CITY CHIT CHAT

The Gorman City Commission met in regular session on December 2 with the Mayor and all commissioners except Frank Leazar present. Others meeting with the commission were Mrs. Brinegar, Chief Funderburg, Mr. Harold Fritz, Judge Ingram, Mr. Max Grice, Mr. Presley Duke, Mr. Delton Ake, and Mr. Barnett.

Minutes of the last meeting were read and approved and the bills for the month of November were approved. Reports were given to the commission from Mrs. Brinegar on taxes collected to the end of November which was about \$13,000. This is some \$2,000 less than was collected at the same time last year.

Chief Funderburg reported that the Police Department had had a pretty busy month. The department issued 20 traffic citations for speeding, no drivers license, driving on wrong side of road, backing unsafely, and a defective exhaust system. Six arrests were made for various violations. Many service calls were made. Mrs. Ingram reported that 11 cases had been filed. Three had been paid and eight were pending. Fines in the amount of \$197.50 had been collected.

Mr. Barnett reported that we had some damage to the landfill machine from gun fire. People are warned about shooting in that area.

All others who were there in connection with the rate hike request by Lone Star Gas Company. After listening to all parties present, the Commission made a counter offer on the requested rate hike. Mr. Ake stated that he would check with the office in Dallas and see if they would accept the offer. I have been notified that they would not accept the offer. We are having a called meeting on Thursday, December 10 to decide whether we will accept 70% of what they requested or let them take the case to the Texas Railroad Commission for a settlement. You will be informed later on this matter.

Take note of the fact that the City Office will be closed on Friday, December 24th and Friday, December 31st with no activities being conducted on these days. Please take care of your business by closing time on Thursday.

BOB BULLOCK OPPOSES GASOLINE TAX

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Tuesday President Reagan's suggested 5-cent-per-gallon gasoline tax increase would leave "Texas on the short end of the stick again."

The Comptroller explained a federal hike would preempt the talked-about increase in Texas state gasoline tax, which has been at the same nickel-a-gallon level for the past 25 years.

"This is going to cost Texans 1480 million a year," Bullock said. "This is money the Texas Legislature won't be able to spend if it's needed because we'll be

"Historically, we Texans have only gotten about 70 cents back for every dollar in motor fuel taxes we have sent to Washington. We've got roads and bridges right here at home that need to be repaired. We could raise the money to pay for this work here in Texas if Reagan would live up to his word to get the federal government off our backs. If this idea becomes law, it will hit every Texan right in the pocket-book."

Bullock also pointed out the President's top economic advisor, Martin Feldstein, has said the President's proposal will cost more jobs than it would create.

The Texas Highway Commission has proposed increasing the Texas tax by the same nickel per gallon as suggested by the administration.

"We are being undercut by the federal government. If this proposal gets remodded through Congress, Texans can look forward to higher taxes and deeper potholes while their hard-earned money creates a piddling number of jobs somewhere else," Bullock said.


