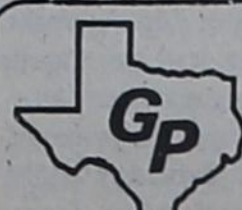

## VOTER TURNOUT IS LARGE HERE

The Democratic Primary Election held Saturday drew 404 voters to the polls, a larger percentage than most other cities in the state reported.

In the local offices on the ballot, Vardie Huff won the Justice of the Peace post. He received 219 votes in Gorman and 68 votes in Carbon. Patsy J. Ingram, the incumbent, received 181 in Gorman and 39 in Carbon. Mary Jane Rowch received 103 votes in Gorman and Marciel Justice received 283. Mrs. Rowch was elected to the office.

Mozelle Rhymes received 356 votes to be re-elected as Precinct Chairman.

Mrs. Scott Bailey received 329 votes for County Democratic Chairman.

Joann Johnson received 339 votes for County Clerk.

Scott Bailey received 321 votes for County Judge.

Emory Walton received 325 votes for District Attorney.

Roy Rawls received 249 votes for Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals of Precinct 2.

Jim Parker received 297 votes for State Senator for District 22 and Lee Haney received 56 votes.

Lloyd Bentsen received 305 votes for U. S. Senator and Joe Sullivan polled 65.

Charles Stenholm received 226 votes for U. S. Representative in the 17th District.

Mark White led the ticket with 166 votes for Governor. The closest opponent, Bob Armstrong, polled 124. Buddy Temple received 86 votes.

Bill Hobby polled 311 votes for Lt. Governor. Troy Shoates received 52 votes.

John Hannah received 157 votes for Attorney General. Jim Mattox polled 132, Max Sherman, 72, and Jack Ogg, 9.

## Right to Deferred Loan Repayment Granted

# Panel Gives Farmers Reprieve

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Agriculture Committee, struggling to find ways to keep financially pressed farmers operating, approved credit legislation Tuesday that includes the right to demand repayment deferral on federal farm loans.

"We do have a serious problem out there," said Rep. Leon Panetta, D-Calif. "We need to have the Farmers Home Administration bend over backwards." Although the committee rejected a plan to impose a state-by-state moratorium on loan foreclosures by the FmHA, members said endorsement of the repayment deferral clause was tantamount to a moratorium for farmers in the worst financial shape. "We got what we wanted," said Rep.

Byron Dorgan, D-N.D., who has been pushing for a moratorium on FmHA loan foreclosures. But Dorgan predicted a major battle over deferral in the full House.

Committee members said the deferral clause will effectively halt any federal effort to foreclose on or force repayment of FmHA loans before October 1983.

The Congressional Budget Office, in an unofficial analysis, said criteria for deferral are so broad that as many as 96,000 farmers holding \$7.7 billion in FmHA loans could qualify.

The Reagan administration opposes both a moratorium and the deferral clause.

The deferral provision is part of basic farm-credit legislation that calls for

FmHA lending ceilings generally higher than President Reagan wanted and retains lending programs and subsidized interest rates the president wanted to end in his drive to curb federal intrusion in the credit market.

FmHA, the Agriculture Department's credit arm, handles about 12 percent of all farm credit, serving as a lender for farmers who cannot obtain credit through traditional channels.

FmHA Administrator Charles Schuman said the depressed farm economy has pushed delinquencies on FmHA loans to 10 percent above last year's level. At the beginning of this year, farmers holding more than 66 percent of FmHA's four basic agriculture loans were \$4.3 billion in arrears.

