Johnny Wayne and Bobby Mark Eaves, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Eaves were named Farmers of the Year for 1981 at the 17th Annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet Thursday night.

Johnny was born August 5, 1981 in Blackwell Hospital. He moved with his parents to Goldsmith, when he was 4 months old and resided there until October, 1958, when he and his parents returned to Gorman, to the family farm 5 miles north of Gorman.

He attended Tarleton State University for 11/2 years He has consistantly worked in farm-related jobs since returning from college. modities. "Each dollar in agricultural income generates four to five when it hits the market" Brown said.

The county covers an area

of 925 square miles and has an annual rainfall of over 27 inches.

Eastland County is ranked fifth in the State in Peanut production, and is responsible for over seven percent of the total Texas peanut crop. Area farmers harvested 34,700 acres of peanuts during the 1979 crop season, yielding over 1,500 pounds per acre, with overall produc-

tion reaching 52,429,000 pounds.

Due to drought conditions the 24,000 acres of peanuts harvested during the 1980 crop season yielded only 935 pounds per acre, producing a total of 22,895,000 pounds.

The county also produces large hay crops. In 1979, 18,700 acres were devoted to hay production. The yield for that year was just under 1.5 tons per acre, with total production estimated at 26,300 tons. The 1980 crop was down slightly, with a yield of 1.3 tons per acre and a production total of 25,400 tons.

A large producer of Texas grain crops, Eastland County Farmers harvested 4,200 acres of wheat during the 1980 crop season with yield of 19.8 bushels per acre and overall production totaling 83,000 bushels.

The 1981 harvest was up, with 8,100 acres harvested yielding 20.6 bushels per acre and total productuin estimated at 167,000 bushels

There were 5,100 acres devoted to sorghum production in 1980, with production totaling 44,500 hundredweight (cwt), down from the 1979 total of 157,000 cwt. In 1980 2,500 acres of Eastland County farmland produced an estimated 82,000 bushels of oats, down from 1981 estimates of 4,100 acres and a production level of 155,100 bushels. The county also produces rye and cotton. There were 92,200 bushels of rye produced in 1980 and 440 bales of Upland cotton. The fertile soil of this county is suited to a wide variety of crops. There were 9,500 bushels of peaches produced in 1980, down from the 15,200 bushels produced in 1979. The 1980 pecan crop totaled 480,000 pounds, also down from the 1979 harvest which reached 960,000 pounds. Beef cattle and hog production are responsible for the majority of the income generated by the livestock industry here. The 1981 cattle inventory was estimated at 65,000 head, up from the 1980 inventory of 58,000 head. The county hog inventory of 10,100 head in 1979 reached 17,100 head in 1980. There are also many sheep and goat producers here. The sheep and lamb herd

was estimated at 1,200 head in 1980, and produced 15,000 pounds of wool. The 1981 inventory climbed to 1,900 head.

There were 1,600 head of Angora goats in the county in 1980, which produced 16,000 pounds of mohair. Herd estimates dropped to 1,500 head in 1981 figures.

The poultry industry here produced 1.5 million eggs in 1980, from an estimated 9,000 laying hens. The 1979 turkey crop of 137,000 head climbed to 188,000 head in 1980.

"Continued crop and livestock production in Eastland County is important to the future of Texas agriculture," Brown said, "and agriculture is heartbeat of Texas."

Agriculture is one of the largest multipliers of income in Texas. Including all its

agribusiness phases, agriculture added over \$37 billion to the economy of the state in 1980. The extimated value of farm assets in Texas totaled

more than \$70 billion at the bigginning of 1981. "While only 420,000 individuals work directly on

Texas farms and ranches, four out of every ten persons in the state owe their jobs either directly or indirectly to agriculture," Brown said. Texas is third in the nation in agricultural production

and fourth in agricultural exports. The state's largest export item, cotton, accounts for nearly one fourth of all U.S. cotton exports.

"The potential for further growth is great," Brown said. "With the increasing demand for food and fiber throughout the world, and because of the inportance of







Livestock **Show Set**



Businesses and individuals purchased advertisements in the show catalogue. This is a method used to provide prize money for the exhibitors.



When this lignite-fueled plant was built in 1971-72, it cost \$125 per kilowatt of generating capacity. Because of inflation and new regulations, this figure was up to \$460 on a unit completed in 1981, and will climb to more than \$1,000 in a few more years.

We Americans have always liked getting our money's worth on whatever we buy, and electricity is no exception. None of us like what's happened to our bills over the past 10 years.

The typical residential customer uses about 25% more electricity than 10 years ago, even with conservation.

But there's a bigger difference than that in our bills, and it's because the actual cost per kilowatt hour is now about 21/2 times what it was that same 10 years ago. Before 1970, kilowatt hour

costs had been moving downward.

In those days we were building low cost plants to run on cheap fuel. But in the '70s, fuel stopped being cheap and the cost of building all power plants skyrocketed.

From 1971 to 1981, the price of natural gas went to 10 times what it had been, and the end's not in sight. That's why the plants your electric company has built and must build to meet customer needs use less expensive fuels like lignite coal and uranium.

The increasing cost of these plants, however, reflects the effects of inflation and new regulations. A million-kilowatt lignite-fueled gener-

ating plant which cost \$125 million in 1971 would cost more than eight times as much (more than one billion dollars) if we started building it this year!

We don't like the way the price of electricity has gone up any more than you do. We do think it's important for you to know why it's gone up.
