Roscoe scored again with about 6 minutes left on a 24 yard pass play from Denman to Russell Cravey. This score was also set up by an interception at the Gorman 29. The kick for point failed and Roscoe led 20-0.

The Plowboys added another score before halftime when they took the ball on their own 30 and in just two plays moved the distance. The first play was a pass for 40 yards, then Pieper broke loose for the final 30 yards for the score with 2:09 left. Williams kicked the PAT and Roscoe led 27-0 at halftime.

The Plowboys didn't pull off after the half and scored two more times before pulling the troops. The first score after the half came on a pass to Craig Raughton for 35 yards after Roscoe recovered a Panther fumble at the Gorman 35. Williams added the PAT and Roscoe led 34-0.

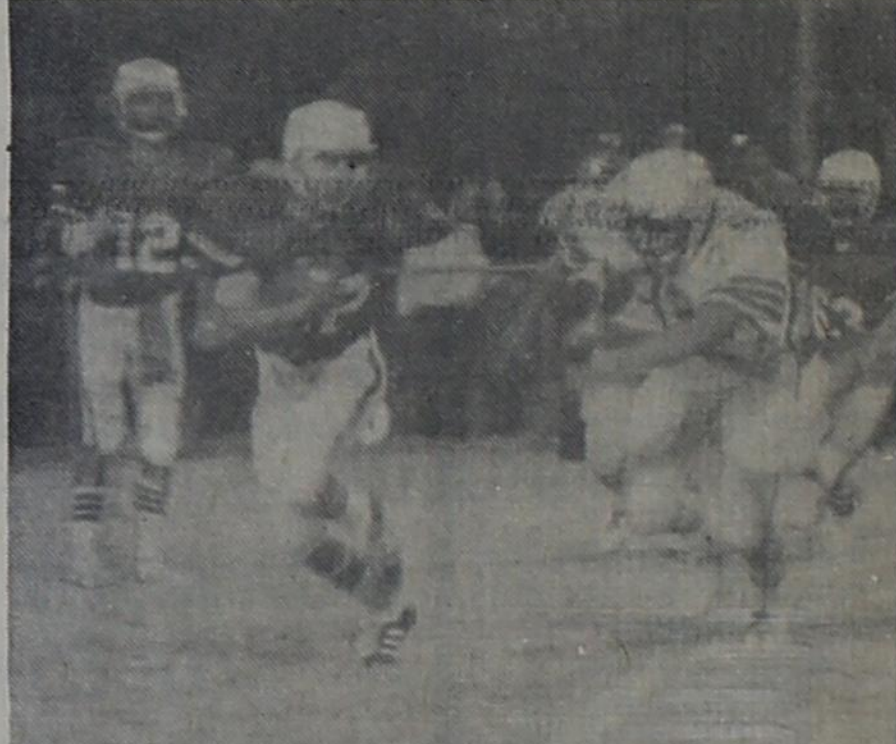
The next score came on a 19 yard run by Pieper with 2:47 left. This score followed an interception on the Roscoe 9. Williams added the PAT and the score was 41-0.

Then after the first team troops were pulled, the Plowboys added another TD with 5:49 left in the game when Johnny Moorehead went 15 yards for the score. This score came after a blocked punt was recovered at the Gorman 24. The kick for point failed and the final score read Roscoe 47 and Gorman 0.

I don't think most folks were surprised that the Plowboys won the game but rather by the margin of victory. The Panther fans are real proud of the Panthers and the fact that they were in the playoffs again this year, but with the lack of weight and size the Panthers have really been up against it this season. But in a season that they went 7-4 when they were really expected to go only about 5-5, the fans cannot be nothing short of proud of our Panthers. It was a rather crazy season with so many district games, but maybe the Panthers can put on some weight by next season and get a little more size which will help considerably. So Panther fans will be looking forward to next season.

Mark Swanner led the Panthers with 101 yards on 18 carries. Jacky Johnson had 13 on 3. Ricky Hunter got 6 on 5, and Rhett Harrison carried the ball twice for 4 yards. Dane Gressett wound up with a minus 12 on two keeps, and one of the losses was on a pass attempt.

