### Producers Defeat Assessment Increase

The Progress office received a telephone call Monday from the Office of Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown that an error by his office was reported in the Commodity Referendum Law, stated in last weeks issue of the Progress.

He stated in the article that members of the Texas Peanut Producers commodity group, growers in 117 counties, voted to defeat a \$2 increase in their assessment

on the ballot that elected Larry Morrow to a six year term on the Texas Peanut Producers Board and that the assessment would reamin at \$2 per ton, The correct amount defeated was \$1 per ton and the assessment will remain at \$1.00 per ton.

The Board is one of eight producer-controlled commodity boards created under the Commodity Referendum Law. They are devoted to marketing, promotion, research and education.






