The odds were against tiny Allison Welch a month ago when she was born 21/2 months prematurely, but at 2 pounds and 3 ounces, she's starting to weigh in as a winner in her struggle to survive.

Allison came home to Texas this week with her parents. Doyle and Elizabeth. When she was born July 24 - weighing only 1 pound and 14 ounces neither doctors nor her parents knew if she'd be alive-to make the trip.

Now her parents are sure she'll do fine in the neonatal unit at Parkland Memorial and "will be a real handful before long.

"We didn't know if she'd be able to breathe on through is with constant attention." her own because she was only 28 weeks old. But she's a fighter. The doctors said they knew she was unusual because she cried right after being born. something not many premature infants do," Mrs. Welch said.

The birth was a surprise to Mr. and Mrs. Welch. who were seeking relief from the Texas summer in De Leon. Comanche County, with a vacation trip to Ouray, an old mining camp in southwest Colorado. When Mrs. Welch went into premature labor, the couple rushed 30 miles to the tiny hospital in Montrose, a mountain town of 5,000 population.

"The doctors there were quite worried because they couldn't stop my labor. At first they hoped the contractions could be controlled and I'd go to full term." she said. "And after they did a sonogram. they said it appeared the baby was about 24 weeks old. They told us they didn't have the setup to handle a case like this.

Mrs. Welch was still in labor when an air ambulance carried her over the Contintental Divide to Denver, where a team of medical specialists waited at the University of Colorado Medical Center. Mrs. Welch's husband and their 4-year old daughter. Melissa, were in the plane with her.

"We were concerned becuase the doctors told us they didn't know if the baby was 'viable' - if she had developed enough to survive. We didn't know until she was born that she was actually 28 weeks old, which gave her better chances of pulling through." Welch said

Mrs. Welch had been in labor 24 hours before Allison's normal delivery, but Denver doctors told the couple the next 72 hours would tell the story. Premature infants such as Allison are considered high-risk patients because their immature organs, especially their lungs, are seldom ready for life outside the womb.

"Premature babies often stop breathing simply, because their lungs aren't big enough and can't stay expanded. They often experience apnea (stop breathing) and bradycardia (slow heartbeat)," said Melanie Hurt, the registered nurse who is clinical supervisor of the neonatal unit at Parkland. "Many need to be on a respirator. The best way to get them

But during the critical first three days, Allison gave the Denver doctors medical proof that her small size didn't limit her staying power. "She's never been on a respirator, and that's very unusual. All the doctors have told us she's a fighter," Welch said.

Even though Allison's lungs are mature enough to permit adequate exchange of oxygen, she still needs close attention, said Dr. William Engle, an assistant professor of pediatrics and gynecology at the University of Texas Health Science Center in Dallas. Allison's covered crib is temperaturecontrolled, and she has to have constant care to make sure she keeps gaining weight and doesn't develop problems. Premature infants weigh so little that it's hard to keep them stable and progressing. Engle said. Parkland nurses will watch Allison around the clock until she weighs 4 pound and 8 ounces, which is expected to take at least a month. "Two weeks after she was born, the staff in Denver said she'd improved enough to that we could bring her back to Texas." Welch said.

"But it took me another two weeks to decide on a hospital in this area. I came back and talked personally with the different hospital staffs. Since Allison can't be with us, we thing it's important our whole family do as much as we can to become close to her while she's still in the hospital. They seem to encourage that attitude here at Parkland." he said. Allison's grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. Bill Parr and "Shorty" Welch of Gorman.
