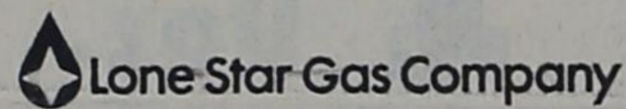

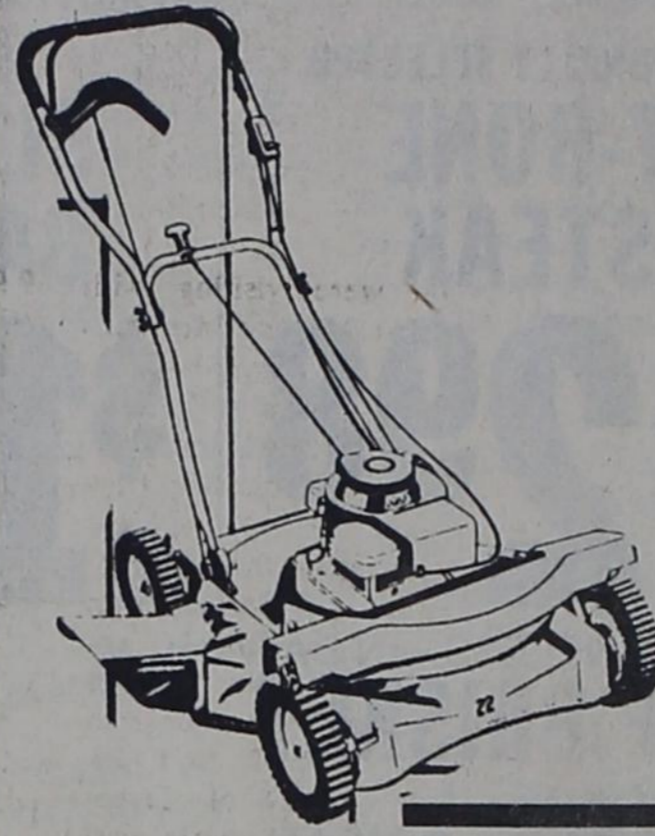

JIM HIGHTOWER TO SPEAK AT LEON-BOSQUE BANQUET MARCH 14

Jim Hightower, Texas Commissioner of Agriculture, will be the featured speaker at the annual meeting and Banquet of the Leon-Bosque Resources Conservation and Development area (RC&D).

The meeting will be held March 14, 1984 at the proctor area recreation center on Lake Proctor in Comanche county.

After winning hotly-contested primary and general election races in 1982, Jim Hightower was sworn in as Texas Commissioner of Agriculture on New Year's Day, 1983. He has since been named Chairman of The Democratic National Party's Agriculture Council. Hightower has been working on Agriculture policy issues since the early

1960's. After a stint with the congressional research service and work as legislative aide to U.S. Senator Ralph Yarborough, he founded the Agribusiness Accountability Project, a private research organization which investigated the impact of monopolies on farm and food policies.

During his years as Director of the project, 1970-75, he wrote dozens of articles in national publications, testified before congressional committees and authored two books on the food industry: Hard Tomatoes, Hard Times (1972) and Eat Your Heart Out, (1975). He continued his research and writing about agriculture and the food industry during his editorship to the Texas Observer, and in 1979, was Awarded the Texas Farmers Union's "Outstanding Journalist Award."

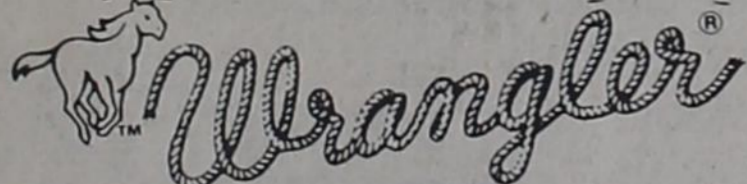

TESCO FILES FOR EIGHT PERCENT RATE INCREASE

Texas Electric Service Company announced today that Texas Utilities Electric Company (TUEC) will file March 9 a request for an increase in electric rates of \$304.2 million, or an average increase of 8 percent. The request will be filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUC) and the cities served by Texas Electric, Dallas Power and Light Company, and Texas Power and Light Company, divisions of TUEC. The primary reasons for the rate increase request

are to prevent further deterioration of the company's financial condition and to assure continuation of the company's major construction projects to meet the growing needs of our service area while using cheaper fuels so that customers' bills will be as low as possible. For the first time in the history of the companies, bond ratings were downgraded in January from Aaa to Aa2 by Moody's Investors Service and in February from AAA to

part of our costs to serve customers," Armstrong explained. The majority of the company's financing is used for construction of new power plants, transmission lines and distribution, facilities, as well as upgrading and replacement of equipment. Construction of power plants that use low-cost lignite fuel has already produced net savings to customers of \$2.8 billion since 1975. The Comanche Peak nuclear plant is another step in the process and, even with its higher construction costs, cus-

tomers will benefit in the future with lower cost electricity from Comanche Peak than from other alternatives because of its low fuel costs, Armstrong continued. Completion of Comanche Peak and the continued construction of four scheduled lignite coal units are necessary to provide added fuel flexibility and reliable, reasonably priced electricity to one of the fastest growing areas in the nation, Armstrong added. "The company's construction program has helped keep electric rates in this

area below the average of major U.S. cities, and we are committed to continuing this record of supplying reliable electric service at the most reasonable cost possible," Armstrong said. The company provides electric service in 91 counties of north central, east and west Texas to more than 4.5 million people. Its service area spans some 600 miles from west to east, extending from near the New Mexico border into far east Texas, and 250 miles from north to south, from the Red River into the center of the state.
