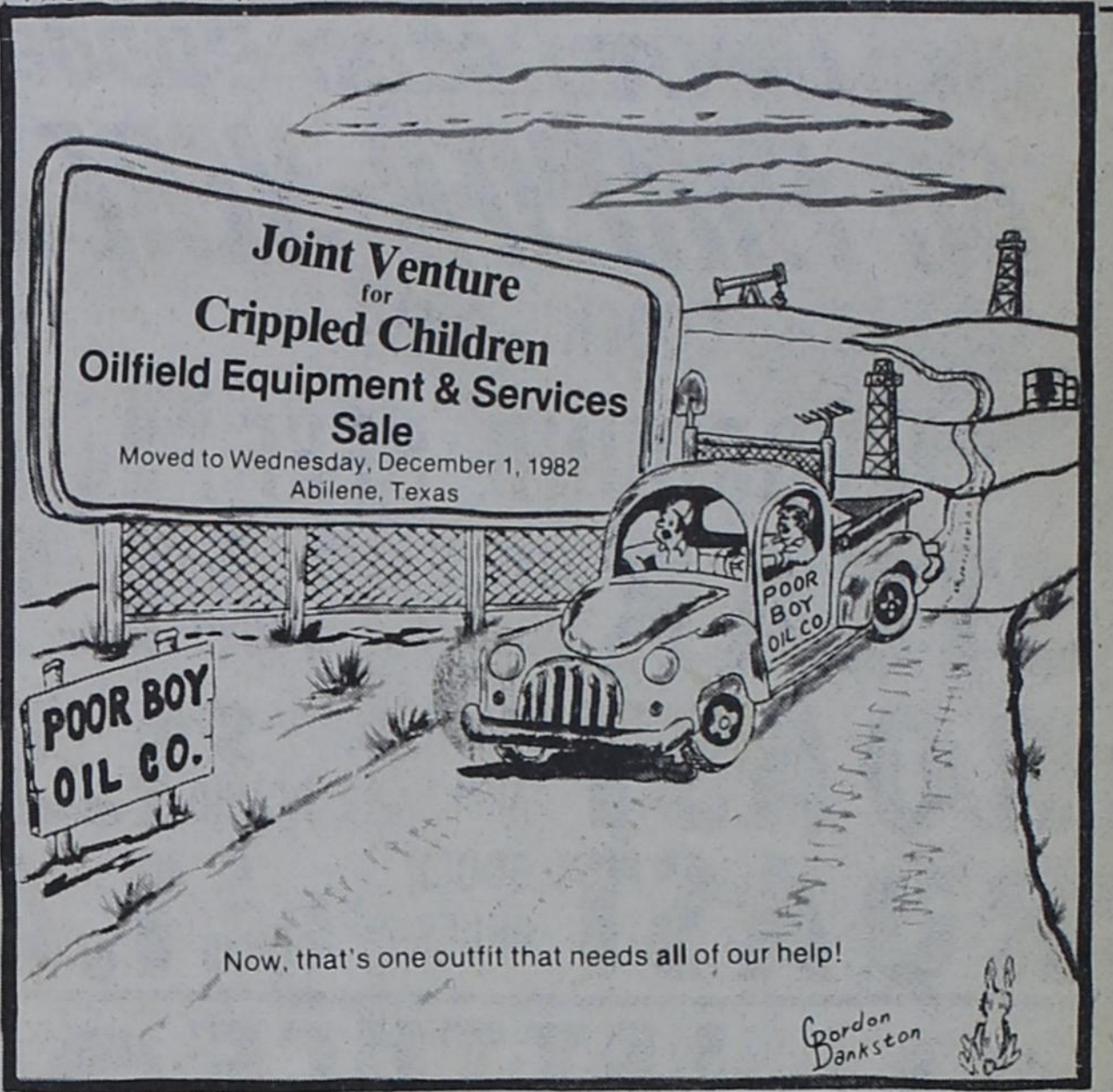
A forage test can give a positive value on which to base a feeding program, and with the high cost of feed, that's essential for a sound management program.

Anyone interested in getting hay tests for protein, fiber, nutrient and mineral content can bring samples to the county Extension office where information forms and mailing containers are available. Forage samples will be sent to the Extension Forage Testing Laboratory, Soil and Crop Sciences Dept., Texas A&M University, College Station, Texas 77843.

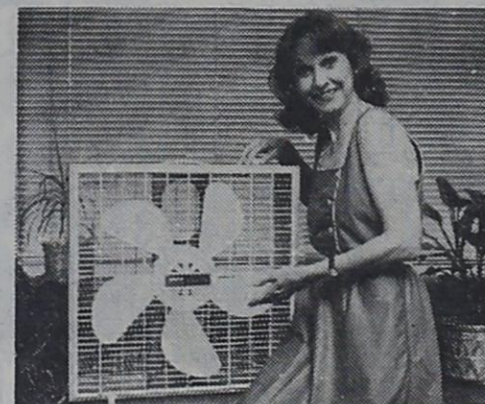
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
