



New Sales Tax Exemption

Comptroller Carol Keeton Rylander announces new sales tax exemption on over-the-counter medicines. Starting April, Texas consumers will no longer pay sales tax on most nonprescription pills, potions and ointments kept in the average home medicine cabinet to treat minor illnesses and injuries.

The tax break is expected to save Texas families about \$160 million in state and local sales taxes during its first full year, 2001.

"Exempting over-the-counter medicines from the sales tax is long overdue," Comptroller Rylander said. "Prescription drugs have been tax exempt since the state sales tax was enacted in 1961. Paying sales tax on nonprescription medicine is a bitter pill to swal-

"The tax burden on working texas families is too high," Comptroller Rylander said. "This new tax exemption on over-the counter medicines is a way to ease the tax burden and help families stretch their budgets a little farther."

To be tax exempt, a product must be a drug or medicine: an article or substance intended for use in diagnosis, cure, mitigation, treatment or prevention of disease or suffering. The drug or medicine must be intended for human use and must have a National Drug Code (NDC) number issued pursuant to U.S. Food and Drug Administration regulations.

The sales tax exemption does not apply to medical equipment, appliances and devises such as thermometers, heating pads, toothbrushes and dental floss. However, the legislature voted specifically to apply the new sales tax exemption to blood glucose monitoring strips. Previous law exempts orthopedic braces, crutches, wheelchairs, hearing aids and batters, hypodermic needles and syringes from the sales tax. This will not change.


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
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
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SECTION 2.04. LICENSE REQUIRED

All dogs and cats three months of age or older which are kept, harbored or maintained within the corporate limits of the City shall be licensed. Cat and dog licenses shall be provided by the Animal Control Officer or his agent upon payment of the required fee for each cat or dog. Before a City License will be issued, the owner of the cat or dog must present a certificate from a licensed veterinarian showing that such cat or dog has been vaccinated fro rabies within the preceding 12 months. The owner shall state his/her name and address, and the breed, color and sex of the cat or dog to be licensed. Such license shall be valid for two years from the date of issuance. License fees shall not be required for seeing eye dogs or governmental police dogs. The fee for a dog or cat shall be set by the City Council and amended as needed. The List of Fees shall be found in Article Seven of this Ordinance. SECTION 1.03. PENALTIES.

Any person who violates any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$500.00. Each day of violation, each separate animal and each ncident of violation of this title shall constitute a separate offense. SECTION 2.06 ENFORCEMENT.

For the purposes of discharging the duties imposed by this article, and to enforce its provisions, any peace officer or Animal Control Officer is empowered to enter upon any premises upon which an animal is kept or harbored and demand the exhibition by the owner of such animal or the license for such animal in accordance with the provisions of this article, to include random citywide canvassing and checks for compliance with the article. The owner of any animal is required to produce the license and vaccination information for each animal in his ownership upon demand by an Animal Control Officer or peace officer.

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

Fat Is Back! Nutritionist Tells Why The Right Fats Are Essential To Your Health



Ann Louise Gittleman - leading nutritionist debunks the fat myth.

(DM)-Ann Louise Gittleman wants you to welcome healthy fat back into

Gittleman is a former nutrition director of the Pritikin Longevity Center and the best selling author of 15 books on nutrition and health, including "Beyond Pritikin" and, her latest, "Eat Fat, Lose Weight - How the Right Fats Can Make You Thin For Life." She maintains that the first step in achieving control over your health, weight and body shape is to overcome the conventional wisdom that fat is bad for you.

"Do you want to lose weight, or do you want to look and feel healthy?," asks Gittleman. "Focusing only on weight loss is not the answer!"

Gittleman points out that since we've cut the fat from our diets Americans have gotten fatter - 55% of Americans have become overweight since we've gone low fat. She insists that a diet without fat will not succeed. Fat retards food absorption, making you feel full longer. Therefore you're not looking for something to eat every 15 minutes.

And, according to Gittleman, it is not even the amount of fat that really matters - it is the kind of fat. Adequate amounts of certain essential fats can no longer be found in popular food choices or in currently "chic" diets. For example, researchers say that the switch in recent years from grass to grain in cattle feed has resulted in an 80% decrease in the natural availability in meat of the important fatty acid conjugated linoleic acid (CLA).