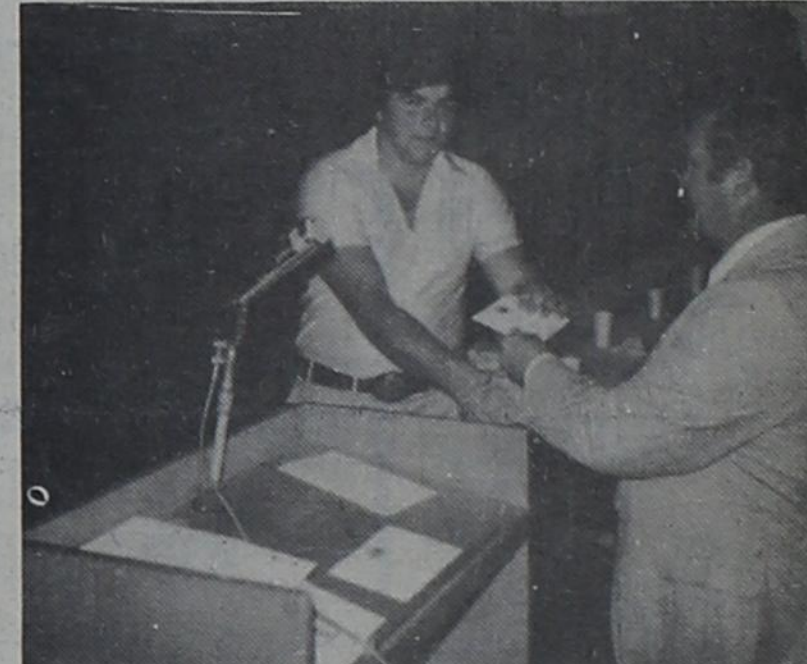

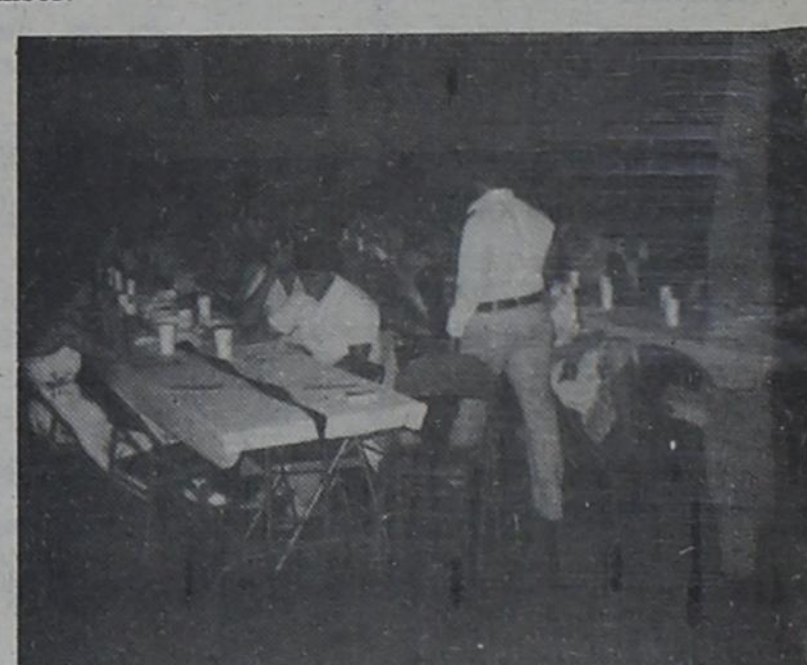

Computers in farm & ranch management is a new technology many producers are considering and ask questions about says Gordon.

Gordon says the afternoon session will be devoted to one hour concurrent sessions. Six stations will include several commodity areas and will be an opportunity for each of the participants to see various computers programs operate, as well as providing hands-on operation. If you do not want to become interested in computers, you should not attend this afternoon session reports Gordon. After seeing how simple they are to operate and the vast amount of information that could be immediately available, it will change your outlook toward computers.

He says some questions he is asked include: Should I consider a computer in my farm or ranch operation? What is computer software? The meeting will answer these questions and provide you with the opportunity to actually operate a computer program.

The main objective of this workshop is to provide an introduction to computers in agriculture for producers and farm supplies. This workshop will be limited to approximately 60 individuals on a first come, first serve basis.

The program starts at 9:00 a.m. with "Introduction to Computers." Other presentations include: Farm and Ranch Electronic Decisions Aids--What they are and what they can do, what's available in computers, and selecting a microcomputer system. The final formal presentation that morning

