JEFF BURLESON DIES IN CAR CRASH

STEPHENVILLE — A Stephenville man was killed and his sister injured in a head-on collision about 7:45 p.m. Friday, May 20, 1982 about six miles northeast of here on U.S. Highway 377, according to Department of Public Safety trooper David Coffee.

Jeff Burleson, 25, was pronounced dead of multiple injuries at 8:35 p.m. Friday at Stephenville General Hospital. His 22 year old sister, Amy Elizabeth Burleson of San Marcos, remained in stable condition at the Hospital Saturday, a nursing supervisor said.

Burleson was eastbound on the highway when he tried to pass a pickup truck that was passing another car, Coffee reported. As he pulled into the westbound lane, he collided with a vehicle driven by David Shauf of Gainesville, who wasn't injured.

Funeral services were at 2:30 Sunday at First Christian Church, with the Revs. Jerry and Deborah Butt officiating. Burial was at Erath Gardens of Memory, directed by Lacy Funeral Home.

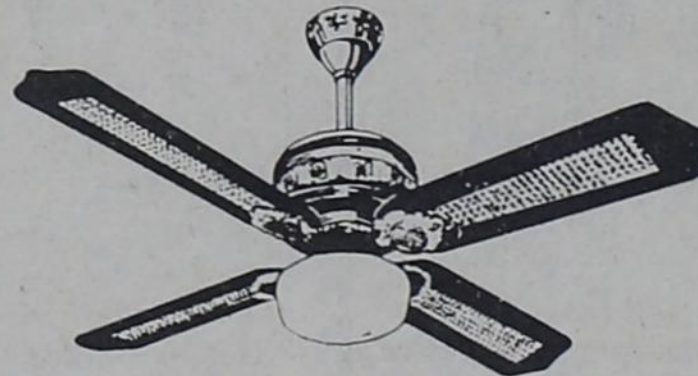

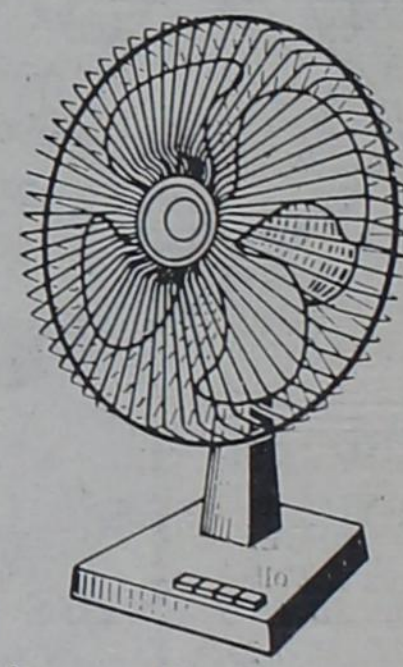

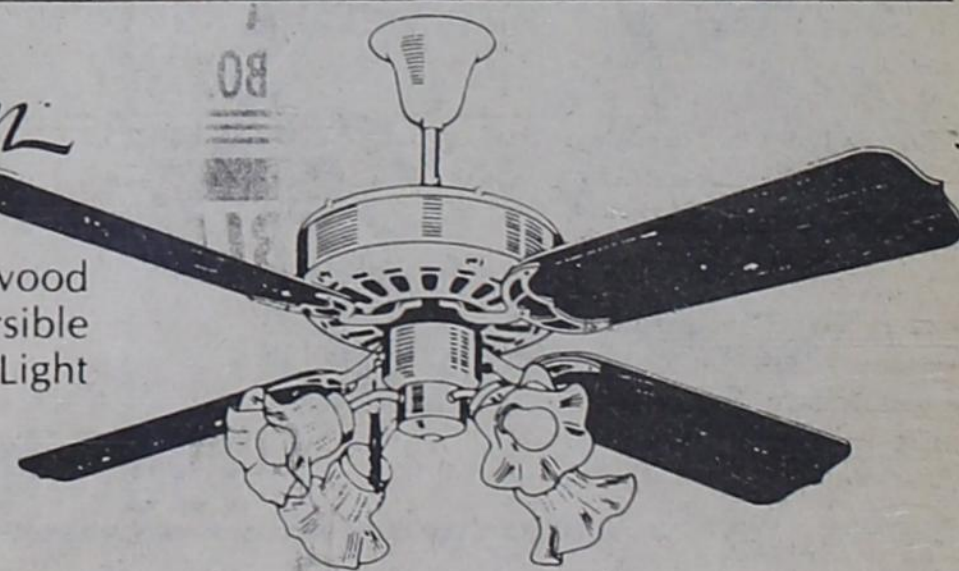
