Regarding the impact of the poundage quota reduction and its effect on buying or leasing quotas, Lov offers these comments. From 1978 through 1981,
peanut producers have expeanut producers have ex-
perienced annual reductions in peanut acreage
allotments. From
Fise through 1985, the nationa poundage quota is to decrea
se by 8.33 percent. Due to the relatively small size of
the typical peanut enterprise
and other and other considerations, the
inpact is negative from the inpact is negative from the
individual producer's vanindividual producer's van-
tage point, says the econotage point, says the econo-
mist.
Since category 1 and 2 poundage quotas were eliminated this year and in view of the new farm bill, farms that
previously leased out poundpreviously leased out pound-
age quotas produced off the farms are likely to take the first reduction of quotas in
1983. Assuming a 10 to 12 1983. Assuming a 10 to 12
percent reduction per year through 1985, these quota
holders would incur a poundage quota reduction totaling 29 to 32 percent or more through 1985. If poundage reduction is achieved in this