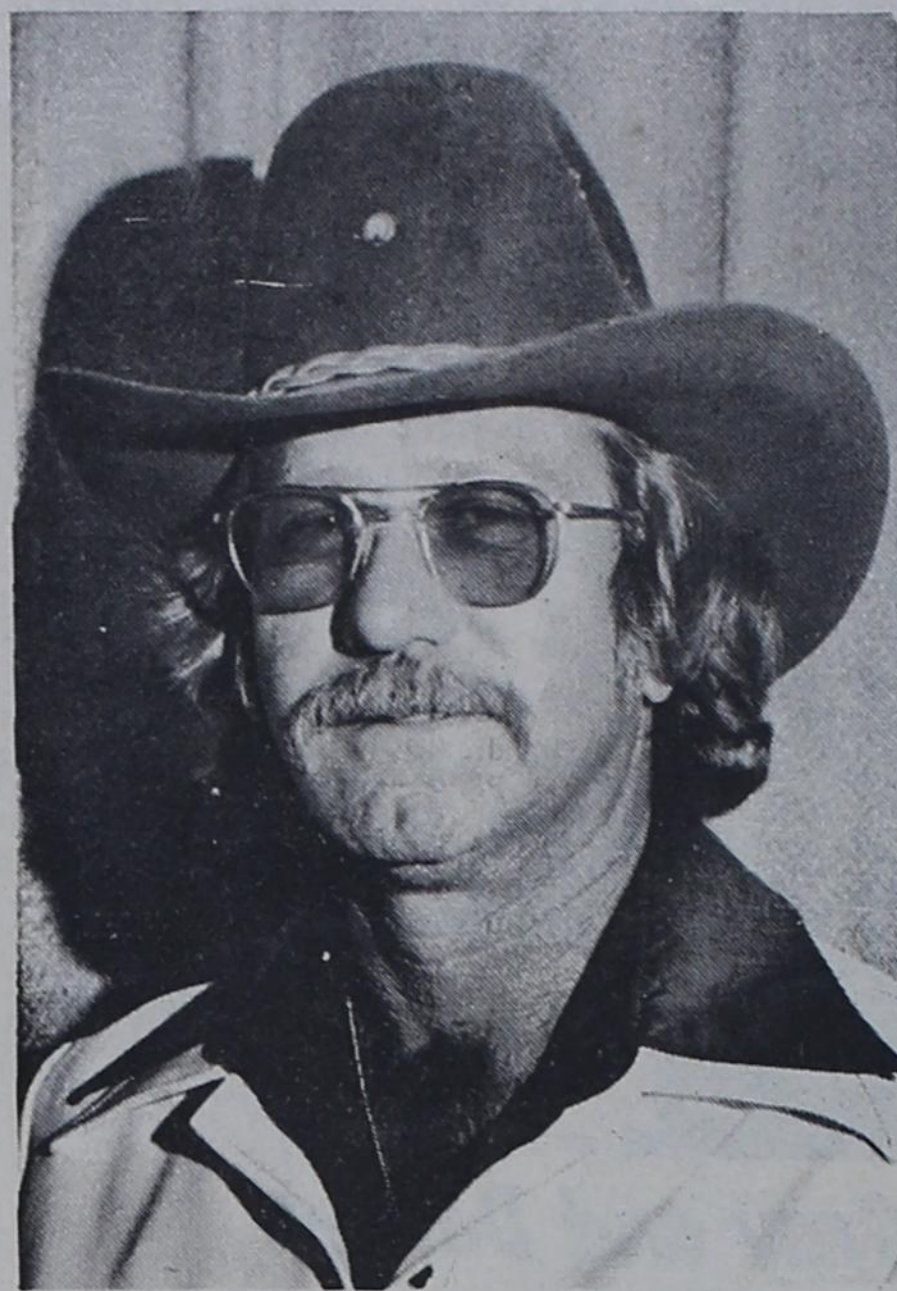

Department of Energy (DOE) Award for Valor, the highest DOE award granted in recognition of acts of heroism or courage involving great personal risk to employees.

The awards were presented by Joseph Tribble, Assistant Secretary for Conservation and Renewable Energy, at a ceremony held April 26, 1982, at Western Area Power Administration (WAPA) Headquarters in Golden, Colorado. WAPA Administrator Robert McPhail gave the welcome address. The linemen are all employed by WAPA's Phoenix District Office in Arizona.

Alsabrook and linemen David Bothwell, Richard Bullock, James Clark, Clifford Cooper, and James Luna were honored for their efforts in rescuing the pilot of a private aircraft that crashed into a 230-kV transmission line in northwestern Arizona about 2 miles north of Bullhead City Airport. The plane became entangled in the lines and hung upside-down by only one wheel. The pilot was trapped inside for almost 5 hours and electric power to nearby Kingman, Arizona was disrupted.

