

# City Chit - Chat

The Gorman City Commission met in regular meeting on September 2 at 8:00 A.M. with the Mayor and all Commissioners present. Others present were Mrs. Brinegar, Chief Funderberg, Judge Ingram, and Gene Barnett.

Bills for the month of August were presented and approved. Reports from heads of the departments were given. Mrs. Brinigar reported that we might not have enough money to pay all of the bills at this time, but we have two Certificates of Deposit that will mature on the 16th of the month. These will give us funds on which to operate. As most of you know, we always get low on funds this time of year before new tax money comes in for the new year. We have run a little closer this year than normal because we have had so many repairs to equipment and have done about \$15,000 worth of pav-

The Police Department reported another busy month having filed twenty one cases in the Municipal Court. Out of the cases filed, seven had paid, two were dismissed and twelve were pending. A total of \$434 had been collected in fines.

The Commission voted to drop personal automobiles not used in a trade or business from the tax roll. We did this after much discussion. Since we were the only taxing body in the county that still had them on the roll, we decided that it would be best to drop them. This will cause a very slight increase in other taxes.

The Commission accepted the resignation of Officer Livingston from the Police Department and hired Alan Swanner to replace her. He will come on the Force on September 19.

The Lone Star representive met with the commission to present their case for a rate increase. They are asking for a 4.58% increase. Many questions were for thirty days so that other facts could be presented.

The Commission discussed the tax rate but did nothing except set Monday, September 13 as a meeting date to set the rate. We met on this date and after much discussion and finding that we needed more information from the County Apprasial Board, we scheduled another meeting for Thursday, September 16 at 9:00 A.M. at which time we hope to arrive at an increase that we can all live with. As you know, our rate last year was 91 cents per \$100 valuation based on what we declared as 100% market value, which we all know was way low. The properties have been appraised and now should be near their market values. Some went way up and some had very little change. We came up with a total of about \$21,000,000 in values. Based on this value we feel that we can set a rate of 30 cents or less per \$100 assessed value and bring in enough money to operate for the next year. With this rate some taxes

One is to help small business borrow money at better rates. Most small businesses which fail do so because they are under-capitalized. To help that situation, franchise tax money would be deposited in participating banks, which would, in turn, make loans at lower rates to small businesses.

The other recommendation is that we form a group of small business development centers at colleges and univer-sities statewide. Money for the centers would come from the U.S. Small Business Administration, the state and par-ticipating schools. The centers would provide training, counseling and other help to small business owners so that they could be more competitive in the marketplace.





On September 8, 1982, Texas Electric Service Company, a subsidiary of Texas Utilities Company, together with Dallas Power & Light Company and Texas Power & Light Company, also subsidiaries of Texas Utilities Company, filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas a joint request for a determination under Section 63 of the Public Utility Regulatory Act that a proposed corporate reorganization involving such companies is consistent with the public interest.

Under the proposed reorganization the three subsidiaries will be consolidated into a single electric utility company, Texas Utilities Electric Company, but each will retain its local identity and continue to provide electric service to its present customers as divisions of the new company. A fourth division will be organized to assume the engineering, design, construction and operation of power plants for the system. The rates for electric service of Texas Electric Service Company will continue in effect for the customers served by it.

Further information concerning this filing may be obtained from the Public Utility Commission of Texas and a copy thereof is available for inspection in each of the company's public business offices.


