Hasty - Hammit Exchange Vows in Outdoor Ceremony

Spencer of Abilene officiated the double ring ceremony. The bride is the daughter of Mrs. and Mrs. Nolan C. (Jack) Hasty of De Leon. Parents of the groom are Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Hammit of San Antonio.

Vows were repeated beneath an outdoor mombuay net canopy. Four large wicker baskets containing baby's breath and silk flowers in the bride's chosen colors of champagne, chocolate, and ecru framed either side.

Escorted to the altar area by her father, the bride wore a formal white gown designed by Milady. The semi-empire waisted gown featured a fitted bodice of re-embroidered French Alencon lace and a Queen Anne neckline encrusted with seed pearls. The sheer bishop sleeves were highlighted by lace and by petal point length cuffs having matching lace detail.

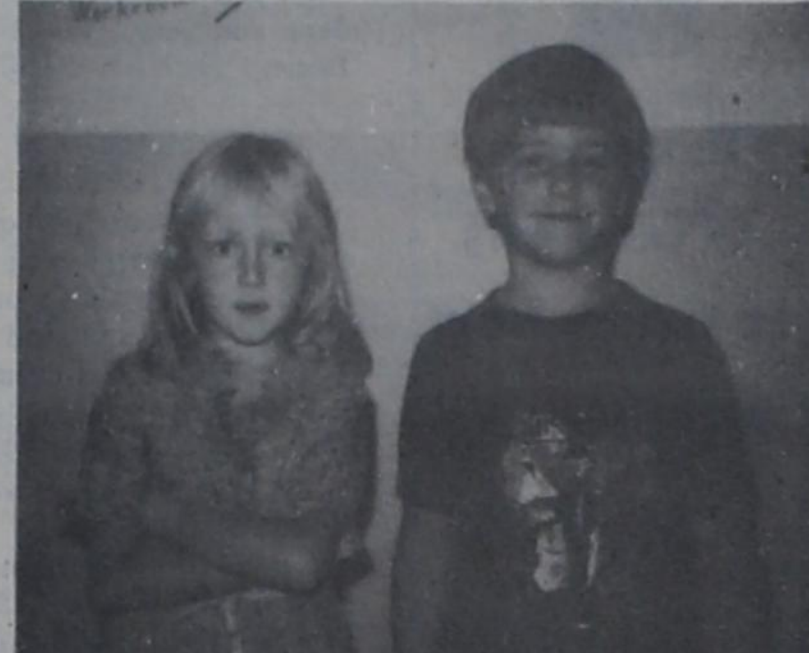

The Gorman Panthers got back on the winning track on Friday night when they traveled to Rochelle to take on the Hornets in District 8-A play and came away with an easy, one-sided victory by blanking the Hornets 44 to 0 to make their district record read 2 and 1.

The Panthers wasted little time showing their defensive intentions for the evening as they held the Hornets on their first possession. They took the ball on their own 44 and scored in 8 plays with Mark Swanner getting the final 16 yards on a beautiful run with 6:53 left in the period. The drive featured a 25 yard scamper by Jacky Johnson and a 26 yard pass to Eddie Pettit. A pass to Jeff Seaton from Dane Gressett added the two pointer and Gorman led 8-0.

The Big Red defense again held the Hornets and took the punt on their own 45. The Panthers scored in 8 plays with Dane Gressett getting the final 2 yards on a keeper play with 11:22 left in the second period. The drive included a pass to Seaton for 12; a 21 yard run by Pettit, and a 12 yard pass to Swanner. The run for two points failed and Gorman led 14-0.

The Panther defense again held the Hornets and took the ball on their own 21. They scored in 10 plays with Ricky Hunter getting the final 11 yards on a great run with just 3:05 left in the half. The drive featured a 9 yard run by Rhett Harrison; a 21 yard pass to Ricky Hunter; a 14 yard by Hunter; and a 6 yard run by Gressett. The try for two points failed and Gorman led 20-0.

The Panthers added another score before halftime as the Big Red defense again held the Hornets. The Panthers took the ball on their own 30 and scored in just 4

plays with Gressett tossing a strike to Swanner for the final 5 yards with just 14 seconds left in the half. The score was set up by a thrilling 55 yard scamper by Johnson and a 7 yard run by Hunter to set the Panthers up with a first and goal at the 5. Swanner ran for the two pointer and Gorman led 28-0 at halftime.

The second half saw the Panther substitutes playing most of the way.

The first score of the second half came on a beautiful 41 yard scamper by Hunter with 2:30 left in the third. The drive featured a 47 yard breakaway run by Mark Swanner and a 15 yard run by Hunter. A pass to Seaton added the two pointer and Gorman led 36-0.

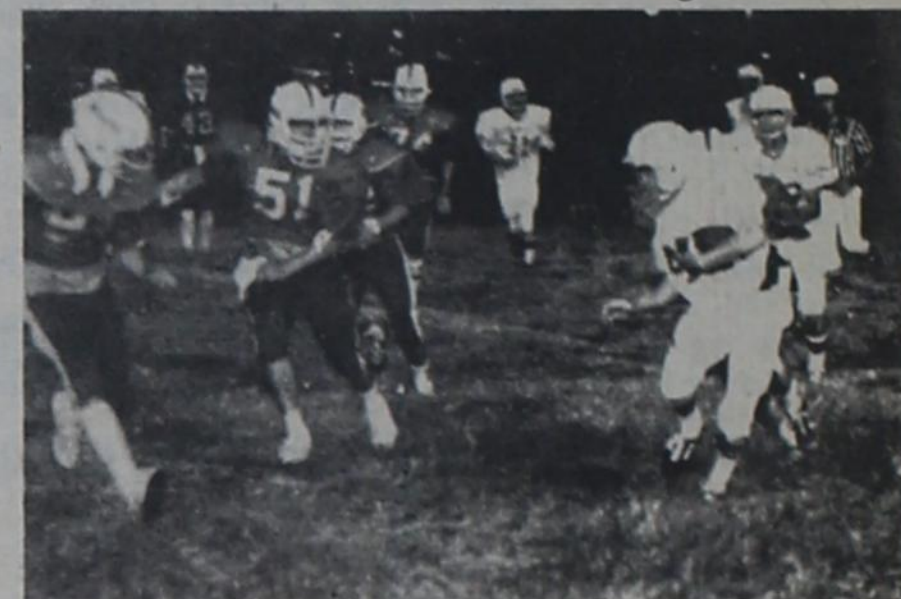
Then with 7:12 left in the game, Eddie Pettit thrilled the crowd by going 82 yards for the score. Johnson added the two pointer to make the final score read 44-0.

The Big Red defense really did a job on the Hornets, allowing them only 58 yards of total offense with 56 on the

ground and 1 yard in the air. The Hornets had only 5 first downs. The defense was led by Rodney Reese, Royce Ridens, Juan Pacheco, Joey Casey, and Russ Gressett. The entire defense did a great job.

Eddie Pettit led the Panthers on the ground with 108 yards on 5 carries. Ricky Hunter had 99 on 6; Johnson got 90 on 5; Swanner had 50 on 8; Harrison got 33 on 5; Luccio Pacheco and Jimmy and John Woodall also carried the ball.

This Friday night the Panther defense will be truly tested as they take on the Cross Plains Buffaloes. The Buffs were defeated by the Eagles by the score of 36-14, having a good offensive team by scoring 14 points on Goldthwaite. The Buffs defeated Santa Anna last week. So the Big Red defense will need a top-notch effort in this 7:30 game at Brogdon Field Friday night. And we think they will be true to the test and come out with another victory. Right, Panthers? Get 'Em Big Red!
