Drivers of Farm Vehicles Gets Six Months Exemption

AUSTIN Drivers of farm vehicles are temporarily exempt from compliance with new safety regulations established by the U.S. Department of Transportation's Bureau of Motor Carrier Safety for drivres involved in interstate commerce. Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White says that considerable confusion has that considerable confusion has developed among farm vehicle drivers following adoption of the new safety standards, but that an amendment to the regulations adopted January 1st, 1971, exempts drivers of farm vehicles for a six-month period until July 1, 1971.