The line crew was on temporary assignment in Kingman when the blackout occurred. They immediately responded to the emergency situation, working through the night to rescue the pilot, remove the airplane from the lines, and restore power to the residents of Kingman.

The linemen have also received Special Acts Awards from WAPA, and Life-saving Award Plaques from the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW).

Alsabrook has been employed as a lineman with WAPA for 4 years. He had 21 years of previous experience working out of IBEW Local 769 in Phoenix, Arizona.

He currently resides in Phoenix with his wife, Marlene, and children, Billy, Verna and Mich'ile.

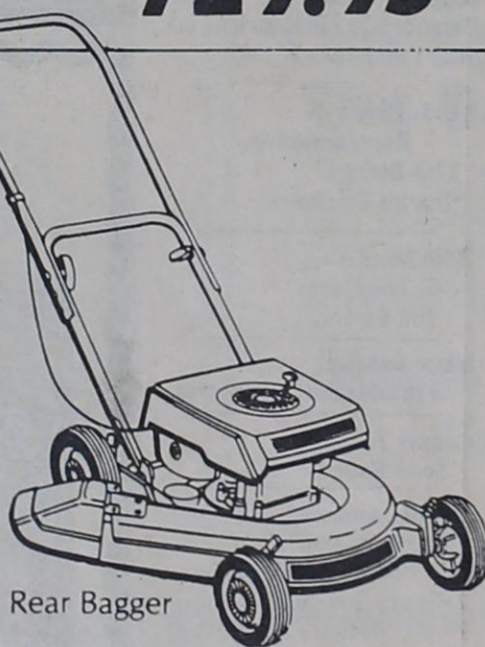

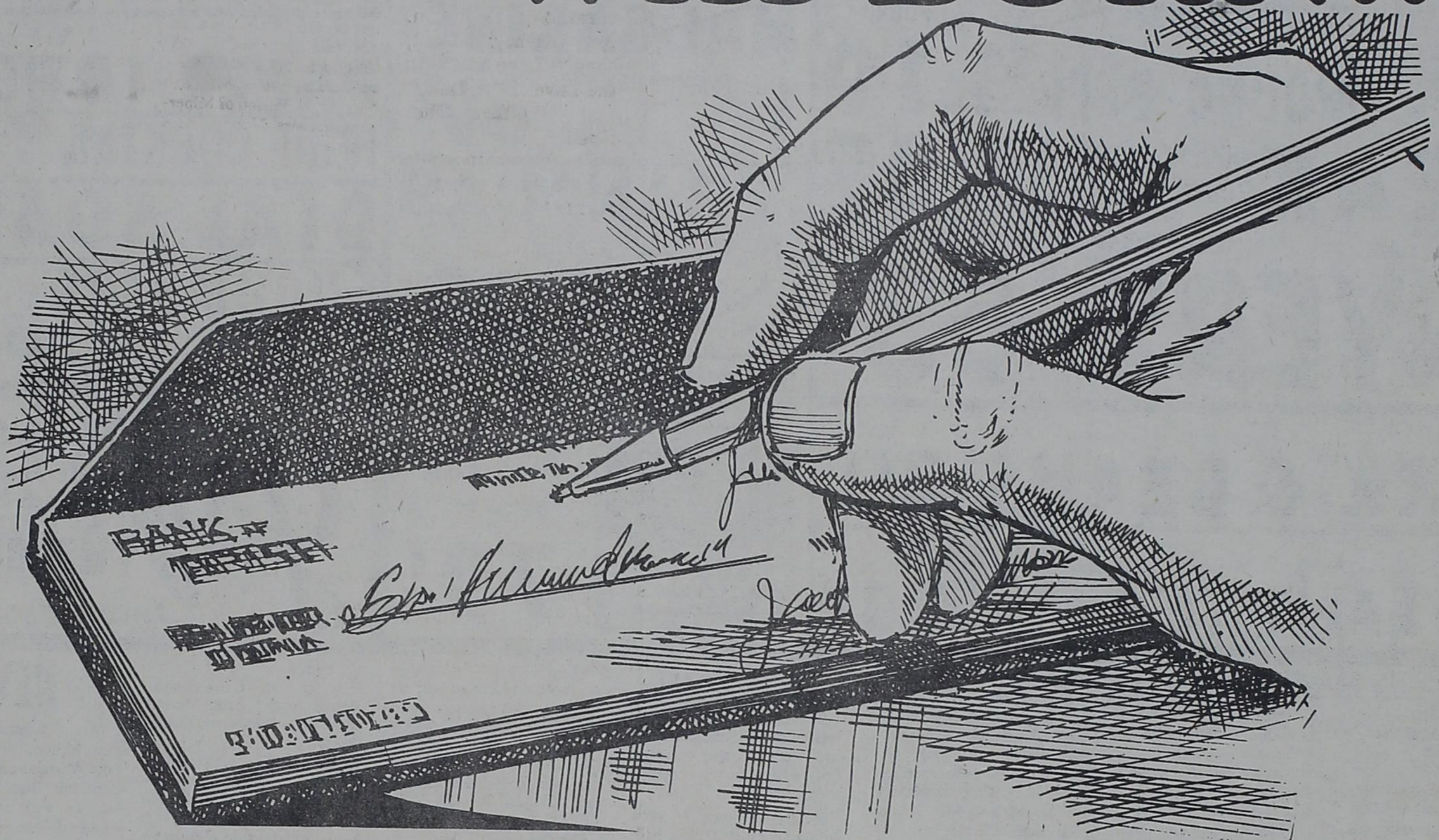

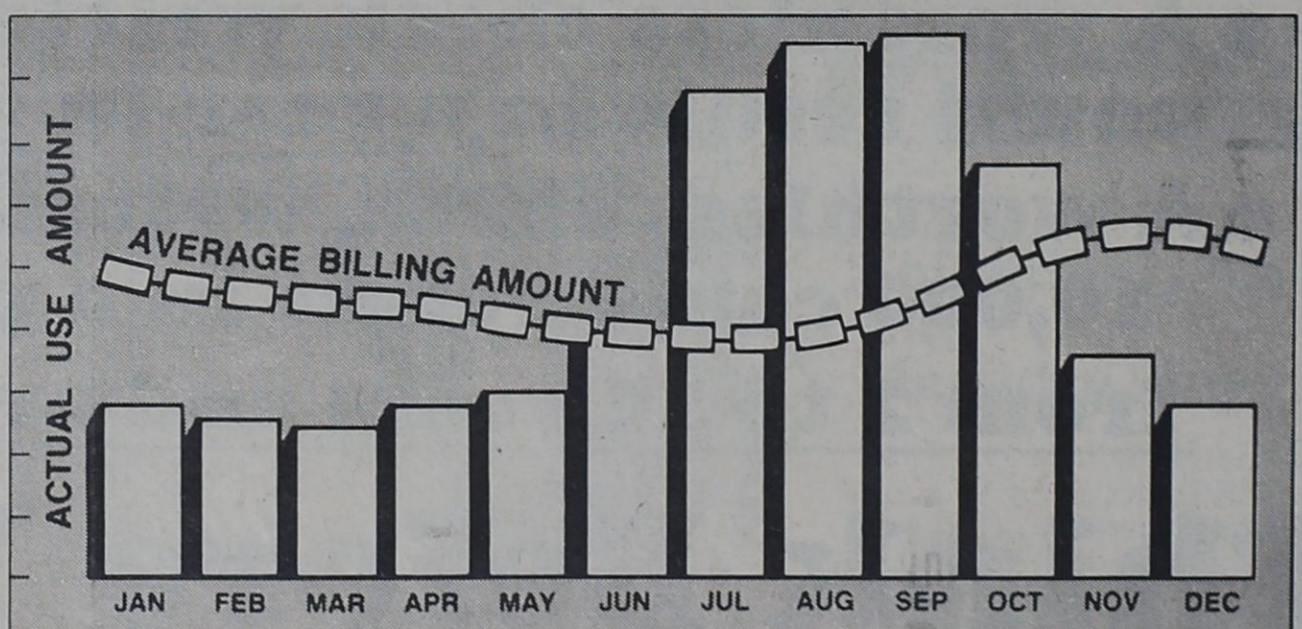