Studies at the University of Wisconsin in Madison, where CLA was discovered and developed, have shown that the naturally occurring fatty acid inhibits the body's ability to store fat. It also prompts the body to burn stored fat as energy. The result is a decrease in body fat and a proportional increase in muscle tissue that, in turn, burns more calories than fat does. Gittleman recommends adding Tonalin CLA as a supplement to your meals, calling it her "magic bullet for the millennium."

Gittleman warns that processed

and refined carbohydrates, as well as the highly touted complex carbohydrates (potatoes, corn and brown rice), are absorbed by your body quickly, much the way simple sugars

Many individuals have substituted unlimited fat-free carbohydrates, like fat-free yogurt and cookies as well as bagels, for the missing fat. These foods not only add up in calories, but they promote the production of the fat-storing hormone insulin, that deposits these extra carbohydrate calories as body fat. To make matters worse, elevated insulin levels block the body's ability to burn stored body fat for energy.

The solution is to make room for healthy fats, found in fatty fish, olive oil, nuts, seeds and Tonalin CLA, that promote satiety, level blood sugar, and help absorb the fat-soluble anti-oxidants like Vitamin A and E.

"In the past, too many Americans have bought in to the fat-free hoax and developed a phobia about fat," says Gittleman. "To stay healthy and be thinner doesn't require dieting, it demands a change in the way people eat, and that includes embracing slimming and healing fats as part of your daily nutritional input."

TEXANS SET THEIR TAX-CUT PRIORITIES

s is usually the case, Texans were not shy about offering comments on the taxes they pay. In my annual questionnaire, which was published last December, I asked you to rank the importance of three potential ways to lower federal taxes: eliminating the marriage tax penalty, abolishing the inheritance or death tax, or giving all taxpayers an across-the-board 1 percent tax cut.

The mail really rolled in on this one, with 72 percent of you indicating your top priority would be a 1 percent, across-the-board tax cut. The remaining 28 percent of you split evenly between doing away with the inheritance tax or ending the marriage tax penalty.

Here are some of your comments on this question:

From San Antonio: "We need some across-the-board tax relief. We are lucky enough to make more than the average family, but we don't make enough to have any significant tax shelters or loopholes. We've worked hard and saved to get what we have. We gave up boats, RVs and other pleasures to put our kids through college without a single dollar of financial aid or tax break."

Cleburne: "Give every working American a tax cut. The surplus was made possible by government taxing us more than necessary. Let working people keep their money instead of sending it to Washington."

Dickinson: "Any tax relief would be welcome. The 1 percent could make a real difference for us. We feel the marriage tax penalty the most — when it means the difference between just scraping by and actually being able to enjoy the fruits of all our hard work."

Tomball: "The 'death tax' taxes both the living and the dead. Please do away with the inheritance tax first, and stop the double taxation of the same money."

San Antonio: "The marriage penalty is ridiculous and very anti-family. My husband and I sacrifice to pay taxes every April even though extra tax money is deducted from our salaries during the year. Single friends earning a comparable amount of money always get a tax refund, but we don't."

Gorman: "Since I am 60, married and in the \$60,000 range, all three of these tax-cut questions affect me. The inheritance tax is probably the most unfair tax there is. It should have never been enacted. The marriage penalty is just another blow against the sanctity of marriage. In most couples today, one partner works just to pay their income taxes. Why does the government penalize success in the middle income bracket?"

Dumas: "The 'death tax' is unjust. Why is it taking so long to phase it out? It should be abolished now. It has already destroyed more family farms and ranches than all the bad bank loans ever did."


Eagle Pass: "Doing away with the marriage tax penalty is first on our list. We are a working-class family. Please keep this in mind when decisions that affect us must be made."

Santa Fe: "The marriage tax and the inheritance tax should both be abolished. The income tax should be reduced by 5 percent."

Seguin: "Doing away with the inheritance tax is the most important. It forces couples (who may live another 20 years) to give away their prosperity so the IRS can't take it. My husband, who is 75 years old, is active in our small business and doesn't want to give it away and retire."

I remain committed to all three ways of cutting federal taxes. Last year Congress passed a comprehensive tax-relief plan that addressed all three of these priorities, but still allowed for a dramatic pay down of the national debt and dedicated all Social Security payroll taxes to Social Security. Unfortunately, President Clinton vetoed it.

We're going to try again this year by passing marriage tax penalty relief. Since I started this drive in 1997 to end the marriage tax penalty, American married couples have sent \$90 billion to Washington in marriage tax penalty payments. The federal government should not penalize couples for being married. We can afford to end this practice, and I think we have a good chance of succeeding.
