Progress CITY

By Mayor

The Gorman City Commission met in regular meeting on August 5th at 8:00 a.m. with the Mayor and all Commissioners present. Others present were Edna Brinegar, Cecil Funderburg, and Risa Livingston. The bills for the month of July were presented and approved as presented. The Commission heard re-

ports from the Police Department and the Municipal Judge. The police Department reported that fourteen citations had been issued, along with thirty nine warning tickets. Eight citations were for speeding, two for racing on the highway, and one each for no driver's license, expired registration, unsafe backing, and disregarding a stop sign. The warnings were for various violations. During the month they also made sixty investigations of various types such as prowler calls, disturbance calls, open doors and windows, animal calls, burglary, suspicous people, suspicous vechiles, and many others. They provided assistance in eighteen different cases. All in all they had a busy month. Remember that the Police Department is here for your protection and safety, so do not hesitate to call them if they are needed.

The Municipal Court had filed fourteen cases. Six of these had been paid, six pending and two dismissed. A total of \$228.50 had been colected in fines.

rates to the city have been

the increase in July as had been planned because we had not received the final word on the increase. We did receive it when we received our water bill from them and it became effective July 1. We are adjusting the rates to be effective with the August billing. We received a little over a 20% increase. After much discussion on City utilities, we decided that some changes must be made in all of them since they are not paying for the services rendered. We finally arrived at the following increases. For water the minimum will increase from \$5.50 to \$6.75 per month for the first 2000 gallons. All water above 2000 gallons will be raised to \$1.50 per thousand. We had a gratuated scale with cheaper rates for greater usage, but we feel that this should be changed so that all users will pay the same. This practice is used by all other utilities. We raised the trash fee to \$3.00 from the present \$2.50 with commercial pickups being increased by 20%. Sewer rates were increased from the current \$3.50 to \$4.25 per month. This will make the minimum bill in-

crease from the current





FREE SPEECH AND THE A.C.L.U.

On May 20, 1982, U.S. District Judge John Singleton ruled that the children in Aldine schools. outside Houston, could no longer include a phrase praising God in their school song.

That made the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) very happy. They had been party to the suit, claiming that the song violated constitutional provisions of separation of church and state.

On July 3rd, the Supreme Court ruled that states can indeed ban the distribution of child pornography. That made ACLU very unhappy. One of their spokesmen was quoted in the press as complaining this violated the constitutional provisions of free speech.

If this all seems strange to you, perhaps it is because it is strange. The ACL'U is constantly worried about the "free speech" rights of pornographers, but seemingly is on the other side of the fence

when the question turns on the free speech rights of school children. One cannot escape the conclusion that the ACLU would defend the "right" of school children to distribute smut. but they would deny them the right to sing the praises of God.

And if you ever wonder where the ACLU gets the money to pursue its goals, consider this: a lot of rich people in high places give them a lot of money. Our current Lieutenant Governor Hobby, for example, held a fund raiser for them in his Houston home that raised some \$60,000. He is very proud of his efforts in this regard, defending it repeatedly while out on the campaign trail seeking reelection. That is one of the many areas where he and I are in disagreement. I think there are far worthier organizations for Texans to champion. I would appreciate hearing your thoughts. Just write me at 1213 W.





A checklist to help you save energy and money at home.

Energy Conservation Practices

Electricity is costing more this summer mainly because the fuel to make it is costing more. The following low- or no-cost home conservation practices can help you save energy and money.

Do not use air conditioner unless absolutely necessary. Keep your thermostat set no lower than

80° in the summer. Use ceiling or oscillat-

ing fans to circulate the air. Check your air conditioner filters each month to see if they need cleaning or

changing. And make sure that the outside unit is free of grass, leaves and trash. When leaving home, turn off air conditioning. If away for two days or more,

If you have a dishwasher, set water heater to 140°; otherwise, set temperature to 120° or lower.

Use scrap insulation to plug air leaks in attic, around fireplace dampers and window air conditioners.

Repair water leaks in pipes and faucets, and seal air duct leaks. Use drapes, blinds, shades, awnings or

plants to block sunlight. Try to minimize traffic through outside Economize in the kitchen. Plan meals so

several dishes can be cooked in the oven at the same time. Save when you do laundry. Wash and dry only full loads of clothes.

Energy Conservation Measures

These home installations and modifications require an investment, but may return their cost to you in the form of savings on utility bills.

Caulk and weatherstrip around doors and windows to reduce air leaks.

Add insulation to ceilings, walls and floors.

Insulate ducts, especially in the attic. Insulate hot water pipes in attic.

Install insulation blankets on water heaters, especially in garage or basement.

☐ Investigate cost-effectiveness of storm doors and windows.

Add solar-reflecting materials to doors and windows on east/west exposures. Install a clock thermostat to automati-

cally set air conditioner and heating unit to desired temperature. Even when you're away from home, the clock thermostat can control your air conditioner for more economical operation. Investigate

replacing your central air conditioner, especially if unit is more than five years old, with a new unit that has a Seasonal Energy Efficiency
