

GORMAN - Jimmy Johnson, called by many the greatest running back in Gorman High history, has announced plans to play football for Ranger Junior College next year.

Johnson gained 2,200 yards this year, the most yards in a single season ever by a Gorman player. The career rushing leader for Gorman, the 5-9, 180 pound Johnson averaged over 10 yards per carry this year.

In 1980, Johnson picked up 1,811 yards and had a nine yards per carry average. "He's a real good mover," said Gorman football Coach

Allan Gibbs Tuesday. "He's got the great speed to go along with great moves. He can go as far as he wants in football."

Johnson ran track last year and recorded a 10.6 time in the 100 meters, equivalent to a 9.7 in the 100 yard dash. "Texas Tech was here three times looking at him and Baylor also," said Gibbs. "But Jimmy helps out on the farm and probably wants to remain close to home."

BY Charlie L. Garrett, Mayor Since this is my first news in 1982, I wish all of you a very happy and prosperous New Year. The year just closed was a rather successful year of the City of Gorman and I hope that this will even be a better year.

During the past year, as you know, we were able to keep your taxes down, with only about 1% increase in taxes paid. We did this inspite of inflation. During this time we did manage to keep things going along with some improvements. We put rock on some more of your streets, had the major sewer lines cleaned, did some improvement in the drainage system completed the Senior Citizens Building. Some of this was made possible by our increased amount of local sales tax. Our sales tax was up about 30 percent (about \$5,000).

Since I last reported, we have hired a new police officier, Mrs. Risa Livingston is now a regular officer in our town. She and her husband, Corkey, have moved into on the City houses. She came to us as a certified and experience law officer. I feel that she is doing a good job. Chief Funderburg and officer Livingston are rotating shifts and she will be working some on both shifts.

During the past year our police Department issued 218 traffic citation with number one for speeding. The second greatest number was for failure to stop at stop signs. They made 129 arrests which resulted in charges being filed. The number one was for Public Intoxication and number two for traffic violations. They worked 31 accidents which resulted in one death and six injuries. They answered 45 animal calls, 44 disturbance calls, and 44 prowler calls. have only listed a few of things that your Police Department did to help make Gorman a safer place in which to live. From the charges filed, the City collected over \$7,000 in City fines. Our Police Department and our Justice Department are doing a good job, we urge you to cooperate with them and back them in the protection they offer to you.

In spite of the good job that the Police Department is doing, along with our Municipal Judge, they and the elected officials still receive complaints that is justified and I will assure that we will investigate them all. There is one area that I want to cover in this report. We have some complaints about the City Police taking the City Car outside the City Limits. This has happened on some occasions and possibly will continue in some cases. As your elected officals we have discussed this with our police on several occasions. We feel that in most of the cases where you saw the car outside the City Limits there was justification for it to be there. We and they realize that our officers have no legal jurisdiction outside the City limits, but on occasions they will receive a call from someone about an accident. The first thing they do is to report it to the proper officials. In some cases the DPS will ask them to go to assist until they can get a man there. Both of our officers are trained in first aid and they may be able to save a life by lending assistance. Just remember that if one of your loved ones were involved in an accident and their life might be saved by our Police answering a call, you would forever be grateful for this. You can rest assured that we do not intend to try to police the whole County and will curtail any unnecessary trips outside the City limits. The next time you see our car out

of the City, remember they

may be trying to save a life.



The higher cost of energy has caused more and more people to return to the use of wood burning stoves and fireplaces. Once again wood ashes have become plentiful around many homes. As a result, we are getting questions concerning the value of wood ashes as an additive to


garden soil. One question usually asked "Are wood ashes beneficial"? It depends on your soil, but generally, yes, they can be beneficial. However, ahses are alkaline and quite high in potassium, calcium and magnesium. Most of our soils in Eastland County are already alkaline and high in potassium and calcium. The ashes would be more beneficial in acid, sandy soils in some parts of our

Another question we hear is "can ashes be harmful"? Yes, if too much is used. Ashes contain chemicals which are very alkaline with a pH of 10-12 and they are harmful at high rates in a soil that is already alkaline. Since about 80 - 90 percent of wood ashes are water soluble mineral matter, high rates can cause salt to build up in soils, resulting in plant injury.

If your soil is acid, you may use up to 15 to 20 pounds

of dry wood ashes per 1,000 square feet of garden area. For lawns, keep below the 15 pound level. For flower beds, about 1 pound per 100 square feet is enough.

Always consider the following general rules when applying ashes: 1. Do not apply wood ashes

to your garden more than once per year. 2. Do no apply ashes to your garden more than three

3. Wood ashes are very low in nitrogen; so, add additional nitrogen fertilizer with ashes.

Ashes have about 1.8% phosphorus, 5.46% potassium, 23.3% calcium, 22.14% magnesium, and 2.8% iron. There are some other beneficial elements; but most of the remaining chemicals in ashes are harmful salts such as carbonate which makes up to 23% of the ashes.

Wood ashes do have value and can be beneficial, but know your soil before you apply. If in doubt, obtain a soil test. We can help you by providing instructions and mailing cartons for soil tests.

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

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



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MOTORISTS URGED TO USE CAUTION IN JUMING BATTERIES

When cold weather, that seasonal enemy of car batteries, starts blowing across Texas, it's time for the annual reminder from the Texas Society to Prevent Blindness on the hazards involved in jumping a car battery.

Falling temperatures rob a battery of its efficiency. Engine oil becomes thicker, making the battery work harder to turn the engine

"When this happens many motorists find themselves on one end or the other of a set of booster cables," says Jack B. O'Neill of Houston, Prevent Blindness Safety Chairman. This commonplace practice of borrow starting power from one battery to another resulted in more than 20,000 injuries last year, nearly two-thirds of them involving the eye."

Carelessly connected jumper cables, he explained, can produce a spark that can cause an explosion with the combustible gases that a battery normally emits. Battery acid burns are particularly dangerous to the eyes, he noted.

To minimize the risks involved, Prevent Blindness has prepared a safety sticker which gives motorists easyto-follow instructions for jump starting a car with a dead battery. On it, the Society makes the following recommendations.

BEFORE ATTACHING THE CABLES:

Put out all cigarettes and flames. A spark can ignite hydrogen gas produced by battery fluids.

Make sure the cars don't touch each other. Set parking brakes and automatic shifts of both cars to Park (manual transmissions to Neutral), and turn the ignition off.

Take off the battery caps, if removable, and add water if it is needed. Check for ice in the battery fluid. Never jump-start a frozen battery! Replace the caps and cover with a damp cloth.

Do not jump-start unless both batteries are negatively grounded and the same voltage. American cars have either 12-volt or 6-volt batteries. Check owner's manual. (Owners of foreign cars should check their operating oak branches in water. suspected carcinogen.

ing directions). ATTACHING THE CABLES.

Clamp on jumper cable to the positive pole of the dead battery. Then clamp the other end of the same cable to the positive pole of the good battery.

At the booster battery, connect the second cable to the negative pole. Then clamp the other end of that cable to the stalled car's engine block on the side away from the battery.

Start the car with good battery and then the disabled

Remove the cables, first from the engine block the the booster car's negative terminal and then from the positive poles.

For maximum eye safety, the Society advises everyone working with car batteries or standing nearby to wear protective goggles to keep battery fragments and chemicals out of the eyes. Should an accident occur and battery acid get into the eyes, immediately flush them with water continously for 15 minutes. Then see a doctor.