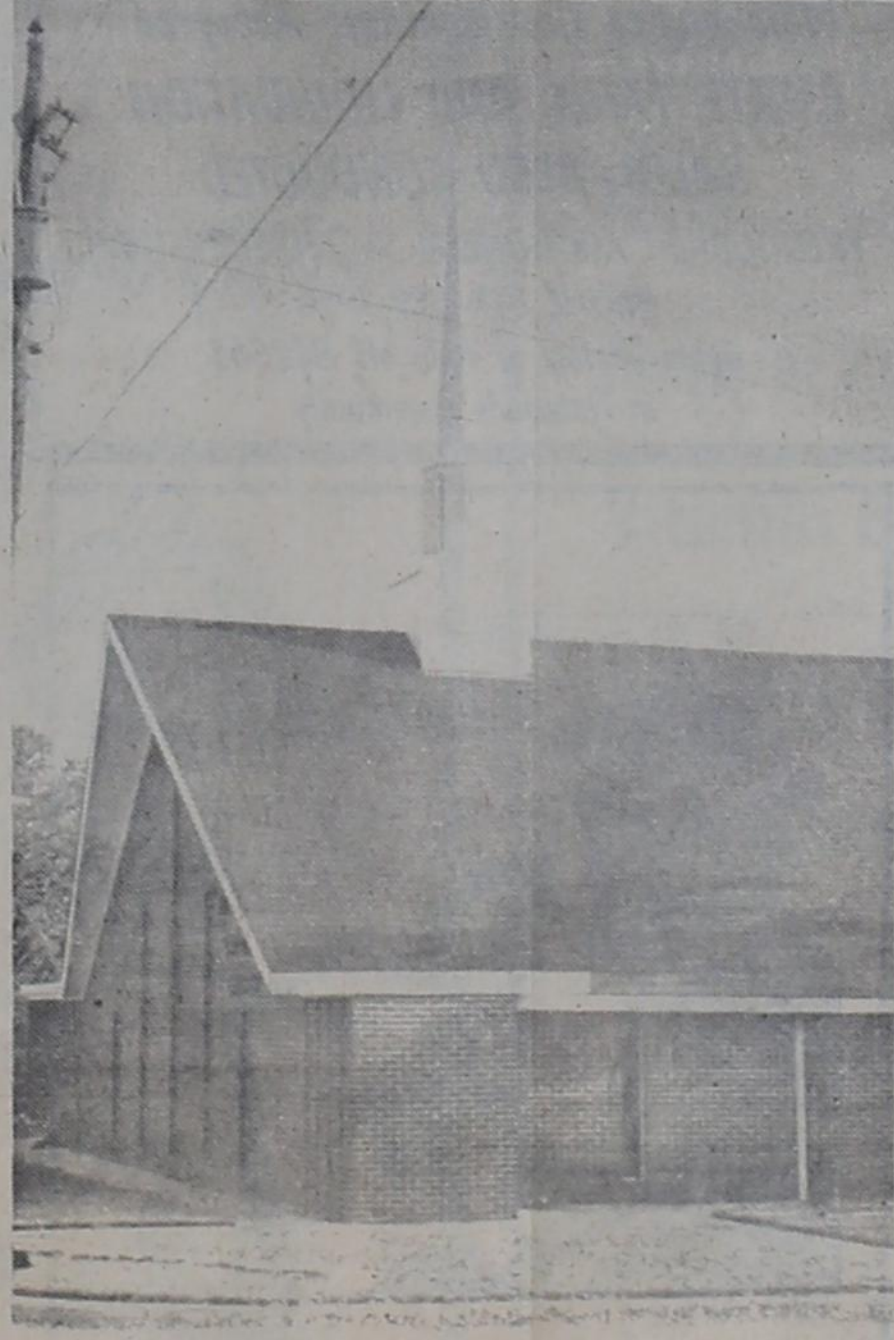

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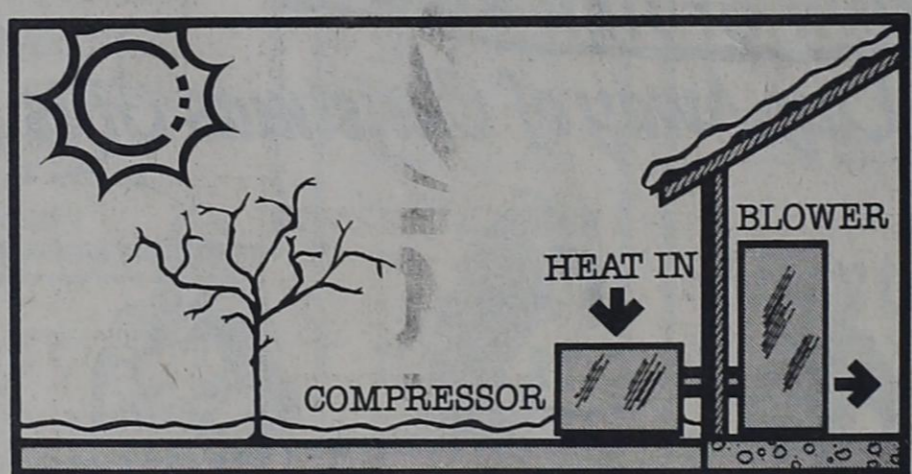
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
